

The Ministers Write...



#### From Rev. Ian Howarth

Dear friends,

The celebration of Easter lies at the very centre of our Christian life. The power of God to bring new life out of death that we see in the stories of the resurrection of Jesus is cause for joy and hope. It challenges us to live as Easter people, recognising that power in our own lives and sharing that joy and hope with others. It is a wonderful message.

But we have to recognise that it doesn't always feel like that, even for the most faithful Christian people. In Lent we have been reflecting on the other side of the Christian life, the journey of Jesus on the way of the cross. We have seen how he takes seriously the pain and the suffering of the world, and how he keeps on loving through his own trials and sufferings that lead to the horror of the cross.

At Easter we don't just flick a switch and forget the suffering of the world. The glory of the Easter message is that it takes that suffering seriously, it takes the pain of the world seriously, and dares to claim that it can be transformed through the resurrection power of Jesus.

Our Easter joy is not an unthinking escape from the problems of the world, but a challenge to us to engage with reality, in ourselves, in others and in the wider world, and in faith to discover the power of God to bring new life and hope, with the risen Christ at our side.

May we all share in the joy of Christ's risen life,

#### From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

In <u>Matthew 27:45-46</u>, it says: "Now from the sixth hour darkness fell upon all the land until the ninth hour. And about the ninth

hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, "Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani?" that is, "My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?"

The idea that God appears to abandon Christ only moments before his death was not something I found easy to grasp early on in my Christian journey. Somehow I have come to realise that this kind of forsakenness was not the kind of abandonment I had once believed it to be. It was not the act of a God who relinquishes all responsibility, who plays no part in the events unfolding or who turns his back on Jesus as though an uncaring parent. Juraen Moltmann gives an interesting reflection:

"People who suffer without any reason always think first that they have been abandoned by God and that all the good things in life are in eclipse. People who cry out for God in their suffering can find they are joining in Christ's death cry. They discover in the suffering Christ the God who understands them and suffers with Once we sense this, we perceive that God is not cold, them. remote force of destiny whom we have to accuse and cry out against, but that in Christ he has become the human God who cries out with us and in us, and who intervenes on our behalf when torment makes us dumb. The God who has become human has made our lives part of his life, and our sufferings his suffering."

The mystery of the cross to a certain extent is unfathomable, the greatest theologians we have will never be able to reach the depths of its mystery. But this one small moment signifies for me the very moment when Christ's humanity is found. When God appears to be absent, Jesus becomes connected directly with the humanness of our lives, not just our suffering but that of God's too. In this moment when Jesus cries out, God cries out with us at the injustice in our world and the pain and suffering we inflict upon each other. It is recognition of the sin of humanity, with God at the very heart of it all.

Easter morning will reflect the divinity of Christ more than at any other moment for me. A Christ who overcomes suffering and pain and offers us all the hope of a future.

With excitement and joy may we celebrate this Easter with the knowledge that we serve a God who meets us in our humanness and offers us a taste of the divine. Life in all its richness, with God at the very heart of all we do.

In the March 2012 edition of the magazine "Flying for Life" there is an appeal: "Have you ever wondered what to do with all those POSTCARDS you get sent every year? Perhaps you have kept them for years, but now no longer need them. Rev. Ken Thom (of Sevenoaks URC) has been collecting cards from churches and supporters of MAF for years, and with the help of a small team, sells them on to collectors, raising thousands of pounds for our work".

Now, we keen readers of the Link knew that and, having garnered and sent to Rev Thom 6029 cards since 25th May 2000, scarcely needed to be told again. In his last letter to me, Pastor Ken says he had collected "over £10,000 in Year 2011", including of course for those we had sent. He doesn't say what his target is for this year, but we have got him off to a flying start.

Already in 2012, members of the URC in our Joint Pastorate have sent to me for onward transmission two large boxes containing respectively 317 and 627, so 944 postcards which, with another 35 from Methodist sources, adds up to 999 we shall have contributed this year! Some of these will prove very collectible judging by their stamps alone from the early 1900's, from many different countries overseas, and with memorable scenes and subjects. That will make a total of 7028 POSTCARDS from us to Pastor Ken in aid of MAF.

Mission Aviation Fellowship is a worldwide Christian organisation operating over 135 light aircraft in more than 30 countries. Around 280 flights every day transport patients, relief teams, medical supplies and Christian workers in the world's remotest regions and places of deepest human need. Places where flying is not a luxury but a lifeline.

#### Cherry trees to mark extent of Tsunami



Japan is slowly recovering from the devastating earthquake and tsunami which killed about 20,000 people in March last year. A project has begun to plant cherry (sakura) trees in areas affected by the disaster, to show future generations the extent of the damage.

Sadly it was not until after last year's tsunami that it was discovered that tsunamis of similar size had struck the area in previous centuries. No-one realised that a tsunami large enough to overcome the breakwater could happen, and more lives could have been saved if only this vital information had been handed down through the generations. ...So the SAKURA PROJECT was born, and is being run by people from Rikuzentakata, one of the coastal towns almost completely destroyed last year. There is a website but it's in Japanese so for more information use **<u>savetakata.org</u>** and select "giving and helping" to donate. SAVE TAKATA hopes to rejuvenate the town's economy by supporting the development and entrepreneurship of local companies.

Another project in the area, "3.11 Memorial Project," aims to preserve the surreal sights of ships that ended up in unimaginable places and public signage twisted and distorted by the tsunami, as a warning for the future.

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## People shouldn't be bought and sold !

**"Trafficked"** is a newly released paperback which tells the true story of Sophie Hayes, a British girl who is betrayed by her lover and "best friend", and callously sold on the streets in Italy, to pay off his

debts. She thought it was a dream holiday but it became a living nightmare. Isolated from her family and friends over a period of several years, this man's lies destroyed her life. Turning ten "tricks" a night she realised that everything had been a lie. He was a violent thug who'd never loved her. His debts were nonexistent, but if she didn't keep working he'd betray her to the Italian authorities. He kept all her earnings and her passport.

Fortunately she was eventually able to contact her family and escape back to the UK. Here she was befriended by Bex Keer, from the charity, **Stop the Traffik**, and has turned her life around. The man who trafficked her has been to prison for his crime. He tried to contact her on his release but she is a much stronger person now. She has a good job, the support of her family and better friends. She has also found God. Proceeds from the book go to the <u>Sophie Hayes Foundation</u> which aims to increase awareness and raise funds for organizations including **Stop the Traffik**, who are working to support survivors and combat this terrible crime.

We heard Sophie's story from Bex Keer, who was the speaker at Effingham's *Women's World Day of Prayer Service* which was written by the women of Malaysia, where human trafficking is a large problem. She used Sophie's story to illustrate that this trade is not just one way. Men, women and children used in the sex trade, but also domestic and low paid agricultural workers, are here in the UK, trafficked from all over the world.

**Stop the Traffik** works with the United Nations to build strong communities who can resist this insidious global trade. People are trafficked for profit.... 31.6 billion US dollars. For more information see website <u>www.stopthetraffik.org</u>.


"The Living Room was a great place to hang out on a Sunday

But that was not to be. As I approached the City, there was an atmosphere - almost physical, tangible, a great feeling of anticipation. Nearer and nearer I came. Such noise, so many people singing, shouting, waving palms. Some so emotional they were crying, both women and men. Children whooped around enjoying an unexpected freedom.

Then a cry, so loud it split the air, "Hosannah, hosannah in the highest! Make way, make way!" Then 'He' came by on a donkey, the man I had heard so much about. The King, some said. In spite of all the excitement, there was this feeling that I could not quite comprehend, sending wonderful shivers down my back. He, this man Jesus, was so ordinary. Nothing royal. No bowing and scraping. Just a man on a donkey, but such presence! I forgot my sore feet, my exhaustion, and followed, pulled by an invisible string. I shouted with the rest of them!

I got to Gran's eventually. "What kept you?" she asked. "Will she believe me?" I thought.

Daffodil Day, a celebration of Spring in 'Praise of Music' at Central Hall, Westminster. It was not possible to hold one last year as the organ in the Great Hall was being refurbished. The only place to put the largest 35ft pipes was on the floor of the Church. So keen were people this year they literally flooded in from the time the doors opened at midday, having just a few empty seats in the far corners downstairs and in the gallery. It was an event worth waiting for!

It is always such a lovely mix of items and this year was no exception. As well as solos, the service was mixed with prayer, Bible readings, talk and laughter.

The powerful tenor voice of Anando Mukerjee singing 'The Holy City' soared right up to the heights taking everyone with it, then the contrast of a quieter soprano solo 'A nightingale sang in Berkeley Square'. The senior choir from Kent College thoroughly enjoyed their spots, singing 'Lord, make me an instrument of your peace' then, later in the afternoon ' Joshua fought the battle of Jericho' nearly bringing down the walls of Central Hall! The musical highlight was an organ solo by Gerard Brooks, the Director of Music. It is difficult to find the right words to describe it - wonderful, marvellous, awe-inspiring and more. If the choir tried to demolish the walls, then the organist did his best to shatter the glass dome! For some it might have been a sound too much, but I revelled in it.

The congregational singing is always good. There was such sensitivity in singing 'Beauty for brokenness', and then, to be one of some thousands joining in 'O for a thousand tongues to sing' sent shivers down the spine as the words became such a powerful statement of faith. I didn't think singing could get any better, until the last hymn 'To God be the Glory' with its chorus of praise making such a joyous, rich sound.





## Moving performance by choir...

Following a suggestion made during an "Everybody Welcome" meeting, our choir has been trying new positions. The theory was that if the choir came out of the chancel into the nave of Christ Church, their voices would be heard more easily by the congregation, and it would reduce that uncomfortable separation of choir and congregation encouraged by church architecture (and the Oxford Movement, which put robed choirs into chancels originally designed for the clergy).

Moving the organ was the other possibility, but we've tried that already. It was extended in 1995.

On 26 February, the choir popped up in front of the pulpit, in a curved row as before, so that each singer could hear more than two others. At first, we put the basses at the front of the chancel behind the sopranos, but they preferred to be part of the row on the lower level. With a pillar nearby, it was surprisingly cramped. There were a few comments at the church meeting after the service, and nobody seemed alarmed by this break with tradition.

The next Sunday, for a service of Holy Communion, we were back in the chancel, enhancing the sense of gathering round the table.

At the parade service on 11 March, the choir moved to the other side in two rows under the organ pipes, facing sideways. Again, a pillar cut off some from seeing all the congregation (but that has always been the case for others). This worked well otherwise.

By 18 March the choir will have shuffled forward in front of the lectern, leaving access to the organ chamber behind the back row (important for sound engineers). Perhaps this will be best.

Although maintaining choirs in churches has become increasingly difficult, some of us still hope that in future the resurgence of community singing (choir festivals, community choirs etc.) will make an impact on churches, and the use of harmony in worship songs as well as harmonised hymns, demonstrated in Ian Howarth's talks about the new Methodist hymn book, "Singing the Faith", will enrich our worship.

In the next Link, I hope to explore the relationship between "Singing the Faith" and our URC hymn book, "Rejoice and Sing". Do we still need it? 28


