



The Ministers Write...

From Rev. Lynda Russell

Dear friends,

April is just around the corner, and indeed will be with us by the time you read this, and it finally feels as if Spring is coming. However I'm wondering if we are going to get our "April showers" this year. During the period of Lent, I suggested to the members of Christ Church who were at one of my services that we keep a "thankfulness diary". I provided a chart that we could complete every day or as often as we remembered (!) with what we wanted to give thanks to God for that day.

I have this diary in front of my computer as I work each day, and have remembered to fill it in probably every other day (in my defence, sometimes it had papers on top of it! OK I accept that's not a good excuse!). Reading it now, the ones that strike me first are the 'working drains' and 'water freely out of a tap'. I would never usually think of those, except of course – you've guessed it – our drains got blocked a few weeks ago. And then we see so frequently the pictures of refugees who don't have even the most basic amenities when they step off a boat. They have lost everything. It's heart breaking as we watch them queuing even for the water we take for granted.

In the developing world, of course many people still have to fetch their water from wells. You may remember that Jesus met a woman at a well where he had a long conversation with her about water! Having asked her for a drink from the well, Jesus then offers her a gift of 'living water'.

Years earlier Isaiah had said: "Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat! Why spend money on what is not bread, and your

Jesus said, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again. But anyone who drinks the water I give will never be thirsty again. The water I give people will be like a spring flowing inside them, gushing fountains of endless life."

If you are feeling or have ever felt dry or somehow shrivelled on the inside, or that what you are doing or how you are living does not satisfy, then this is what Jesus means – at this time of Easter Jesus offers us his love through his death and resurrection. If we come to Jesus and ask, then He will give us this 'living water', which will renew our souls and revive us in our inner selves.

May the love of Jesus be with us all this Easter.

Dear friends,

"He has forced open a door that has been locked since the death of the first man. He has met, fought, and beaten the King of Death. Everything is different because He has done so... What are we to make of Christ? There is no question of what we can make of Him, it is entirely a question of what He intends to make of us." C.S. Lewis.

C.S. Lewis had a wonderful capacity to explain profound truths in a simple manner and I find his simplicity deeply thought provoking. The resurrection is central to the Christian narrative. What are we to make of a Christ who has beaten 'the King of Death' who walks and talks with his disciples in these coming 40 days. "See my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Touch me, and see. For a spirit does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. Luke 24:39-42.

There are numerous encounters with Christ after the resurrection not least at the tomb, but also on the road to Emmaus, the meeting in the upper room with Thomas, the lakeside encounter and numerous others. After those 40 days Jesus gives final instructions to the "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations baptising them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

It seems to me that to have any capacity at all to fulfil the great commission we must have a deep sense of who Christ is and a confidence in such understanding. In what way can we share the gospel if we have not found our own way through the ethical, sociological, political and spiritual depths that inhabit the gospel? The reality is there is much we don't understand and yet like C.S. Lewis, simplicity is perhaps the best way forward. The Bible is an accumulation of testimonies, an oral tradition passed down until others determined it was time to put 'pen to paper'. Yet in the numerous groups I have attended, the moment we are asked for personal testimony people move quickly to avoid any form of self-disclosure.

Is it that quintessentially conservative streak within us that Brits are sometimes known for? Why do we feel so inhibited when it comes to sharing our stories? Where has God been present for you today, this week, last week? God talk is missing and we need to develop ways of getting that kind of enthusiastic conversation going. Have confidence in your story, real integrity in a conversation is generally well received. It's okay to admit you don't have all the answers if it leads to other questions but share how your faith makes a difference. Word gets round when it's worth listening to, and clearly we have something to say. So let's get talking, let's get out there and spread the good news because Christ doesn't go to all this trouble so that we

St. Paul in Malta

Christianity has almost 2000 years of history in Malta. According to tradition, it was brought to the Islands by none other than the Apostle Paul himself in around A.D. 60.

Paul was being taken to Rome to be tried as a political rebel, but the ship carrying him and some 274 others was caught in a violent storm only to be wrecked two weeks later on the Maltese coast. All aboard swam safely to land.

The site of the wreck is traditionally known as St. Paul's Island, and is marked by a statue commemorating the event.

The welcome given to the survivors is described in the Acts of the Apostles (28) by St. Luke:

"And later we learned that the island was called Malta. And the people who lived there showed us great kindness, and they made a fire and called us all to warm ourselves... "

As the fire was lit, Paul was bitten by a poisonous snake but he suffered no ill effects. The islanders took this as a sign that he was a special man. This scene is depicted in many religious works of art on the Islands.

According to tradition, the Apostle took refuge in a cave, now known as St. Paul's Grotto in Rabat, Malta.

During his winter stay, he was invited to the house of Publius, the Romans' chief man on the Islands. It was here, according to tradition, that Paul



cured Publius' father of a serious fever. Publius is then said to have converted to Christianity and was made the first Bishop of Malta. The Cathedral of Mdina is said to stand on the site of Publius' house.

Archaeological evidence seems to support this tradition, as Malta was one of the first Roman colonies to convert.



Whose shoes? Living with dementia


Members of the "Connect" group were invited and took part in a specially designed game (tool) to enable people to share their experiences with the NHS.

Brass for Leatherhead Trinity

Leatherhead Concert & Arts Society is the charity that runs the town's lunchtime concerts. As LCAS 'grows up' (2016 is our 5th year) we have begun to think beyond the lunchtime concerts to consider what further musical benefit we can bring to Leatherhead.

I have vivid childhood memories of my introduction to the sights and sounds of musical instruments. This was before the days when every child was presented with a recorder. My mother played the piano at home and encouraged each of us to learn, but I knew little of orchestral sounds.

Then one day, in the school hall, a harp appeared. I knew harps existed, but here was my very first *live* harp. Enormous, ornate, delicate, beautiful... And then she played it!

Over my primary and secondary school years we were introduced to more instruments – oboe, cor anglais, clarinet, bassoon, brass and strings of many sizes.

And that is the inspiration for our project. Let's bring the sounds of orchestral instruments, and professional performance, to Leatherhead's youngsters. We want to share with a new generation the musical experiences we enjoy.

So for the morning of Thursday 9th June Mardi Brass are invited to play for the pupils at Leatherhead Trinity School. Afterwards, the group will come to the Methodist Church to perform our 12:30 lunchtime concert.

Mardi Brass are five professional players of trumpet, horn, trombone, and tuba. They will introduce the sounds of their instruments to the pupils at Leatherhead Trinity, even letting one or two have a go.

Who can tell what possibilities that experience will open for any one of the children listening? I went on to play trumpet, horn, and later tuba. That tuba got me into the town band when I lived in France, a great way to meet and share with a variety of We plan to make this a regular part of our work and are thinking who the School might invite for their next session. Two donors have already given £100 to help guarantee the project. The amount you give will help determine whether the School can invite musicians each term, or just once or twice a year.

Let's see if we can fill some young heads with the excitement of live music, and let them discover where that spark takes them.

National Society Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS) Report

In January 2016 Leatherhead Trinity School was inspected by SIAMS. Their report is worth publicising to a wider audience.

Leatherhead Trinity, in Kingston Road, is a larger than average primary school, with 408 pupils. It is an ecumenical school representing three Christian denominations: Anglican, Methodist, and United Reformed. It has two sites, one of which is a large Children's Centre. The number of children with learning difficulties and/or disabilities is The number of pupils with English as an additional language is rising. However, attendance has improved and is now close to the national average.

The school's distinctiveness and effectiveness as a Church School are good: pupils discuss matters of faith and belief openly and with confidence; the high level of pastoral care ensures that all pupils are nurtured academically and emotionally; and the strong commitment of senior leaders ensures that there is continued improvement as a Church School.

A particular strength of the school's aims is the extent to which an explicit Christian ethos makes a difference to the lives of pupils and their families in the school community. In consequence the pupils' attitude and approaches to learning is improving. A core set of five values has been explored and are increasingly becoming integral to teaching and learning. These are: respect, truth, love, forgiveness, and commitment. Pupils have a good awareness of these, and articulate how respect encompasses the other four. They explain how these values together help them in their relationships with each other and with adults.

A central spiritual area is highly regarded by pupils, who say that it gives them space to be still and quiet. The impact of collective worship on the school community is good. They say that learning about Jesus helps them to become "better people".

The headteacher, fully supported by governors and staff, has ensured that the school has made good progress since the previous inspection in developing a Christian ethos which has the welfare of the children at its heart. The ecumenical foundation of the school is an asset because representatives of the three Christian denominations bring a range of perspectives, giving a broad vision of Christianity. Links with the Churches are valued by parents and children alike. Parents say that the focus on respect helps their children to appreciate a range of different faiths and cultures, and that the school helps them make up their own minds about belief.

LMC has three House Groups where Church members or friends can meet together on a regular basis. These groups usually



Continuing the Series looking at the individual chapters of the book...



Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations

Chapter 5:

The Practice of Extravagant Generosity (E.G.)

In 2 Corinthians 9, it states: "You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity." The dictionary describes generosity as abundance, copious and fertile, all of which could be applied to the context of this chapter. It begins with a story about a couple worried about tithing what

seems to them, a large proportion of their income. In applying their minds to their problem, they find that they could manage and that putting a tithed giving into practice, deepened their faith and commitment to their church and to God. Jesus warns (in Luke 12) "... For one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." (Read the story of the three servants in Matthew 25). John Wesley told the early Methodists to practise generosity as a necessary and indispensable aspect of discipleship, something quite difficult for the people of the time whose general attitude was frugality. Generosity is a fruit of the spirit and the opposite of selfishness and self-absorption. It requires self-control, patience and faith.

E.G. is not entirely about tithing money. It is a form of stewardship, mission and purpose in order to accomplish things for Christ. Ministerial and lay leadership often go outside their comfort zone to encourage E.G. which could extend beyond the four walls of the church to support needs locally, nationally and worldwide. E.G. in these fields very often appeals to young adults in the church, therefore ensuring continued leadership on the theme.

Even if giving has to be limited - for many older people, once their money is gone, it cannot be replaced - every encouragement should be given for constant support for all mission so that the Church (LMC!) can fulfil its purpose to make stronger disciples for Christ. Fruitful congregations acquire an excellence in whatever is on offer. Excellence means just that bit more effort to cultivate all gifts for the glory of God.

In these articles, I have only been able to express points that I consider important. Everyone needs to study the book for themselves and make their own decisions. Each person sees LMC in a different way, and ideas of what is important to progress as a vibrant congregation will vary.
