

# From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

On Christmas morning during the united service at Cobham, with great hilarity we had a game of 'Speak Out'. For anyone who is not familiar with this game it involves placing a piece of apparatus into your mouth (similar to the device a dentist might use to keep your mouth open). Once it's comfortably in place you are then given cards to read. Your partner must then repeat what they think is written on the card. Of course in church I replaced the cards with the story of Christmas. It was so so funny, and eventually we managed to get through the Christmas story without serious injury to its participants. It caused endless laughter with phone cameras capturing every moment but there was of course a serious message, why is it that we sometimes find it so difficult to share the good news of the Christmas story, where God touches our world in the most remarkable way. Where have our voices gone?

It then led to our Lent course 'The Kings Speech: Finding a Voice.' The course is centred around King George VI. The king of course struggled with a stutter. The course invites us to contemplate the very things that hinder us from sharing the gospel more freely, our social anxieties, our definitions of calling, the power of friendship and encouragement, the importance of having faith in our voice. My conclusion (although on writing this we still have 3 more sessions to go), is that many of us find ourselves somewhere between Good Friday and Easter Sunday. I fall into this category too. I'm someone who tentatively and at times apprehensively steps out of my comfort zones unsure of what lies ahead. For me in that space between good Friday and Easter Sunday, I move between anxiety and fear, unsure of where it will lead, unsure of the demands it will make upon me, but acknowledging that soothing thought that something significant is about to be born. It is the very thing that propels me forward.

I find myself being deeply challenged this Lent, reminded again of the silence that once dominated my own existence before I found faith. Reminded of a journey so deeply entrenched in the pain of Good Friday, yet recognising that there was something more, there is good news just around the corner. However, I must move towards it if I am to touch it. Sometimes we get stuck, we need others to give us a nudge. Easter morning brings with it a freedom that needs to be experienced through the heart and not the head. Trying to rationalise the resurrection may not be the most helpful way to approach this extraordinary event, neither will it be helpful to accept it without questioning it. I suppose what I am trying to say is that the answer lies somewhere in-between for me; something significant happened and I trust in my heart that God's divine plan for humankind was part of it just as it was when Mary gave birth.

This Easter I want to encourage you to step out in faith, even though you may feel fearful, Easter Sunday gives us permission to reach into the unknown. Someone once said to me 'Kim be prepared to take a risk' and I invite you to do the same.

Step out, be heard, be known, do so extravagantly in God's name and you will grow stronger, your faith will grow deeper and you will find you spend less time in that space between Good Friday and Easter morning and more time rejoicing that Christ is alive.

May God bless you richly this Easter with divine revelation.



### **Cobham Area Foodbank - Report to PCCs February 2017**

The Foodbank is an independent charity, registered in England and Wales no 1154217, founded in 2013 by Churches Together in Cobham, Oxshott, Stoke D'Abernon and Surrounding Areas.

The Foodbank subscribes to the national network of over 400 food banks co-ordinated and advised by the Trussell Trust, a Christian charity in Salisbury. Trussell has devised, and Cobham Area Foodbank follows, a system whereby people who find themselves without the wherewithal to buy food, for whatever reason, can obtain a food voucher from a voucher issuer, who may be a school welfare officer, a Jobcentre, a housing benefit officer, a minister of religion or other professional, who will be able to verify the need expressed. The voucher details the number and ages of people to receive food, and records the reason why their need has arisen. These details are fed into a national Trussell Trust database.

The Foodbank has collection bins in all the local churches and some other premises including Waitrose, Starbucks and Sainsbury's, and it invites donations of non-perishable food, which are collected in the Foodbank van (pictured below) and taken to the Foodbank warehouse at Brook Willow Farm, Leatherhead, where it is weighed and sorted by types and best-before dates. The Foodbank does not distribute fresh or out-of-date food.

Every Friday morning the van collects sufficient food for the week's distribution, which takes place in the Foodbank's 'pop-up café' at Cobham Methodist Church, open from midday to 1.30pm. In the last year we have distributed on average 1/3 tonne of food per week, providing food for 960 adults and 732 children - an average of 32 people per week. We are noticing an increase in numbers - around Christmas there were weeks where we provided food for between 60 and 70 people, and distributed over 1/2 tonne of food.

All the clients live locally, in Cobham, Oxshott, Stoke D'Abernon, or Downside. The area served by the Foodbank has been extended in the last year also to include East and West Horsley, Ockham and Effingham. St Martin's, East Horsley, Horsley Evangelical Church, Effingham Methodist Church, and Posh Wash dry cleaners are all now collecting food.

Where people for whatever reason cannot come to our distribution centre, we deliver their food at home. The volunteers who serve in the distribution centre and those who do home deliveries all undergo special training in order that they treat clients appropriately, warmly and with respect.

The governing principles are 'there but for the grace of God go I', and Jesus' great second commandment, to love thy neighbour as thyself.

The Foodbank does not judge or advise its clients in any way, save only that there is a display of 'signposts' to various forms of advice and assistance.

The Foodbank does not impose any limit to the number of food parcels any client can receive. The only criterion is need. Particularly where many clients are working, but in low-paid and uncertain jobs, living in privately rented accommodation where rents rise but housing benefits have been cut or capped, (or are otherwise harmed by government austerity, as graphically shown by the recent award-winning film 'I, Daniel Blake'), the Foodbank trustees consider that ideas of reducing 'dependency' are usually cruel and to be avoided. Most Foodbank clients have no chance of getting themselves out of poverty.



There are around 60 active volunteers working in the Foodbank, in transport (drivers and mates), warehouse and the distribution centre. There are no paid employees. The Foodbank is administered by a General Manager, Hugh Bryant, who also manages transport and is assisted by a volunteer coordinator and distribution manager, Christina Van Roest, and a warehouse

manager, Jane Olsen. Hugh reports to a board of trustees chaired by Revd Godfrey Hilliard, including Hugh, Christina, Peter Wall and the treasurer, Claire Smith.

The Foodbank is most grateful for the support it receives financially from the churches, from various grants and generous individuals. It needs around £15,000 per year in order to meet its costs for warehouse rental, hire purchase and depreciation of the van, insurances and periodic needs to purchase food, where donations have not provided items needed in order to provide nutritionally-balanced food parcels. ### World Health Day



**World Health Day** is celebrated on **7th April** every year to mark the anniversary of the founding of the **World Health Organization.** 

It's a unique opportunity to mobilize action around a specific health topic of concern to people all over the world. The theme for 2017's campaign is **depression**.

Depression affects people of all ages, from all walks of life, in all countries. It causes mental anguish and impacts on people's ability to carry out even the simplest everyday tasks, with sometimes devastating consequences for relationships with family and friends and the ability to earn a living. At worst, depression can lead to suicide, now the second leading cause of death among 15-29-year olds.

Yet, depression can be prevented and treated. A better understanding of what depression is, and how it can be prevented and treated, will help reduce the stigma associated with the condition, and lead to more people seeking help.

# An update from LYP

A new year is here and as always, LYP is full of excitement. In the last year, we have grown considerably, and are reaching even more young people.

As you may know, Martin Fuller took over from Jay Bristow in 2015 with the running of Triumph and Cell Group, our ecumenical faith projects, and these groups have both seen an increase in size in that time. We're really pleased with the progress of the young people, who seem to have fun and enjoy the sessions, and who have formed a really positive community together.



You may not know that LYP is now a team of 8 staff, having launched our One to One counselling and mentoring scheme in 2015 which is a partnership initiative with Surrey County Council, offering early help to the most vulnerable young people to ensure they are supported before things reach breaking point. This project extends across all of Mole Valley, and allows our team to work alongside young people within all five secondary schools in the district and other locations to provide much needed emotional support. Our One to One team is made up of Jude Crome, Alex Ball and Aura Cole.

More recently, in September 2016, we launched the new Bookham Youth Project, which is being headed up by our experienced youth worker Oli Bell. Similarly to our beginnings in 2005 in Leatherhead, three Bookham Churches worked together last year to identify a need for faith and community youth projects in Bookham, which had its open-access community youth work withdrawn by Surrey County Council in 2015. Part of this work will involve revitalising the Bookham Youth Centre and making sure there are high quality evening youth club sessions for local young people, as well as working within Churches and Schools. This is an exciting step for LYP; we're proud that our work has been recognised and valued enough to be replicated in Bookham, and we welcome the opportunity to reach more young people.

To replace Oli in Leatherhead, we've recruited Mikey Dicken, a long time volunteer with us at LYP, and Martyina Harnden, who completed her youth work degree in 2016 on the same university course as Martin at Oasis College. Both bring new skills and experience to our team, and provide much needed energy for the 45-50 young people we currently have through the doors each day at BFree.

We will continue writing regular updates in the magazine, and if you have any questions about our work you are always most welcome to pop into All Saints for a coffee.

### HRH The Earl of Wessex visits local charities - Leatherhead Youth Project and Community Foundation for Surrey

Leatherhead, Surrey, Thursday 23rd February 2017 - On 23rd February 2017, HRH The Earl of Wessex KG GCVO visited local charities Leatherhead Youth Project and the Community Foundation for Surrey. This was an opportunity for The Earl to hear more about the important work undertaken by both organisations. Leatherhead Youth Project (LYP) hosted the event at All Saints Church in Leatherhead, which the group transformed into their state of the art youth facility in 2005. The Community Foundation hosted His Royal Highness during a previous visit made to coincide with its five-year anniversary in 2011.

On this special visit, HRH met staff, trustees, donors and groups supported by the Community Foundation for Surrey. By working with donors who want to give back to their local communities, the Community Foundation awards grants to disadvantaged individuals and voluntary groups that provide vital services for people in need. Thanks to the generous and continuing support of their donors, the total figure awarded in grants across Surrey has increased each year with over £1million being distributed to local communities in 2015/16 alone.

The Earl then met young people and staff associated with Leatherhead Youth Project. This included young people who attend the BFree after- school drop-in project, a hub that is open every day for young people aged 11-17. It also included those who benefit from One to One counselling provided by LYP. During his visit, the Earl was served by the Allsaints Coffee Shop team, a group of young apprentices who run the LYP on-site social enterprise. Before departing, HRH unveiled a commemorative plaque to mark the visit.

The two charities have partnered together for over 10 years, having both formed in 2005. During this time, the Community Foundation has made various strategic grants to support the growth of LYP. This includes supporting the launch of AllSaints Coffee Shop, in 2014.

Joe Crome, General Manager of Leatherhead Youth Project commented: "We were delighted to host The Earl of Wessex and to share this special event for both organisations. This visit was very special for our young people, and something they will always remember.

It has been a chance for them to share what they have gained from their involvement with our youth work programmes and celebrate the personal progress they have made with LYP. # Home from Home?

Not quite! At the beginning of March I spent six days in St Helier Hospital. Such a grim building from the outside but everything you expect in care, kindness and consideration once inside the doors.

For three and a bit days I was in captivity in the Surgical Assessment Unit and watched the World and his wife go about their business with cheerfulness and efficiency. I say 'captivity' as I was on an intravenous drip of antibiotics in one arm. Wearing a hospital gown which fitted where it touched and moving around wheeling the drip support in one hand and with my stick in the other, I was never quite sure I was decent from behind! Mind boggling!

'People watching' is a great occupation! Little Nurse Annie never seemed to stop, whether wiping, tidying or bed making. You name it, Annie did it! Nurse Claudia, the blackest lady I have ever seen, danced as she worked, wiggling her quite substantial bottom, waving her arms singing all the time under her breath. Happiness in motion! And the young Greek nurse, newly arrived just two months ago, patiently feeding a patient, encouraging her quietly with 'just one more mouthful'. Very humbling. I couldn't do it. She told me she was here for job security, enabling her to send money home to her family to help better their lives. Poverty in Greece, she said, was harsh.

Patients were just as diverse. There was the tiniest little Japanese lady who spoke not a word of English, but sat in her bed smiling all the time and shaking hands with whoever stopped by. One evening a terrified lady was admitted. She didn't know her name and didn't know who she was. She resisted anyone who tried to touch her. The patience and tolerance of those attending her was unbelievable - hours and hours! Gracious me, they need our prayers in bundles!

On Sunday night there was an emergency in A&E so, at one o'clock in the morning, I was trundled through a labyrinth of corridors and up to the 4th floor to a bed in the Day Surgery Unit. Just about asleep again, I was woken at 4 o'clock for a BP check. It hardly seemed worth trying to sleep again before ward rounds began soon after six!

You certainly need a great deal of stamina to survive a stay in hospital. I'm a bit weak but at home, enjoying the peace and quiet.



### The real message of Easter

'When you die, that's it. Nothing. Out like a light.' That's what the man in the pub said, and his mates all nodded, though the one whose mother had died the week before wasn't really quite so certain.

Still, it seemed to make sense. After all, we know what 'dead' means: dead leaves, dead batteries, dead fish, dead pets . . . and dead people, to be honest. While we recognise that it's all too easy to go from alive to dead, we've got serious doubts about the possibility of any return journeys.

Which is why Christians have an uphill task at Easter. Jesus was a great man, and people want to remember how He died. Fair enough. But it starts getting complicated when Christians insist that Jesus died but *didn't stay dead* - in fact, that He's alive now. That 'return journey' has happened, they say.

That's the problem about Easter. Christians persisting in what sounds like a ridiculous belief. If they just dropped the resurrection bit, and concentrated on the wonderful teaching of Jesus and His example of generosity, compassion and love then everybody would find Christianity much more believable. Wouldn't that make sense? And wouldn't that fill the churches again?

Well it might (or, more likely, it might not). But in any case, the trouble is that it wouldn't be Christianity at all. The faith of Christians actually depends on the resurrection of Jesus, and always has done, right from the earliest days. After the crucifixion the body of Jesus was taken down from the cross by some of His friends and put in a rock tomb with a heavy stone. But after His death, His followers claimed that they had met Him, seen Him, talked with Him.

So certain was their belief that nothing could make them recant it. Not ridicule, not torture, not even death itself. They couldn't do it because they were absolutely convinced that it had happened. Plenty of clever and powerful people at the time had a vested interest in proving them wrong. It shouldn't have been difficult to prove that a dead man had stayed dead, especially when you have at your disposal the resources of the greatest empire in history. Yet they didn't do it, because it couldn't be done.

Still today millions of people all over the world believe that Jesus did in fact rise from the dead. They include brilliant scientists and philosophers as well as plenty of 'ordinary' men and women of all ages. They believe it because they respect the witness of those first Christians, and because in many cases their own lives have been transformed by a relationship with Jesus - that wouldn't make sense if He were dead!

Christians don't put their faith in a dead hero from the past, but in Someone who is alive and active in their own lives and in the world. That, in a nutshell, is the real message of Easter.


