From Rev Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

It seems rather ironic this year that April Fools Day is on Easter morning. Of course, we have heard some wonderful stories particularly in the newspapers that have given rise to a second glance on this particular day. Remember last year when "Virgin Trains announced the launch of an innovative new contactless ticket system, called Tick- Ink that lets customers have their season tickets tattooed on their body."

Or how about the grand national shakeup where trials at Aintree suggested that horses could improve their performance by wearing headphones with piped music, trainers indicated that "headphones could become as common place as blinkers and nose bands in the future. The Jockey club said there is always a place for fresh ideas."

Better still what about George Osborne who reignited the row over his multiple business commitments by "speaking to the Advisory Committee on Business Appointments, launching his own brand of high quality, hi visibility industrial garments aimed at the multitasking CEO's."

The incredibility of it all must have filled the atmosphere with an astonished silence and there are those of us today who are still trying to make sense of it all. Like the disciples we are still trying to unravel its complexities and the reality of what we see.

An American writer Josh McDowell once said "No matter how devastating our struggles, disappointments, and troubles are, they are only temporary. No matter what happens to you, no matter the depth of tragedy or pain you face, no matter how death stalks you and your loved ones, the Resurrection promises you a future of immeasurable good."

Is the resurrection just about eternal life? Or has the resurrection got something to say about life here and now, the everyday. Or is there something here about God bridging the gap between humanity and divinity?

The resurrection offers us an inauguration, breaking boundaries, the beginning of a kingdom here on earth that speaks of liberation from the old, which ventures into the new, of life beyond death, both in the eternal realms and in the here and now. New beginnings and fresh understandings. It is exciting and it is invigorating because there is always hope beyond what we see and what we know, we may not always understand it but we can be assured it is a promise we are given, God has no boundaries, his power is limitless and his love for us seen in all his glory!!!

Dear Friends

So are you off on a journey around Easter time? Will you be going on holiday? When I was young we travelled on holiday by car, and so it was a very special treat to go somewhere by train, to be able to watch the different places flash by out of the window. There were always much more interesting places to see through the train windows than through the car windows, and we didn't have to worry about the route or getting lost, both of which we did very frequently!

Neither did my parents have to endure the perennial children's refrain: "Are we nearly there yet?" This year, as for the past several years, we will be going to the ECG conference in Scarborough. This is always a spiritually refreshing time.

The journey that we have made through Lent together towards Easter is one of the most meaningful times of our Christian year. Here in Leatherhead we have had the privilege of meeting together in ecumenical Lent groups. We sometimes give up things in order to help us reflect on our own spiritual lives and where we stand before God (if you have done this then I encourage you to give the money you didn't spend to a charity of your choice).

We try to ask ourselves hard questions and hopefully to be honest before God in our answers. At times through the weeks of Lent I sometimes want to ask with the child I once was "Are we nearly there yet?".

We have journeyed with Jesus towards Jerusalem, to the Cross and beyond. A journey through death into life, and at last now as we have come to Easter Day we stand at the end of the journey. Or is it at the beginning? Together we celebrate the glorious truth of the resurrection, the very heart and cornerstone of our faith. As we enter into this truth again, and as the light of the risen Christ illuminates our lives, we can know with absolute certainty that each of us find ourselves loved beyond measure for the person we are, because we serve a Saviour whose love knows no limits. Not only that, but this love is the same yesterday, today, tomorrow and always, in a very real way in our lives. We can rely on this even in the darkest of times.




Finding your inner Easter Bunny!







THE STRANGER on the Road to Emmaus by John R. Cross

The title of this useful book refers to the events recorded in the Gospel of Luke, chapter 24, verses 13 to 35. Two disciples, Cleopas and his companion, are walking home to Emmaus from Jerusalem on the first Easter Day. They encounter a stranger who turns out to be the risen Jesus. He walks with them and asks them what they are discussing. They tell Him they are talking about the crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth. They are horrified by this event because they had hoped that He was the one who would redeem Israel. The stranger rebukes them for their ignorance of what the prophets had spoken. And beginning with Moses and the Prophets, He explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning Himself. (Luke 24:27).

The quoted verse explains the purpose of the book. During the three years of the ministry of Jesus His disciples had never fully grasped what He was about. The book acknowledges that there are many Christians today who have a similar difficulty. The author explains that the Bible is a unique collection of 66 books, written in 3 languages, over a span of 1500 years, involving over 40 authors from many walks of life and which contains many controversial topics. And yet they were writing in total harmony about one unfolding story.

The unfolding story is told in the book simply and without theological jargon as intended by the author. He does this in fewer than 300 pages with many illustrations and easy-to-use diagrams.


The book begins right at the beginning with the Creation, Adam and Eve and Cain and Abel which, of course, are essential if we are to understand the place of sin in this long story. We never lose sight of sin and sacrifice and sacrifice always receives careful attention all the way to the last sacrifice of all.

Inevitably, in condensing the 1200 pages of the standard Bible to 300, there are many gaps in the story. So Judges, Kings, Chronicles and the Prophets together are covered in fewer than 10 pages. But this does not detract from the purpose of the book and we are brought without loss of comprehension to the New Testament and the end of the story which is, of course, the story of Jesus Christ – and yes, this did begin with Genesis chapter 1. The last two chapters of the book are an explanation of the Emmaus Road message and the reason why Jesus had to die.

I recommend this book to anybody who may think that the Bible is just a succession of disjointed stories or who wonders what connects the Old Testament to the New. It will also prove a useful refresher for those who feel they need it.




