

From Rev Jan Hofmeyr

Dear Friends,

"The Seven Words from the Cross" have been preached about and written about many times. Many years ago I heard a different slant on these words of Jesus from the cross. They were applied to us as humans as we approach our death, just as Jesus uttered them as He approached His death.

The first words of Jesus on Calvary were the words He spoke as He was being nailed to the cross – "Father forgive them; they do not know what they are doing". Jesus spoke a word of forgiveness. In a similar way as we approach death, it is important for us to offer for-giveness to any against whom we harbour a grudge or unforgiveness. We cannot die in peace if we have not made peace with others. If those we need to forgive have already died or their whereabouts are unknown, we nonetheless need to tell the Lord of our offer of for-giveness in order to 'clear the slate' from our side.

The second word of Jesus from the cross is about receiving forgiveness. As the penitent thief on the cross next to Jesus received an assurance of forgiveness, so too may we need to ask for forgiveness – from the Lord and maybe from other people. To die in peace, we need to know our own sins forgiven.

Jesus then addresses His mother and His friend John when He says, "Mother, here is your son; son here is your mother." Jesus knew that Mary would need care and support; He also knew that John, still a young man, would need love and assistance. They would help each other through the difficult days ahead. A common concern for people who are dying is whether those they are leaving behind will be able to cope. Having the assurance that they will, can help them to approach death with a greater sense of peace.

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Another important aspect of Mary and John's presence at the cross is the fact that people generally want to know that they will have one or more loved ones with them when they die. It is touching to think that Jesus' last earthly glimpse was of His mother and one of His closest disciples.

Then there is the mysterious cry of Jesus, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Even those with the strongest faith are prone to feel at times, as they approach death, that God has abandoned them. They need to know that it is a very natural response to all that they are going through. They need to remember that Jesus understands their feelings, for He has experienced them Himself.

Fifthly Jesus says, "I thirst". The physical needs of people remain important right to the end, especially relief from physical pain. One of the things that Mother Theresa sought to do for the 'untouchables' of Calcutta was to give them a place to die with dignity and to tend to their physical needs. One of those physical needs is touch and as a dying person loses more and more contact with the world around them, physical touch provides an important source of comfort and reassurance.

Then Jesus calls out, "It is finished!" It is a cry of triumph as Jesus expresses the fact that He has accomplished everything He came to earth to do. To die well it helps a great deal to be able to complete as much of any 'unfinished business' as possible. Unfinished business may range from practical matters such as finalising one's will or completing some project to speaking to a particular person. Some people like to be able to recount their life story and maybe have it written down for posterity.

Finally, Jesus says, 'Father, into your hands I commit My spirit'. It is a prayer of trust in a loving and gracious Father. For us to die in peace it helps greatly to come to the point of acceptance and trust as we commit ourselves into God's gracious care. And Easter reminds us that the Father's love and care are beyond measure.

Dear Friends,

As any good decorator will know, a plumb line is often a crucial bit of equipment. It is a device that ensures a vertical line, it can be as simple as a piece of string with a weight on the end of it. It points directly downwards offering the decorator, for example, a line to adhere to when hanging wallpaper. It's ingenious in its simplicity.

I loved the way Nick Cuthbert, author of such books as 'How to Survive and Thrive as a Church Leader' (sounds interesting!), offered a group of ministers a powerpoint presentation, his first slide read these words 'Change is difficult, not changing is fatal.' It certainly grabbed our attention, as you can imagine. The question "Why are we here?" Is perhaps one of the most important questions the church needs to ask itself, it seems that once we know the answer, it then enables us to know where we are going, and indeed what strategy is needed to move us in the right direction.

Nick Cuthbert uses the plumb line as a symbolic tool when he thinks of mission. If we know the line which we are called to adhere to, i.e. we know why we are here, we make sure that everything is aligned to it. Then if we discover an aspect of church life which gravitates away from the line, we are challenged to ask how we can move it from where it is to where it needs to be. If our energy is being placed in something that doesn't quite fit much of what we have agreed to do, then perhaps some trimming is needed. So what is God's why for the church? What is the plumb line by which we find our central focus?

I suspect a quick glance at our vision and mission statements might give us some ready answers to such a question; at the United Church we've said it is to '*Love God, Love others, Serve the world in Christ's name'*. However, even that is driven by a much deeper sense of understanding.

In the journey towards Good Friday and Easter Sunday it is in recognizing who Christ is, and the power by which he is able to rise beyond death, that excites us and propels us onwards, for the plumb line points towards a place of divinity and humanity, for they are

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
intrinsically linked. We meet with a Christ who is both human and divine; it is in that place that we find our identity as disciples of Christ, our sense of purpose and our focus that points directly to God. Just as Christ pointed others to the Father so we too are called to point others to God.

Good Friday and Easter Sunday have always been for me a time of passionate engagement, it is a time when my emotions are raw and when jubilation waits around the corner to lift me beyond my deep sadness to a place of extraordinary abundance.

The Easter journey is all about life and death, endings and new beginnings. I suspect that it also reminds us to whom we belong and to whom we should look.

Wishing you all every abundant blessing in the risen Christ







Do you sympathise with Peter, who was so afraid that he'd be recognised as one of his followers, that he denied Christ three times before the cock crowed ?


How do you feel about Judas ? Did he earn his vilification or could there be other explanations for his actions ?




LMC General Church Meeting

Memories of John Rayner

Mike and I first met John and Olive Ravner when we moved to Bookham in 1992. They were very involved not only in the local United Reformed Church but also in all levels of the denomination. When they realised that we had moved into a house with a garden needing much attention they brought us plants. A healthy fuchsia bush in our front garden still thrives to this day. Sometime later when Bookham Church was due to have a new hall floor, Mike mentioned to John that his father had made a shed out of a church hall floor back in our home town of Cardiff. John planned out the various parts of a shed on the floor and had them cut out. Along with an old door from the manse that shed stands steadfastly in our garden some 25 years later. John was an Elder at Bookham URC for many years and oversaw all the maintenance and upkeep of the church, the hall and the manse. He and Olive often undertook many of the renovations and repairs themselves. When they transferred their membership to Christ Church, Leatherhead their skills were soon in demand with John once again becoming an Elder and looking after the properties.

When in 2002 I was persuaded to become secretary of the Wimbledon District Council of the URC John was the treasurer and we spent many an hour travelling back and forth to the Southern Synod Office in Croydon, to District Council Meetings held at various churches and to other meetings linked to the District and Synod. Initially John would drive but as his eyesight deteriorated, I did the driving. During this time, he would tell me about the churches and the folk within the District and Synod. Becoming District Secretary involved a steep learning curve for me and John helped me immensely. He had a wealth of knowledge and I was only too happy to glean some of it. Eventually John had to give up this work, but he remained very interested in the wider URC and it often formed the basis of our conversations in later years.

When Olive died a few years ago John coped reasonably well with help and even managed to walk to the Bookham church if we were unable to take him to Christ Church. However, after a fall when he broke his arm his health began to deteriorate. A spell in hospital highlighted the need for full time care and he eventually entered a care home in Cobham. Although his sight was poor and his hearing was impaired he could always manage a smile and would often attempt to relate one of his stories.

God in the Sciences: The Beauty of Good Friday

Some of the most beautiful things in the world have an ugly side. What about the emperor penguin chick, nestling in a feathery pouch above its parent's feet? There's a lovely moment when mum and dad greet each other over the gaping beak of their fuzz-ball offspring. Heads bent together, making a heart shape in the air, we can't help seeing a reflection of our own ideals of love in the pair.

But the reality of what those birds are going through is even more gruelling than human parenthood. Father penguin has spent all winter sheltering the egg from freezing hurricane-force winds, while mother penguin was feeding at sea. When the chick hatched its parents started an exhausting game of tag, taking it in turns to walk across the ice and risk being eaten by leopard seals or killer whales in order to catch fish for their new offspring.

The living world is truly wonderful in so many ways, but the darker side of the picture is never far away. Creation is groaning (Romans 8:22), and waiting to be rescued. Enter Jesus, through whom all of creation was made. The king of the universe came to live with us, bringing His great love and wisdom to the human population of first -century Israel. The Creator was relating to His creation in a very personal way, and this could have been a totally beautiful picture.

But there is a horrifically ugly side of Jesus' story that threatens to obscure the beauty of what He did on Good Friday. It was a brutal and terrifying day when human sinfulness resulted in the Son of God being executed by His enemies, but thankfully there was much more to it than that. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ set off a seismic wave of spiritual events whose effects are still rippling out across the world.

So that ugly day nearly 2,000 years ago is called 'good' because of what it achieved. Those who follow Jesus find their lives are changed for the better, even if their day-to-day existence may still be incredibly tough. When people come to understand what creation is for and who it belongs to, they can begin to serve and preserve the earth as they should. These things are only whispers of what is to come, but they give me hope for the future redemption of all Creation. I can choose to dwell on the beauty of Jesus' death because it was not the end of the story – the future beckons.

If God took away his angels, his grace, his promise of eternity, his servants what would the world be like? In a word Hell !
