The Ministers Write...

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

Colin and I arrived here at this pastorate as a family of four with Samuel and Joel. Three of the children remained in Birmingham: Karl, Krisstion and Lianne. With Karl already having returned home after being made redundant earlier this year, and Lianne now facing the same issues, it looks as though the Plumpton household is about to expand even further. Although it raises all sorts of accommodation issues, someone made the remark "*isn't it wonderful that they want to come home and that they have a home to come to*". It's true; they will come to a home where they will find security away from the uncertainty that life has presented to them recently.

My mind then wanders to the many we have seen in the Philippines, where a sheet of canvas is the best they might hope for to call home - the aftermath of the storm which raged across the many small islands out in the Pacific. Their homes are gone and for some it will be a while before they can rebuild, or even overcome the sense of loss they feel. For others their livelihoods have also been swept away and life is full of uncertainty. These images are sadly a familiar sight. Over recent months we've seen the devastation that occurs in war torn countries, and we've also seen those who make the precarious journey across deserts and seas who never make it to a place that one day might feel like home. "There were 28.8 million Internally Displaced People around the world" (UNHCR figures for 2012).

It is hard for us to imagine that kind of reality; it is far removed from the comfort that many of us experience. I am then led to think of the Christmas story and the way in which Christ is born into the very heart of a displaced community in Bethlehem, for no other reason than the census, and then an <u>angel</u> appears to Joseph and warns him to take Jesus and his mother into Egypt (<u>Matthew 2:13</u>). Forced to find a home in a foreign land, I wonder what kind of welcome he received.

But it is in the very heart of displacement that we find Christ and the beginnings of a journey that will mean hope for humankind. For the darkness shall not overcome the light, for Christ enters our messy world and challenges us to find God wherever we might be and whatever circumstances we are in. For those who we know are struggling, they do not make the journey alone for we are not passive spectators because we are Christ's representatives on this earth. In our giving, our prayers, our loving, Christ is made known this Christmas, giving birth to hope that may not have been seen until now. Love is born this Christmas and the world will not be the same again.

For our families and the warmth of our homes this Christmas we give God thanks. Colin, the children and I send you every blessing this Christmas.

The story about the possible closure of the A&E department at Epsom Hospital was on the local news yesterday evening. I'm sure this has been running for some time before I moved here. We feel as if we have been watching and waiting for a long time now!

Watching and waiting are strong themes in this season of Advent, which we enter into at the beginning of December with our preparations to celebrate again the birth of Christ. Sometimes it seems that our focus on Christmas is so strong that we forget to stop and stay awhile in the waiting place. We so are eager to get on with everything, for there's so much to be done, and so little time to do it all in. It's not always easy to wait, is it? But Advent, these weeks in the run up to Christmas, is God's "waiting place". It's the time when we can prepare not only our homes, presents and food, but also and more importantly, our minds and our hearts for the coming of Jesus anew into our lives. I challenge you to make time to stop and take a few minutes here and there during this time of Advent preparation to reflect on the amazing truth that God loves each of us enough to make all things new. This begins in us, as we welcome the baby who came at Christmas, and we will find that we too can experience God's love, helping and freeing us to be the people he wants us to be. As I drove on I wondered why there are so many lights so early this year? And what kind of people live in the houses behind those lights? Did those lights illuminate the homes of both those who did and did not proclaim Jesus as the Christ-child?

I would like to believe that the lights that I saw were expressions of defiance in the face of dark times whether it be poverty at home, or earthquakes in China and flooding in the Philippines not to mention war and rumours of war that still encircle our world. I would like to believe that they are tangible statements that when all is increasingly dark there is always hope. I would like to believe that they are an attempt on the part of believers and non-believers alike to affirm that, at this Christmastime, there is goodness and tidings of great joy to be had.

We all need to defy the darkness. We all need hope. For me, the lights of Christmas provide this. Even as I get older the anticipation of the birth of the Christ-child grows. I find it so exciting to prepare for Christmas by hanging lights and decorating trees and preparing gifts for those you love. I drive my husband mad! But I find it even more exciting knowing that the reason for my eagerness is that a time is coming when the whole world will have hope. It is because of the birth of the Light of the World at the first Christmas. It is because of his life, death and resurrection and his promise to come again. It is because he is present in the hearts of all those who believe in him through his Spirit that the world can have hope and change and be at peace.

The growth of food banks in our local Churches working in co-operation with local authorities, the increasing numbers of people involved in Street Pastors, those supporting the homeless through night shelters are all testament to the fact that our world is hopeful. The light of the world has truly come!

May His light shine from your homes this Christmastime and in all the seasons of your days.

CCC (Cobham Community Church) joined us and led us in Worship, only it was different too - we had a united choir of (eventually) eight, a Worship Group of two, three drummers and six dancers! There was no "us and them", we were all followers of Jesus, Praising God for the Fruits of His Creation. We shared the Peace, (which took about 20 minutes and left Kim wondering how to get us all back to our seats!) and we gave each other Communion. Our service lasted two hours but nobody noticed, it was just awesome. We then had lunch and the singing continued. The food was just unbelievable; Filipinos believe that it is their sole purpose in life to feed you! We all had a fantastic time together, check out the Website to see all the photos.

So when does Christmas start?



In department stores it starts in mid-July! By October 'festive tunes' are everywhere and the doors open on Santa's grotto. Then Christmas ads on the telly, but retailers are out of step with customers because for most

people the season starts on 1st December. That's when it's OK to start writing cards and dig out the decorations from the attic.

Don't let the High Street set the agenda. Let's stop the spread of **"Winterval"**. In Churches, the season starts on Advent Sunday. That's when we light the first candle on the Advent wreath and when we start thinking about Christ's first and second coming.

Let's hold *Christmas Starts Sunday* on Advent Sunday and make it the 'official' start of the season. That way the Church can start to reclaim ownership of Christmas and remind people that *Christmas Starts with Christ*. Because the statistics are shocking:

Just 12 per cent of adults know the nativity story in any detail and more than one third of children don't know whose birthday we are celebrating. And 51 per cent of people say that the birth of Jesus is irrelevant to their Christmas. We need to send a message to our nation.

There are 40,000 Churches in the UK. 40,000 jigsaw pieces. Imagine if we could put them all together. What a picture that

would make! A giant, Christ-centred Christmas card. One that could be seen by our whole nation. That's what the *Christmas Starts with Christ* campaign is all about: the Reason for the Season... So use the posters on the website to advertise your events this Christmas.

Dear Friends,

At a Sunday School party the teacher had put out a plate of chocolate biscuits with a notice saying "Take only one. God is watching." On the other end of the table was a plate of fairy cakes by which one of the children had placed the notice, "Take as many cakes as you want. God is watching the biscuits."

One of the many differences between we human beings and God is that we cannot focus our attention on more than a few things at once, whereas God is aware of everything at the same time. Or is he...?

Do you ever have that experience of being so absorbed in an activity that you are oblivious to everything else? It may be a hobby that requires your utmost concentration. It may be a compelling story (in a book or on TV) which draws you away from everyday life into a different world of adventure or romance or history. It may be that you enter the vast world of the internet with its online chats, its social networking and its virtual realities.

There are times when we know in the back of our mind that we are in reality sitting in a chair at home, but it feels as if we are somewhere else. Our minds are on the quality of the sunlight on the hills as we try to turn one of our holiday snaps into a watercolour painting. Our hearts are stirred by the plucky heroine as she boards the train which will take her towards her long-lost love. Our thoughts are with our friends as we reminisce about last night's party and share our photos on Facebook.

For a brief while, these things which absorb our attention seem to be 'reality' and who is to say that such a view is wrong. After all, whenever we talk to someone on the phone, what is the reality? Are we really having a conversation? Or are we each just responding to noises produced by a tiny loudspeaker in a plastic case? Telephones really do bring distant people right into our homes!

So it makes me wonder how 'real' it was for God to focus his attention on our world when he became human in Jesus. Being God, did he regard his visit to our planet as only a kind temporary focus of his attention, whilst all along still being absorbed in the business of being God and keeping the whole of creation ticking over?

Surely, the whole point of Christmas is that God coming to earth as one of us was a real event. From God's perspective as well as from our's. Jesus certainly seemed to be aware of his divine nature. (If the events surrounding his birth weren't enough to go by, there was the voice at his baptism – "this is my Son.") But I am sure that Jesus didn't go through life with the kind of awareness that God has of all things spread throughout time and space. In Jesus, God focused his attention on the human race. He entered into our story. He became one with us. He lived life from our perspective.

Trying to imagine things from God's viewpoint isn't easy. It's enough to blow our minds. But accepting the wonder of God becoming a man only requires us to pay attention to the Christmas story and to become absorbed in it. The story of the baby in the manger is a familiar one, but don't let it become just a background to the celebrations of Christmas.

Take the opportunities offered through carol services and nativity plays to enter into the story, to focus on what really did happen long ago, and to respond to God in wonder and praise.

A couple of weeks ago we had a very successful meeting at the Chapel which showed there was real local interest and some expertise to enable us to run a **monthly Messy Church** in Effingham village, hopefully starting in January 2014. A steering committee has been formed and there are already enough volunteers to get started. So our fingers are crossed and we would appreciate lots of prayers for the right venue and funding.

Saturday Morning Live, our village's monthly Café Church, continues to grasp some thorny issues. In November we're discussing **Women's Role in the Church**, and our speaker is a **Chaplain at Royal Holloway College**, who has followed many of her family into the Ministry. Then in December it's **Doing Christmas differently**?

Churches Together have arranged Advent meetings, and our carol-singing will be in aid of CRISIS as usual. We also hope our Posada figures of Joseph and a very pregnant Mary on her donkey will be in local schools and homes to remind them of the real meaning of Christmas.

Meanwhile several ideas from our **Vision Day** are already being implemented. The Church Council supported a proposal for more stewards to run the Chapel as a team, more like the URC's Elders. The Bible Study group is now meeting with Kim for lunch, followed by a discussion of topical Christian issues, and how the Bible can often help us to resolve problems. We have also formed a sub-committee to decide how to celebrate our **160th Chapel Anniversary**, and the **170th Anniversary of our Society in 2014**. *Ange Putland*

Just follow the instructions on the website about how to create a page in **About Us** -**How to add a page** and enter photographs of your memorial with the list of names recorded, and anything known about them, especially family or Church stories and any photos. Sam's Story

"The Sycamore Tree course was not only the most relevant and important part of my rehabilitation; it was, without a doubt, the vital step on my journey towards Jesus. My life was an emotionless, asocial, dark tale of criminality, heroin addiction and prison. I never concerned myself with the consequences of my lifestyle; my victims were faceless and without feelings. I failed to acknowledge their existence; they became mere objects to be ignored or perhaps hated. Before Jesus, I never experienced love.

"My childhood was one of poverty, violence and drug abuse. My mother was too busy battling her own demons to worry too much about me or my sisters. I quickly learned that I was better off alone. I isolated myself and soon found the warm intimacy of heroin addiction. I was totally addicted by the time I was 12.

"I quickly climbed the criminal ladder and am now serving an IPP for robbing a security van. Although I had spent 10 years in various prisons, I never contemplated a normal lifestyle. I had done a number of offending behaviour courses, but they had no real impact on me. Human logic is no match for Satan, and he had me firmly in a mentality of bitterness and hatred.

"The seed of the Sycamore Tree course took a while to germinate, but it flourished quickly. There was a lovely courageous woman who suffered from cerebral palsy. I experienced real compassion for this woman when she described the ordeal of being burgled. That could have been me. I could have caused all that pain, made this amazing woman cry like that. Suddenly the full weight of my sin and its consequences came crashing down on top of me. She became all my victims, all the people I have burgled, the guy that got pistol-whipped, his mother, his children. They all suddenly became real people and they all condemned me for what I had put them through. The Sycamore Tree course brought into vivid reality the impact of my crimes and my addiction, and it nearly broke me.

"With that self-awareness came self-hatred and a realisation of the person I had become, and I knew I could not continue like that. The Sycamore Tree course showed me that I needed to think and act in new ways. The facilitators of Sycamore Tree are always in my prayers. I will never forget the people I met there as they have changed my life. Thank you." The above article comes from the summer 2012 edition of "Cellout" the magazine of "Prison Fellowship"

My greatest humiliation - being sent to prison - was the beginning of God's greatest use of my life...only when I lost everything I thought made Chuck Colson a great guy had I found the true self God intended me to be and the true purpose of my life. It is not what we do that matters, but what a sovereign God chooses to do through us. God doesn't want our success; He wants us. He doesn't demand our achievements; He demands our obedience...Victory comes through defeat; Healing through brokenness; Finding self through losing self."

"All are Welcome"

This was the theme of the MWiB Southern Area Day at Crowborough, at the end of October. Kim and I went.

Using her faithful sat-nav to guide, Kim found the Church. We knew it was the right place because the notice board said so. The place was deserted! We began to think we had the wrong date. The big glass doors into the Church were locked. We could see no-one inside. Eventually we found a side door open and a lady sitting at a table inside said "Please sign in, the day charge is £3!" Oh dear, what a welcome!

It <u>did</u> improve, but was, sadly, poorly attended. It had not been very well advertised. Nevertheless, despite low numbers, there was the usual quality expected at a MWiB event. Rev. Sheila Foreman led the day, and she is a gifted leader of long standing.

The day began with worship (in the rather chilly, unheated Church) led by a local lady. The depth of feeling it contained left us all with a warm glow inside and able to forget the cold exterior. Sheila briefly introduced the theme before we split into discussion groups. Kim and I were together in the much warmer Church hall. Sheila had posed four questions to guide our thinking:

- 1. How welcoming is my Church?
- 2. Does the welcome go beyond a handshake?
- 3. Do we always treat visitors as honoured guests?
- 4. How far does our hospitality go?

None of this was new to me. At LMC we have had many opportunities to discuss how we welcome people and what we can do to improve. How some could say: "Well, I am not a steward/door steward, so it is not my concern."? Surely 'welcome' and all it involves is a whole Church matter? We did hear other stories of magnificent welcomes received by ministers, local preachers and ordinary everyday folk. It was good to talk together.

For the afternoon session, we were all together in the hall. Still focussing on welcome, we were asked if some people were more welcome than others.

Sheila suggested that perhaps we were too inclined to pre-judge people who are 'different'. At LMC we do not often meet that problem (although I can think of some) so it was not a question that could be answered from experience. Sheila had a vast number of stories of occasions that had cropped up on her travels. At times, she was the one who was different, but was always made welcome, often as 'an honoured guest'. Worship rounded off the day, with a reminder that Christ's invitation was to all.

A reminder of the aims of Methodist Women in Britain:

- Bringing women together to know Christ and make him known.
- Encouraging, equipping and enabling women to serve God in the Church, the community and the world.
- Connecting women in Britain with women worldwide.



A reminder that we still collect used postage stamps, for *Lepra* and *Guide Dogs for the blind*.


Please put any used stamps, throughout the year, in the red "postage box" which you will find in the vestibule, opposite the James Todd room.


