

#### From Rev. Darlene McCarley

Dear Friends,

Some years ago I saw a DVD, 'Awakenings' and thought it very sad, but for Christmas I was given a copy of the book recounting the medical reports on which the film was based and discovered the real stories were even worse. It has made me think about some of the terrible trials people face in life: war, poverty, disability, illness, loss, physical and emotional pain. And I have been thinking too of what makes it possible to survive, let alone overcome life's trials and allow our souls to thrive.

The hospital doctor who, at the end of the 1960s, initiated the drug trial on which the story was based observed that three external things particularly aided patients in their battle not to be defeated by their illness: music, nature and relationships. The patients were often much more symptom free during a day out of the hospital, especially a day spent in the countryside (the hospital was in the middle of a city), or singing or attending concerts. But most beneficial of all was time spent with friends or family.

Dr Sacks said that during lucid periods many of his patients said the worst part of their 40 or more years of illness was the isolation. We live in a world where even healthy, fit people are becoming increasingly isolated. Too many children spend more time on mobiles and internet than interacting in person. More and more adults live alone. Someone has even invented a virtual wife! Local and village shops are disappearing and those neighbourhoods and villages are becoming places people leave, going elsewhere for shopping, education, work and social activities. More impersonal places, where they are less well known. 'Things' and activities are replacing people in our lives.

Christianity should above all else be about relationship; with God and with one another. And I believe that in our relationship with God lies the only real hope we have for seeing the true value and joy of life, of the world and people around us.

But that relationship, like all relationships, takes time and effort. The less we devote time and energy to nurturing our relationship with God the more likely we are to miss hearing his voice of comfort, wisdom and love when we encounter life's stumbling blocks. And the less use we will be to one another. So my new year resolution for 2017 is to have a gap year. A year off from all the things I normally worry about, try to achieve, and do to relax and 'destress', so I have time for God, and those he places in my path.

I know from experience that making a resolution to spend more time in bible study and prayer will simply not work if I try to do it on top of all the other things I do. So, I am going to drop other stuff in order to create the time I need – a God space in my life

Do you need more time with God? What could you give up or change to get that time?

In the light of your faith, what are your ambitions for this year?

#### From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

Here we are stepping into another year, I like to think full of potential and possibility. Yes, I know that there may well be some stumbling blocks along the way and I may even need help from others to climb over them. But I step into 2017 with anticipation, that I might learn something new in 2017 that was not made real to me in 2016, for we are always learning and that excites me.

I was fascinated recently by a book I had started to dip into in the hope it might provide some useful pointers for a discussion group. The book was called 'Does the bible really say that?'. The chapter that grabbed my attention was the one entitled 'Spiritual growth: how the church gets in the way.' I'm sure you can see why I was intrigued. Here's a little taster where Mark Woods talks about what he perceives to be a mature Christian after reflecting upon a bible study group: "Maturity wasn't measured by the quantity of knowledge that they gathered — I was ahead of them there — but by its quality. There was a texture about their faith, which had nothing to do with how much they knew, and everything to do with how it had helped to shape them into the people they were. The mature Christian isn't someone who can reel off a verse for every occasion and who knows exactly when to pull you up because what you've said isn't doctrinally "sound".

The mature Christian is someone who has lived fully and richly, and brought every part of his or her life into the presence of Christ and under his authority. Christian maturity isn't something separate from the development of our whole personhood, as though we can grow as Christians without growing as people. Growth is multifaceted, many layered and multidirectional, and far from it happening through church and church based activities, these can actually hinder it."

Although Mark Woods recognises the way in which church can expand our minds and spirits, he also refers to the way in which church can be all absorbing, our attention distracted by good intention. Too many meetings, too much emphasis on attendance at events, so busy keeping the church in order, or keeping our doctrine in nice neat boxes. What if we've become too orderly? Where might there be room for the unexpected or the surprises?

On reflection it's clear that growth happens when we spend time wrestling with the reality of life, where we engage with the mundane as well as complex issues and people. We become fully alive in Christ through life's experiences, where those experiences have transformed us and the gospel is made real to us.

The challenge for our churches is how we release people to grow into mature Christians outside the church as well as inside , how we break open the tidy and ordered structures of our churches and allow God to surprise us. We all need space to flourish but maybe it's not in the way we imagine it to be?

#### A Legend of St Valentine

The Roman Emperor Claudius II needed soldiers. He suspected that marriage made men want to stay at home with their wives, instead of fighting wars, so he outlawed marriage.

A kind-hearted young priest named Valentine felt sorry for all the couples who wanted to marry, but couldn't. So secretly he married as many couples as he could - until the Emperor found out and condemned him to death. While he was in prison awaiting execution, Valentine showed love and compassion to everyone around him, including his jailer. The jailer had a young daughter who was blind, but through Valentine's prayers, she was healed. Just before his death in Rome on 14 February, he wrote her a farewell message signed 'From your Valentine.'

So the very first Valentine card was not between lovers, but between a priest about to die, and a little girl, healed through his prayers.


#### **House Groups**

#### Ideas for Prayers in February Sometimes we need help to pray !

Perhaps you, like me, are often embarrassed by a huge wish list for family and friends, or depressed by War and worldwide events ?

For me, the **Methodist Prayer handbook** *Freedoms to Share*, is a useful focus for daily prayer. However many people gain inspiration by reading the bible, and are familiar with **BRF**, the *Bible Reading Fellowship*, which has four different series of Bible reading notes - **New Daylight, Guidelines, Day by Day with God and The Upper Room** – with different approaches to reading the Bible. They're available from a Christian bookshop, or via subscription service, which delivers the next edition directly to your door and offers the best value.

To all the people you can. As long as ever you can.*".

A strong call to action to change the world together. It can be used daily by anyone or weekly by small groups. Other materials include films, prayers and a talk, for groups or for a church service, so perhaps could be used for **Racial Justice Sunday** too.



#### Women's World Day of Prayer 2017 "Am I Being Unfair to You?"



WWDP began as separate days of prayer organised by individual denominations in America in the mid 1800's. It has now become a truly ecumenical and international day of prayer. The day begins in Samoa as the sun rises there and continues round the world until the sun sets over American Samoa.

During that time, it is estimated that 3 million men, women and young people in 170 countries will have taken part in the same service. 6000 services will have been held in the British Isles.

This year the focus is on the people of the Philippines. As their committee was preparing the service, typhoon Haiyan struck the islands causing a great deal of destruction. In spite of natural disasters and very different living conditions, the people of the Philippines carry on. They go on in faith and, in faith, we support them at our service.

The service is for ALL.





# The finding of the Dead Sea Scrolls – 70 years ago

Just 70 years ago this month, on 7<sup>th</sup> Feb 1947, the first of the Dead Sea Scrolls were found in a cave at Khirbat Qumran (now in the West Bank, Palestine) – in an echo of a biblical story, by a shepherd looking for a lost sheep.

The Dead Sea Scrolls have been called the greatest archaeological find of the 20th century. After an initial lack of interest – some of the scrolls were advertised in a small ad in an American newspaper – many more were discovered in nearby caves.

For the first 40 years the study of the thousands of text fragments was monopolised by fewer than a dozen international



scholars, which prevented quick publication of the texts. But in the early 1990s, the Israel Antiquities Authority (IAA) nominated Hebrew University Professor Emanuel Tov as chief editor, and the publication was divided among about 100 international scholars. By 2001 most had been published.

Numerous biblical manuscripts were discovered that were around 1000 years older than those already existing – and surprisingly, they are almost identical, indicating the great care taken by copyists down the ages.

One more manuscript that has come to light in recent years refers to the predicted birth of a wonderful child and provides a fascinating background to the New Testament messianic hope. It has been reconstructed from twelve small fragments, giving less than two columns of writing.

Most of the scrolls are in Hebrew, but others are in Aramaic, the language spoken by many Jews – including Jesus – between the sixth century BC and the siege of Jerusalem in 70 AD. One of the most intriguing manuscripts from Qumran is the Copper Scroll, a sort of ancient treasure map that lists 64 hidden treasures around Israel. None of these has been uncovered. *Parish Pump*


