



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The Ministers Write...

From Rev Lynda Russell

Dear Friends

How are the resolutions looking at the beginning of February? When I asked the congregation on Covenant Sunday only 1 person had made any resolutions (or at least admitted to it!)

Surveys show that among the most common new year's resolutions are: the determination to enjoy life more; lose weight; get fit; learn something new; find true love; get a better job; pay off debts; and reduce stress - presumably not all at the same time! However, I think those pretty much cover everything! And yet, ongoing research confirms something we already suspect - perhaps from personal experience - that the majority of us will abandon our resolutions even by mid-January, with many of us not making it beyond the first week!!

How can we think differently about resolutions to make them more relevant/helpful? It's suggested it could be with the help of Paul's letter to the Galatians – which reminds us that Christ has set us free (5:1, 13). But the freedom Christ gains is a freedom to live in the Spirit.

We who walk by the Spirit (5:16) and are led by the Spirit (5:18), who live by the Spirit and keep in step with the Spirit (5:25) are no longer under the authority of tradition; it's no longer a foregone conclusion that we will always 'gratify the desires of the flesh' (yes, I can refuse that extra piece of cake!). Instead, the death and resurrection of Christ and the giving of the Spirit show us that the Spirit renews and enables our ongoing covenant relationship with God.

Of course, as Paul says, there is conflict and struggle – we aren't perfect! Fruit needs to be cultivated; lasting change does not arrive overnight, although we might like to hope it would!!

And that's why Paul's 'walking' comparison is so appropriate. Unlike the dramatic moments of decision or fresh resolve we sometimes make at this time of the year, walking suggests a more regular pattern – ongoing, mundane even – a process which takes place in the everyday where we live and where we work – on the commute, in the home, at the office, in the gym (?), in the checkout queue, with our family and friends...

In these contexts, we can discover that it's the consistent, everyday actions that make a difference, as we continue to walk step-by-step – our lifelong process of transformation into the likeness of Christ through the ongoing work of the Spirit. And that's the reason we are looking at the 'Holy Habits' at LMC. New habits become life-long behaviours, bringing with them that transformation.

Let's make those Holy Habits our `resolution'. Not for this year, but for life! Every Blessing Lynda

Dear Friends,

It's funny to think the last time I wrote a letter for the Link was November in preparation for the December and January issue. My goodness so much has happened since then.

Can you believe our new grandson is 6 weeks old already, almost 2 months old by the time you receive this. The joy of delivering my own grandson in the back of my car will surely remain unsurpassed in terms of both the scariest and most joyful moments of 2017. Yet here we are about to launch into the second month of 2018, who knows what lies ahead.

Interestingly as I write this I find myself somewhat diminished by ill health so I apologise if this letter is less than it could be. Like so many fending off a chest infection I also contend with laryngitis. It's been almost a week since I lost my voice and I have been unable to return to 'active' duty yet but I'm sure it won't be too long before I feel well enough to do so. Yes, before you say anything, the house is indeed quiet.

During this time it's amazing isn't it that's it's not until you lose something, do you quite appreciate its value or how significant your voice is when it comes to communication. I can't lead a service, or interact in meetings in any significant way, I can't lead prayers or go visiting, I can't answer the phone. Although I thought it was adorable when my son called and said 'I know you can't answer this call mum but can you give me a sign if you can pick me up from the train station?' Why he didn't text I don't know. However, I'm grateful for emails and texts that have kept me connected. And for the beautiful flowers that have filled the living room, thank you, I've discovered at this time that I'm getting a dab hand at sign language, writing abbreviated texts messages or hurried handwritten notes. My frustrations are also obvious when I realise I've haven't made myself clear, as Col says 'the eyes say it all.' Of course I try every now again to whisper or to talk but I'm told that's not good so I'm generally left in silence for the moment.

If I reflect upon where I find myself as we go into 2018 perhaps through it all I can learn from the experience to appreciate a number of things, to appreciate the gift of listening. The temptation to jump in with an anecdote or experience when you're listening to someone is so tempting, but attentive listening is a gift I can give and that's not all bad.

I can also learn to appreciate the gift of silence in an ever busy world; silence is not something to be feared and yet we always find ways to fill it.

I can also appreciate the gift of 'touch' in a world that is ever vigilant against its inappropriateness and rightly so at times, but not at the cost of those who appreciate an appropriate way of expressing real care and concern. It's not always about words.

I can appreciate the expressions of love that are important for us to feel that others care, the flowers, the cards, the emails.

I can appreciate the importance of using my voice wisely when it does return and continue to appreciate the real difference our voices can make wherever we find ourselves. Perhaps there are even times when things are best left unsaid.

I can also appreciate the sense of purpose we all need, that makes us feel part of something bigger, where we all have a part to play.

Sir Kenneth Stuart (1920 - 2017)

Ken and his wife Barbara were for many years valued members of the congregation at Cobham Methodist Church, until just recently when age and infirmity meant they were unable to join us from the care home to which they had moved.

He was born and spent his early years in Barbados, before winning a scholarship to study for a degree in Montreal. The Montreal winter was very different from the Barbados climate. It's no wonder that in more recent years he and Barbara regularly spent part of the cold wet British winter in Barbados.

From Canada he moved on to study in wartime London, and then to Belfast and Edinburgh. After a visit back to Barbados, where he met and married Barbara, he took up a post in the University Hospital of the West Indies in Jamaica, later becoming the first West Indian Professor in the university.

The next move was to London, as Medical Advisor to the Commonwealth Secretariat, and it was as a result of his work there that he was knighted.

He continued to work on medical research, publishing his final academic paper in 2011. He was active physically as well as mentally, playing tennis regularly well into his 90s.

Most of all, to us at CMC, Ken was a good friend and a gentle man. Our prayers are with Barbara, their children and grandchildren. $_{DC}$


Ecumenical discussion groups Lent 2018.

Women's World Day of Prayer Friday 2nd March


This year's service has been prepared by the Christian women of Suriname on the north-eastern Atlantic coast of South

Thinking of Philip.

In early December our little Methodist Chapel in Effingham lost a dear friend when our treasurer, Philip Bearden died following a fall in his garden while planting snowdrops. Sadly this injury, and a lifelong health problem, meant that instead of planning a party for his 80^{th} birthday, we were organising a funeral. The first held in our Chapel for a while. The Chapel was packed and friends came from Ember Choral Society and lifted our singing to new heights. There were tributes from the congregation, which included his friend Mary, a fellow teacher from Eastwick Middle School, where Philip had taught science and R.I.

Philip was a very quiet and modest man who loved our little Chapel. It is therefore rather poignant that we said farewell to him at Christmas time. Effingham Methodist society held its first service at Christmas 1844, and some of you may remember a memorial plaque in the garden inscribed "Home in time for Christmas". This little poem was on an American funeral Remembrance Store website.

Home for Christmas

"I'll be Home for Christmas, So please don't be so sad. This is the greatest Christmas That I have ever had. I'll be home for Christmas, So please don't grieve too long. In Heaven here with Jesus, Is where we all belong. The world is full of struggles, No matter where you roam, But please don't be discouraged; The world is not our home. I'll be home for Christmas, And one day, so will you. The angels all are waiting, And I'll be waiting too."



EMINently interesting! – 'Mad Tracy from Margate' is the title of the first lecture in the new series of Art/History lectures, and can only be about Tracy Emin. Come to the Leatherhead Institute in January 2018, just the place to come in out of the cold, and learn more about a fascinating and controversial lady in the first lecture on 17th January. There are four more to follow on the subjects of "Suburbia", Zoffany, German Expressionism before 1914, and a little-known Danish artist.

For bookworms looking for a cosy corner – did you know that there is a library of some 1500 books and over 350 DVDs that is free and open on weekday mornings with a resident librarian present on Fridays. Added to this there is a warm stove and comfortable chairs, and coffee is always available. New titles are constantly being added.

Listen in comfort to Tea and Talks once a month on Fridays with topics on Edwardian England, 'Can't Pay, Won't Pay', Octavia Hill (one of the founders of the National Trust) and the 60s and 70s pop scene in Leatherhead. Or if you prefer music, the recorded music afternoons are on every 3rd Wednesday, starting on the 17th January with 'New Beginnings', followed by 'Winter Warmers', 'March' and 'Music in Action'.

To whet your 2018 appetite even more – from January Yoga, Bridge, Table Tennis and Snooker and Scrabble will be taking place weekly as usual, and once a month there is Book Club.

Just visiting! Our visits start on 6 February to the recently opened Postal Museum, followed in March to the Watts Gallery in Surrey and then in April to Dover Castle. Wellies may be needed. For the more energetic (and hale and hardy) the full and varied programme of walks, both short and long, starts again in February and Peter Humphreys is happy to give you all the details (01372 378347).

Please don't forget that rooms can be hired for one-off functions or for regular classes (an art class has been running for over ten years). It costs only £5 a year to become a member, but nonmembers are welcome at a very low cost. Book Review

THE LIFE AND TIMES OF HEROD THE GREAT

by Stewart Perowne. (1956).

...and to be reviewed next month -**THE LATER HERODS**by Stewart Perowne. (1958).

I acquired and read these two books mostly because I wanted a clear idea of the identity of each of the Herods mentioned in the New Testament. This is a complicated story involving four generations of the same family. The family history is covered by the books under review but for ease of reference I have listed the Herods immediately below with appropriate Bible references and notes. It might be useful to know that 'ethnarch' is the title of Archelaus who ruled only Judea and Samaria after his father Herod the Great and 'tetrarch' is the title of two other sons of Herod who inherited different parts of his kingdom. 'Herod' is the family name and it isn't always used in the Bible.

Herod the Great. King of Judea and neighbouring lands. (Matthew 2:1- 22. Luke 1:5). He was the client king of Judea and other territories under Roman protection. It was this Herod who ordered the massacre of the boys in Bethlehem in an attempt to kill Jesus. He died in the year 4 BC which is also the estimated year of the birth of Jesus using scholarly analysis of known dates during and after this time.

Archelaus. Ethnarch of Judea. (Matthew 2:22). He was the youngest son of Herod and under his will, later ratified by Caesar Augustus, he inherited only Judea and Samaria. Augustus deposed him in AD 6 after ten years of misrule. Judea then became a Roman province run by a procurator, not a client king. Pontius Pilate became procurator in AD 27.

Herod Antipas. Tetrarch of Galilee and Perea under Herod's will. (Matthew 14:1-10, Mark 6:14-28, Luke 3:1, Luke 8:3, Luke 9:7-9, Luke 13:31-32, Luke 23:7-15). Antipas was a brother of Archelaus and he was the Herod who imprisoned then beheaded John the Baptist and who later appeared at the trial of Jesus in Luke's gospel. His wife was Herodias who was formerly married to another brother of Antipas.

Philip. Tetrarch of the lands to the east of Galilee under Herod's will. (Luke 3:1). Philip was married to his niece Salome. She was the daughter of Herodias by her first husband who was another brother (called, confusingly, Herod-Philip). This was the Salome who danced for Herod Antipas and demanded the head of John the Baptist at her mother's suggestion.

Herod Agrippa I. (Acts 12). Agrippa was the nephew of the aforementioned brothers. He eventually ruled all of Herod the Great's kingdom with Roman approval. He was the Herod who executed James the brother of John and attempted to kill Peter too.

Agrippa II. (Acts 25:13-27 and 26). He was the son of Agrippa I. He was king of Chalcis in Syria but he later exchanged it for Philip's lands. He was the Agrippa who heard Paul the apostle with Governor Festus in Caesarea.

THE LIFE AND TIMES OF HEROD THE GREAT begins by tracing Herod's ancestry to the time when Judas the Maccabee led the Judean revolt against the Seleucids (the Greek dynasty descended from Alexander the Great's general Seleucas). One of the results of this was that Herod's grandfather, Antipater, was appointed governor of Idumea to the south of Judea. His son, also called Antipater, married an Arab from Petra and their son Herod was born in 73 BC.

As the Roman army made its first appearance civil war broke out in Judea and Herod's father Antipater was on the winning side. Antipater was loyal to the Roman conquerors, becoming procurator of Judea while Herod became governor of Galilee. Later Rome itself fought a civil war and the victors, Anthony and Octavian (later Caesar Augustus), persuaded the Senate to appoint Herod king of Judea in 40 BC.

Herod's reign in Judea is a story of war, rebellions, assassinations and executions. Stewart Perowne, the author of the book, has a firm grip on his subject and gives an excellent account of the complex series of events which marked Herod's life. He began his reign by fighting a three year war to wrest his kingdom from rebels and invaders. He always had to deal with scheming rivals and capricious Romans to say nothing of the Jewish Sanhedrin and the Pharisees.

He married ten wives and had fourteen children, nine of them sons, but this was a mixed blessing and he executed his second wife and three of his sons because of their treachery.

Overall, however, his experiences enabled him to develop political genius and diplomacy which carried him through the dangerous times in which he lived. There seems to be no easy answer to the question 'Why was Herod great?' but perhaps it was partly because he kept his throne and managed to die in his bed.

Undoubtedly he was a cruel man too but this behaviour mirrored the age in which he lived and he was no worse than any other leader. The author makes the point that Herod was undoubtedly capable of killing the boys in Bethlehem and nobody in authority would have condemned him. The last ten years of Herod's reign were marked by illness and occasional madness. At the end of his life he was bedridden and suffering greatly.

The book includes an account of Herod's building record. Many towns and cities benefited from his building ambitions but he is remembered mostly for the construction of the temple in Jerusalem. Work on the temple took eight years from 18 BC to 10 BC and finishing touches continued until AD64. Finally the temple was destroyed following the siege of Jerusalem by the Romans in AD 70 – as prophesied by Jesus in three of the gospels.

The book is not in print. However there are second hand options available online.






derness (Luke 4:1-13).

Lent teaches us how to live out the love of God in practice, as we follow Jesus in the way of the cross.






