From Rev Jan Hofmeyr

Dear Friends,

The recent tragic events in Iran reminded me of how certain actions can have repercussions way beyond what might have been envisaged. The assassination of the Iranian general had consequences not just for him but for so many others. At the funeral march of the general, 56 people died because of a stampede. And then, because of the heightened tensions and anticipations of further possible acts, a commercial airliner was mistakenly identified as some form of attack and shot down by the Iranian military, killing 176 people.

These tragedies are a reminder of the way in which actions, or failures to act, can have negative consequences way beyond what might have been envisaged. One has only to think of the assassination of the Archduke Franz Ferdinand and how it became the spark that set in motion what became the great conflagration of the first World War, which, in turn, contributed to the second World War, because of the harsh conditions meted out to Germany at the Treaty of Versailles.

In a similar, albeit much less dramatic way, our words and actions can have repercussions which we would never have thought possible. A derogatory word, spoken to a child can affect that child's self-image for years to come. Passing on a bit of gossip can ruin a person's reputation. A single incident of driving dangerously, or under the influence, can cause a death that will scar a wide circle of people for years to come. Jesus said that anyone who calls another 'a useless fool' will be subject to severe chastening

We need great wisdom in what we do and say, since those things can have serious consequences for others and ourselves. As we continue into 2020 may we depend on the Holy Spirit to help us speak and act with great sensitivity and wisdom. May we have the 2020 vision that enables us to see clearly the possible repercussions of our behaviour before we act or speak. Fortunately for us, as people of faith, careless words and deeds need not burden us forever. Through Jesus there is the possibility of forgiveness and a wiping clean of the slate. And even though some of the results of our behaviour may not be able to be undone, there need not be a lifelong burden of guilt and regret.

Another piece of good news is that, just as destructive words and actions can have unimagined negative results, so too can small deed and words of kindness have unimagined positive consequences. In the words of a hymn by Charles Wesley, 'See how great a flame aspires, kindled by a spark of grace.' That was true in the life of Jesus, beginning as it did in the smallness of a baby in a manger; it can be true of us as we light 'a spark of grace' in the lives of those around us.

Dear Friends,

So how was your Christmas? Seems such a long time ago now, how guickly we move onwards into a new year. Our Christmas was hilarious, balancing between festive joy and disinfectant. With the manse bursting at the seams with 17 people sleeping in the bedrooms as well as the office, utility and dining room, you could say it was cosy. With four grandsons under 4, much of our time was spent in the church hall where I had arranged toys and a dining table. With 2 birthdays thrown into the mix, and our daughter celebrating her 30th, we had organised a fun night of music and karaoke. Unfortunately, there was always somebody absent at the dining table. Why? Our grandson appeared to bring with him a stomach bug surfacing within hours of his arri-He then passed it to his brother, his dad and his uncle, folval. lowed by my sister's family, who took home more than she had bargained for. My poor son left in haste after 4 days of contending with both his children unwell and had a very unpleasant journey home. Needless to say the washing machine wasn't enjoying a festive rest. But you make the best of it; you find ways of enjoying each other's company regardless of circumstance; the time you have together is precious.

We roll with the good days as well as the difficult ones because that is part of what it is to be family. You support one another, you hold one another. You don't always agree with one another but you continue to walk with one another.

As we move towards The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity our focus turns towards God's family. Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CTBI) bible study and worship resources draw upon Acts 27 and 28:

"The story of Paul being shipwrecked on Malta in Acts 27 & 28 leads us to reflect upon many aspects of our own lives and the lives of our churches. As we approach one another seeking unity, we recognise that we sometimes carry baggage from history, tradition and cultural expectation, which can weigh us down and threaten to overwhelm us. There is a danger that, in the face of experience, we might lose hope which first called us and so give up reaching for the light which Christ offers us." CTBI.

It is easy in life, isn't it, as you go along, to gather things around you until you have a desert island disc moment that asks a question of you, you can only take 2 things with you what might they be? I've often joked I would have a bible in one hand and shortbread (all butter only) in the other, although the second item may well be negotiable if I actually took more than a second to think about it.

Two questions CTBI asks in the first day of bible study:

What are the important things we need to carry with us as we journey together in unity? What things might we need to let go of as we journey together

What things might we need to let go of as we journey together towards unity? What challenges does it bring?

Great questions, challenging and certainly thought provoking, not just for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, but equally as we move through Lent, if we replace '*unity'* with '*Lent*.' Lent in some respects is not intended to be a comfortable and cosy process, it should make demands upon us both as individuals and as a corporate body of believers. So what do you need to pick up and what do you need to let go of?



In January we talked about following Jesus as sheep follow the shepherd rather than being like goats.



World Day of Prayer Friday 6th March



2020's theme is **Rise, Take Your Mat and Walk !**

Women of Zimbabwe have prepared this year's service and they encourage us all to reflect on the difficulties and unrest that have plagued their country for many years.

About 16 million people live in Zimbabwe, and about 50% of them are young. There are 16 official languages, reflecting the tribal history of the region. The majority languages are Shona and Ndbele, and English is a first language for only two per cent of the population.

Women make up 51% of the population, and play a significant role in the socio-economic life of the country. Many rural households are headed by women, since husbands often migrate to towns to find work, and young people leave their villages for neighbouring African countries or elsewhere in the world. Because of a complex interplay of economic, social and historical factors, women and girls often face systematic disadvantage, especially those who are poor, live in rural areas or are from particular social groups. They face barriers to education, early marriage, poor gynaecological and obstetric provision, violence in the home and legal discrimination regarding family law. Various groups are lobbying for gender equality and some laws have been enacted to protect women against gender-based violence. It is nearly always women who look after those with disabilities: physical, mental and emotional.

May the welcoming God enable us to set the table and fill our communities with hope, love, and joy!

"God in Love Unites Us"

The Methodist Church in Britain is considering redefining marriage to include same-sex partnerships. Discussions are already taking place, and decisions are due to be made at the Methodist Conference 2020.

Together with our Methodist friends from Cobham, Effingham and Dorking, we will be discussing this matter in order to inform Circuit and District of our collective views which will be related back to Conference. Everyone is invited to a meeting at LMC from 10.00am to 12noon on Saturday 22nd February. Jan and Kim will lead the session.

The National Debt

As of the first quarter of 2018, UK government debt stood at \pounds 1.78 trillion. That means that if we were to pay it back at the rate of \pounds 1,000 per second, there would still be \pounds 30 billion left to pay in the year 2075!

The cost of servicing such a debt is £48 billion, which amounts to \pounds 731.26 for every man, woman and child in the UK on the basis of 2016 population figures, which for Band D would be equivalent on average to a 43.76% increase in council tax for people living alone.

Have we gone completely mad? In Romans 13:8 we read: "Owe nothing to anyone except to love one another...". What difference would it have made if we took more notice of what the Bible says?!

Should we be tearing our garments, pulling out our hair and sitting down appalled as Ezra did over the sins of his people in his day (see Ezra 9:3)?

Maybe this shows that we get in a mess if we do things using our own wisdom (or lack thereof) and that we desperately need God's help!



MUSIC AT CHRIST CHURCH

Part 1

Last September I completed 54 years as organist and choirmaster and in January I handed over to Gina Eason, whom I know well from working with her on 17 concerts with my chamber choir, Antiphonia. Last month I was touched to be given a generous book token by the church.

Music at Christ Church has been a most satisfying aspect of my life, and I am thankful for it. People have always encouraged me in my aim for high standards. The new organ in 1970 was a thrilling development, and choosing and practising appropriate music every week (with two services a Sunday for 45 years, then fortnightly for 4 more years) has been deeply rewarding. I have a database of 2,460 pieces played for worship, with timings, seasons, dates and nationalities to help organise my choice to suit the occasion. Favourite organ composers include Tomkins, Buxtehude, J. S. Bach, John Stanley, Mendelssohn, Franck, Widor, Vierne, Karg-Elert, Langlais, Messiaen, Leighton and Mathias.

We have heard over 30 organists give recitals in our church, with 8 recitals a year from 2016-2020. The organ was extended in 1995 to balance the singing of a chancel choir and the congregation in the nave. This also made it better as a recital instrument. It involved moving the chancel pews. Never move pews on your own: one of them fell against my shin and led to interesting visits to the doctor. I have often cooperated with tuners, acquiring the skills to put small faults right, until at 82 I couldn't safely get up the ladder any more.

The church pews were removed in 2005. Apart from a joint Celtic communion in 2010, the flexibility of chairs has hardly ever affected our worship style, but it has enabled multi-use for rehearsals and other events. When choir numbers fell below 12, choir desks were made to my design to stand in a semicircle in the chancel to project the voices. Then in 2011-12 the choir moved to its present position at the side of the nave.

Palm Sunday music (at evening worship until 1993) was always an occasion for extra music, and would include 4 anthems or a cantata. Special memories include:

1966 Schütz - Seven Words (with strings)
1970 Handel - Messiah Part 2 (with strings and organ)
1975 Schütz - St Matthew Passion (soloist: Roger Norrington)
1976 Handel - St John Passion
1976 Haydn - Seven Words (with strings)
1981 Mozart - Requiem (with orchestra and soloists)
1982 Bach - Cantata 182
1983 Handel - Messiah Part 2 (conductor: Arthur Head; organ: Anthony Cairns)
1984 Mathias - Lift up your heads, and Byrd - 5-part Mass (4 movements)

Evening carol services were held for 43 years, until 2008. Arthur Head played while I conducted or the other way round.


