The Ministers Write...



From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

Invitations to special events are always a welcome surprise, so I was delighted when I was asked if I would like to attend an international conference at the House of Lords, commemorating Human Rights Day in December. It was led by the Universal Peace Federation (UPF), in partnership with the Women's Federation for World Peace (WFWP), a non-governmental organisation connected to the UN. The central question we were asked to engage with was: How far have we progressed?

200 international delegates gathered from around the world, with 17 speakers from the House of Lords, Baronesses and Rt. Hon MPs, as well as a Nobel Peace Prize winner and eminent people from the diplomatic and human rights field. I felt so honoured to be in such esteemed company and overwhelmed by the enormity of this shared experience. It was such a privilege to be in the company of those who have given so much in the pursuit of peace. It seemed as we listened to the speeches, the answer to the question was: we have so much further to go.

Whilst I was sitting in the benches, admiring the huge paintings on the wall, I wondered what policies might have been challenged and fought over in those very rooms. In what way had the political and moral framework of our society been considered and determined by this group of individuals on behalf of so many? Unlike the House of Commons, members of the House of Lords are appointed. Membership of the House of Lords is made up of Lords Spiritual and Lords Temporal. There are currently 26 [Lords Spiritual](#), who sit in the Lords by virtue of their ecclesiastical role in the [established Church of England](#). The Lords Temporal make up the rest of the membership; of these, the majority are [life peers](#) who are appointed by the Monarch on the advice of the [Prime Minister](#), or on the advice of the House of Lords Appointments Commission. How far have we progressed? Might be an interesting question to ask when we consider the political and economic situation we find ourselves in.

But our lives although affected by the statutes and policies ratified in that very place, are not determined by them on a spiritual level. Some would say that religion has no place in politics and that revelation of profound truths can only be found in the realms of ecclesiastical territory. Yet I know that there are many Christian MPs who face the challenges of trying to make a difference in a secular world.

In this season of epiphany, where God begins to reveal himself to us in even greater ways, I would ask you to consider praying for Christian MPs and Lords in the Houses of Parliament, that God's revelation and discernment might be given to them, so each might receive guidance concerning ethical, moral and social justice issues. They can make a real difference to people's lives; they need our prayers, particularly in this time of political and economic uncertainty. Making the right decision is not easy when you are under so much pressure to deliver.

Within the Methodist tradition an important part of our observance of New Year is the Covenant Service, and it is a great joy to me that across the pastorate all five churches will have an opportunity to share in a Covenant Service this year.

The service offers us an opportunity to make what could be seen as a spiritual New Year's resolution of our commitment to Christ for the coming year. In the current climate the way of Jesus is more important than ever, a way of love and care, particularly for the vulnerable, a way of challenge to the powers of greed and violence. For us to follow Jesus on that way we need to be sustained by vibrant supportive communities of prayer and worship, and that is what I pray with God's help we are working for our churches to be.

The challenges of 2012 are all too real, but so is the promise of God to lead us through them on the way of Jesus, in the power of the Holy Spirit.

50th Anniversary celebrations 22nd - 23rd September 2012

As you know in September we will be celebrating the fact that the church has been a presence in the community for 50 years. Lent course beginning February for six weeks

Although we have only just entered January we need to think a little ahead and talk about this year's Lent course. Although I led the study last year, 2012 is the year we share in ecumenical study. This year Rev. Jeremy Cresswell from St Andrews Oxshott, has written a course entitled "The graceful life" focusing on text from Romans.

Session one: Chapter 1: - The resurrection of Jesus Christ
 - The revelation of God in creation
 - The wrath of God

Session two: Chapters 2 and 3:
 - Where is justice to be found?
 - The faithfulness of God in Christ

Session three: Chapters 4 and 5:
 -The coming of righteousness
 -Faith and grace

Session four: Chapters 6, 7 and 8:1-27
 -Baptism and our life in Jesus Christ
 -The victorious life of the Spirit

Session five: Chapter 8:28-39, and chapters 9, 10 and 11:
 -Predestination and election
 -The destiny of Israel "all will be saved"

Session six: Chapters 12-15
 -life in the body of Christ
 -Attitudes to the state etc.

I think the course presents us with some excellent material and an opportunity to experience ecumenical study, where we can enjoy the richness of each denomination in discussion. I encourage you to consider placing your name on the sign up sheet at church. You will need to decide which day you prefer and whether you would like to join a study group in the afternoon or evening. Remember that the course will be for six weeks. Karen Banks is co-ordinating the groups and will need to have the details by the end of January, so please make sure that you have filled in the sheet in these coming weeks. I will certainly be attending and I hope that you might consider it too...

Week of accompanied prayer

23rd - 27th April 2012

Do you find yourself wanting a deeper relationship with God? Do you find it difficult to pray? Would you like to know more about different ways of praying?

Then perhaps the week of accompanied prayer is for you. The term 'prayer' refers to our interaction with God. This can be in a number of ways: through contemplating scripture, through waiting on God, through bringing what is in our hearts to God. It can be different for each person.

A week of accompanied prayer provides people an opportunity to deepen their relationship with God, without going away for a residential retreat. The participants agree to spend half an hour each day with an experienced prayer companion. The half hour with the guide can be in the day time or the evening.

Prayer companions or guides are drawn from a network of trained spiritual directors from several denominations, and all have been trained in accompanying people in this way. The companion is a listener, who gives the participant the opportunity to articulate his or her own experience, and to explore different ways of praying.

Although I have never experienced accompanied prayer, I know many people who have and they have always remarked on the benefits they have found from engaging with it. So I encourage you to give this initiative some thought. If you want to know more, there are leaflets at the church and you will need to make sure that you fill in the application form and **send it off before the end of January.**

"Let Justice Prevail"




This year's **Women's World Day of Prayer service** will be held on **Friday 2nd March**. It has been prepared by Christian women of **Malaysia**, a multi-ethnic and multi-religious country, and one of the wealthiest and most developed countries in South East Asia.

Women have made important contributions to its social and economic development, but still face discrimination and violence at all levels of society. Although Malaysia's multi-ethnicity has added to the rich heritage of its land and people, it has also given rise to many problems. It is now the most popular destination country in Asia for migrant workers, and human trafficking has become a sophisticated and organised operation. These issues are woven into the service and the women voice their hope for the future. Justice for all is their hope, and their prayer is "Let Justice Prevail".

A slight case of Nimbyism?

Oh Dear! NIMBY is an [acronym](#) for the phrase "**not in my back yard**". **Nimbyism** is used to describe opposition by residents to a proposal for a new development close to them. Hmmmm!!!

Local residents have recently been invited to have their say on plans for a new care home in Effingham, which would "provide 70 elderly people with nursing and dementia support." The proposals are a joint project between a specialist care home developer and a health and social care services provider. These plans will apparently help fill an increasingly urgent shortfall of 289 care home beds in the Effingham area. Care services for those suffering with dementia in the local area are also currently 530 bed spaces short and under mounting pressure. "It is expected that the care home will also create up to 60 new jobs in a range of different roles, many of which will go to local people" so we are told !

The facility may also offer a hairdresser, café, mini-cinema and drop-in day-care, which must raise concerns for local businesses. Locals are also worried that this development is totally out of scale with all other buildings in the centre of this historic village. The site is a small green belt field in the conservation area, surrounded by listed buildings, and will exit onto Lower Road roughly opposite the Roman Catholic Church, just yards from St. Lawrence Primary School and the Howard of Effingham. It is very busy already, especially during the school run peak period. Staff shift patterns will avoid peak times apparently but what about visitors and deliveries?

Detailed plans for the new care home will be submitted to Guildford Borough Council early next year. If approved, work will start in autumn 2012 and the care home will open in autumn 2013.

I must confess I'm not keen, even though I'm probably a possible future user of such facilities. So call me a nimby, but I've checked the carehome provider's website. I just hope and pray that the local council will make the right decision for our village.

My resolution for 2012

This year Angela and I spent a lot of time studying the history of the Bible in English, so now I have decided to try and get to know its contents a little better this coming year.

We discovered how important it was for the Bible translators to communicate the real meaning of the gospel to their readers. So important in fact, that many of them were prepared to die or risk death so that the truth should be revealed. They were often well educated churchmen, living in a very violent world, who, once caught up by the Spirit, wanted not only to preserve the truth but to pass the Good News on in a language that could be understood by everyone.

It was their wish that everyone should have the opportunity to read the Bible and so it is not difficult to see how the printed Bible took off and eventually how church schools came into being, giving ordinary folk the chance of a simple education, learning to read and write with studies often centred around the Bible.

Reading the Bible was a good start for anyone, as the example of Jesus and His teachings were a really good pattern for life. It was only during the period of enlightenment, when geological and scientific studies started to be taken more seriously and widely publicised, that some Biblical ideas came into question.

Many of the early pioneers of science were men of the cloth who were not only convinced by God's Word but fascinated by His world. They were challenged by their findings and how it all fitted in with the teaching of the Bible and the Church. In our generation we face the same challenges, as science tries to replace God. When you read the Bible are you challenged? We hear it read every Sunday in our churches and it is part of the Methodist tradition to have it explained by the preacher and to attend a regular Bible Class during the week, but what does it mean for us today ?

2012 sees the celebration of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. At her coronation 60 years ago she was presented with a Bible and the words "Here is Wisdom, this is the Royal Law, these are the lively oracles of God". I pray that I may consider them so and value them as she has throughout her reign.






