

The Ministers Write...

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

My day off this week wasn't quite what I expected it to be. I started the day doing a bit of spring cleaning which was well overdue. I found amongst my belongings a rubber wrist band, on which were the words 'cross equals love'. My heart sank with sadness as I picked it up and placed it on my wrist, because that particular Monday was the day after 50 people had been killed in a gay club in Orlando. God's love was surely absent from the hand that had chosen that day to cause such pain.

Carmel awoke that morning deeply troubled by the events of the day before. We spent some time talking, then we went to the church and lit a candle, offered our prayers, sat quietly and remembered the dead, their families and the killer's family too.

A vigil was taking place in London that evening by the Admiral Duncan pub (a very pertinent gathering spot: A nail bomb had gone off there in 1999 killing three). The vigil would begin at 7pm with a two minute silence. Carmel felt she needed to be there and asked if I would go. I said I could not think of a greater privilege than to stand in solidarity with those who were feeling so vulnerable, to remember those lost in such a brutal way.

Our train was not due for another couple of hours so I continued clearing out the cupboards and to my surprise came across another bracelet. Only weeks before Lianne and I had made the bracelet while she was in labour in the hospital, and for a short while it did what I had intended it to do and taken her mind off the pain. I resolved to wear it that evening. Why? When I awaited the arrival of our grandson it was a time of great anticipation and a recognition that new life would soon be with us. I wore it to remind me that I wanted my grandson to grow up in a better world, one where terrorism didn't strike fear into the hearts of many, and one where love truly does win over hate.

We got to the vigil in good time and stood within a few feet of Jeremy Corbin, Sadiq Khan and various other MP's who had come to offer support. We shared in a 2 minute silence with thousands gathered, followed by applause and some singing from a choir positioned close by. We then walked round to St Anne's for further prayer and a candlelit vigil.

It was a poignant and moving evening one I will not forget in a hurry. On that day I felt we had acknowledged the worst of humanity and also the best here in this place. Strangers wrapped their arms around one another with the muffled sounds of sobbing all around, the signs waving above our heads 'love wins' and 'people of all faiths united against hate crimes.' Many sensed it was an attack not just on individuals but on a whole community of people who share the same identity, who share similar experiences. I could only listen that night but I hope I expressed my love for them, in their vulnerability and in their pain.

From Hannah Mulcock

Dear Friends

I write this whilst sitting on a coach with sixty children on our way to Wisley Gardens on a school trip. There is definitely an atmosphere of excitement and anticipation. This feeling, however, seems to stretch beyond the day out of the classroom. Behind me I can hear two boys discussing their summer plans; one boy speaks with elation at his upcoming holiday to Florida whilst the other talks about his own plans.

I wonder what you are looking forward to this summer? Could it be that summer get away? A few weeks off work? Perhaps you are looking forward to spending time with friends and family. I'm personally looking forward to exploring what ministry to families could look like when children are not at school. That and the extra lie-ins!

It's a nice feeling to be looking forward to something, to be excited about what is to come. Christians have something incredible to look forward to: the return of Jesus. We see Paul using the Aramaic expression "Marana tha" in 1 Corinthians which translates to "Come, O Lord". In fact, the New Testament anticipation of Christ's return is a constant theme.

I don't know what your instant feelings towards the return of Christ are—maybe fascination, or you may find the whole concept very weird (and who could blame you after reading Revelation?) or you could feel fear. My prayer would be that it fills you with excitement. Take a moment to read 2 Peter 3: 3-14. This is such a good passage to explore as it explains the reasons that we should be looking forward to Christ's return.

Firstly, it will be the "Day of the Lord" when, finally, everyone will recognise Him as the King of the universe—it will all be about Him. Jesus will be seen in all His might, majesty and splendour. He will receive the glory He is due.

Secondly, the end of sin. This means the end of cancer, earthquakes, corruption, war, hunger, poverty and so much more. Is that not something we should await with hope? No more tears, death, mourning, crying or pain. To look forward to a new Heaven and a new Farth—our new home.

So what should our response to these things be? Simply put: get right with God; get ready for our new home by practicing living holy and godly lives and get busy sharing Christ so others can be excited about His return because Jesus is coming again and it is something to look forward to!



Effingham Celebrates the Queen's 90th Birthday

Effingham's celebration was duly planned for a fine day, but it was not to be. Plan B was to use St Alphege church hall for the street party cream tea.

St Lawrence Church was packed for the ecumenical led by the vicar, Rev Mandy MacVean, with Rev Kim Plumpton. Local school children sang and recited "They're changing guard at Buckingham Palace—says Alice"

Warmed hearts on Wesley Day 2016.



May 24th is Wesley Day, and we decided to revisit our Methodist heritage by joining the walk in London as it was a bright sunny day, and began with Evensong at St. Paul's Cathedral. Of course this is just what John Wesley did in 1738, when his life was transformed by the Holy Spirit and Methodism really began. We also hoped to hear addresses by the President and Vice President of Conference, the

charismatic Rev. Steve Wild and Dr. Jill Barber, who'd both been so impassioned at last year's Heritage and Mission conference.

So we took the train and joined a well attended service of Choral Evensong at St Paul's Cathedral, where, to honour the occasion, the President read the New Testament lesson, and we listened to an anthem by Samuel Wesley and sang "O for a thousand tongues to sing". Then everyone filed out, passing Holman Hunt's painting of Christ, "The Light of the World". Then our journey in the footsteps of John Wesley began, outside the North Door of St Paul's, with a short service, rousing hymn singing, prayer and laying a wreath at the feet of John's memorial statue.

Rev. The Lord Griffiths led a straggling procession to the Museum of London, home of the 'Flame', which marks the closest point to the building where, on the 24th May 1738, John Wesley, saddened by his feelings after evensong at St Pauls, joined a small group of Moravian Christians and had his 'warmed heart experience' that changed him for ever.

Our journey was a very uplifting one too, as a group of Ghanaian Ladies in Suzanna Wesley costumes beating drums and singing, led us through the streets. Dave and I were usually at the back of the procession, taking photos and helping the tail enders! We were guided through high rise flats, and saw how beautiful some of the new buildings were, with their amazing architecture, pretty gardens and water features.

Another short service was held at Bunhill Fields, the famous non-conformist graveyard, opposite Wesley's Chapel in City Road where Susanna Wesley is buried. A gate was opened so that we could all lay a rose at her grave to remember a mother who was obviously a major influence on both John and Charles.

Then we crossed City Road to Wesley's Chapel and gathered around the statue of John Wesley for some more rousing hymns, and Rev Steve Wild gave an amazing and uplifting address while standing on a grave near Wesley's house.

At last a brief stop comfort break and a cup of tea (no cake) in the hall, where we met some of the 50 or so people who had been on the walk, and chatted with ladies from the Susanna Wesley Mission Auxiliary.

Then we adjourned to the nether regions of the Chapel for the opening of the final display case in "The World is my Parish", the new exhibition in the refurbished Museum of Methodism.

Our final service was around John Wesley's tomb at the rear of the chapel, where Dr Jill Barber gave a moving address, and we all sang 'And can it be', while wiping tears from our eyes. A wonderful end to a brilliant occasion, which we'll never forget.


Heritage Weekend ~ Effingham Chapel

Giving Thanks

Towards the beginning of each of our Sunday morning services, the roving mike is taken round the congregation so that anyone can express their thanks. A child may have had a birthday, someone could have been inspired by an outing, there are always family celebrations to share, or it might just be for an unexpectedly sunny day, or even rain after a dry spell.

Each Sunday I see Nature's marvels as I drive to church and give thanks for my senses to appreciate them. There are only three roads - Leatherhead Road, Young Street and Dorking Road, plus the last little bit round to LMC. Along the first section to Bockett's Farm, the fields are home to cows and sheep. In the last week the grass in the first field has been cut, releasing a wonderful smell. That was cleared for silage, and, for one day, from dawn to dusk, the huge machine throbbed away collecting it all up.

The wide verges along Young Street have sprung into a palette of colours as the flowers enjoy the longer warm days. There are tall white ox-eye daisies and the daintier sprays of cow parsley. Poppies make a bright splash of red, and the yellow ragwort and buttercups battle for space in the tapestry of flowers. It will not be long before the campion adds its pink blooms.

Dorking Road is more about trees and shrubs than flowers. The hawthorn, on the Thorncroft side, is almost over now, but bloomed as if there was no tomorrow! The 'candles' on the horse chestnuts have been prolific, and now the trees are in full leaf, the growth spreads across the road to shake hands with those opposite, and forms a cool arch to drive under. Unfortunately, by the end of August, the beetle grub harboured under the bark, will develop and suck the life out of those same leaves, making them dry and brown well before Autumn is upon us. So we must glory in them while we can and all else that Nature offers.


Christ Church Project


