## The Minister Writes...

#### From Rev Jan Hofmeyr

Dear Friends,

Over the next two months many will be having holidays with opportunities for rest and renewal. But sometimes we can end up doing things that are not ultimately renewing for the body, mind and spirit. For example, too much 'screen time' with the TV, computer or mobile phone.

What are the things that are really renewing? I have sometimes thought about the Genesis account of creation and wondered whether it might give us some leads in terms of our recreation (re-creation). Are there some clues in the seven 'days' of creation which can be a pattern for our lives?

The world before God begins God's creative work is described in Genesis by words like 'void', 'formless' and 'desolate'. Is it not true that such words can define our lives where we have no times for renewal and refreshment of mind, body and spirit? There is the danger of what someone has called 'the barrenness of a busy life'.

Are there some pointers for us in Genesis 1? One general pointer is in the idea of creation and creativity. Sometimes much of our leisure is in pursuits that involve no creativity – things like TV and computer games. They have their place, in moderation, but how much better to do something creative like gardening, art, music, sewing etc. Not all leisure needs to produce something tangible at the end, but since we are made in the image of a creative God, that is an area that should be part of our lives if they are to be meaningful and fulfilling.

What about the actual 'days' of creation? The first sees the creation of light; the separation of darkness and light. The first 'day' of creation corresponds to our Sunday. It was also on the first day of the week that Jesus rose from death. Worship on a Sunday is a chance for us to re-orientate our lives towards the light and away from the darkness; away from death towards life. This is the ideal way to start the week and also to start each day.

The second 'day' of creation is the creation of the seas. Water can bring peace and refreshment. The psalmist speaks of the Lord as a shepherd who leads him beside still waters and so restores his soul. Water is life, and being beside it or in it can bring renewal and refreshment.

The third 'day' sees the creation of all plant life. We all know the reinvigoration that comes from a walk in nature. We live so much of our lives in man-made environments – houses, cars, malls – and with man-made technology.

Getting into nature at times is therefore so important, especially when we connect with it with all our senses – sight, hearing, touch, smell and taste.

The fourth 'day' sees the ordering of light and dark into day and night. How about observing a sunrise or sunset on a regular basis from a good vantage point? Or sitting outside at night and becoming aware of the sounds and sights of the night.

On the fifth 'day' there is the creation of birds and sea life. The observing of birds is a wonderful pastime. Look out for them on your walks and attract them to your garden. 'Look at the birds of the air', said Jesus. It might not have been intended as an instruction, but it is good advice anyway.

The sixth 'day' sees the creation of animals and humans. Contact with animals is a special joy with which we have been blessed and is often a means of bringing calm and refreshment to our lives. And, of course, human contact is vital for our lives. We need to make time to be with people who help to shape our lives in positive ways.

The seventh 'day', the Jewish Sabbath, is our Saturday. In the lives of orthodox Jews it is a day totally free from the normal activities of life. The principle is a good one for us too, to make time on this day and at other times in the week to practise the things I have already spoken about.

#### From Rev Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

On Saturday we held our first women's breakfast in Effingham. The event was supported by people from all over the area and the breakfast was stunning. To give you a flavour, we had four courses which included (using my M&S voice), blueberry pancakes with Greek yoghourt and drizzled honey, avocado skiffs with salmon. It was then followed by a welcome cup of tea or coffee, ably served by the very efficient and capable team of men who were kind enough to offer their time to us on a Saturday morning.

Our speaker Carmel Plumpton came to share with us her 'Journey as a Transgender Woman.' Recognising how nervous she was it was thought that Carmel would respond better to a Q&A session rather than simply standing up and giving testimony.

An opportunity would then arise at the end of the session for people to ask the questions that they would like to ask. Carmel was articulate in sharing her story, a story that speaks so loudly about 'difference' and people's reaction to 'difference'. Carmel has endured so much during her journey, her experience of cruelty and unacceptance is indeed heart breaking, so there were lots of tears too.

It was deeply moving, and I later heard from several people who thanked us for personalising a story that is so often misunderstood. As a Christian, let alone as a mother, I am filled with what it is to love those who feel isolated and alone in life regardless of circumstance. Yet sadly Carmel's story is not an unfamiliar one. There are many who are 'different' to us who feel isolated from the church.

The lines between sexuality and gender are often blurred, and the Christian church must somehow grapple with what it is to be an inclusive church. What it is to hold our deep theological beliefs and those who have experienced life in a 'different' way, who have encountered God's grace in ways perhaps that are 'different' to our own.

I gather that the Methodist Conference will be discussing the issue of Same Sex Marriage shortly. As many of you know the URC General Assembly went through a similar process a couple of years ago. After numerous consultations they opted to agree that each church could make their own decision about holding such marriages. The process was deeply painful because there were such strong feelings on both sides of the theological argument. When the decision was made there was no rapturous applause from those who felt it was the right decision, in fact it was quite the opposite, there was silence, utter silence, in recognition that it had been a painful decision to make. The church believed that in this place of shared wisdom it would hear God's voice speaking and two years on we are witnesses to the fact that it has indeed enabled the church to honour 'difference' and keep unity in the body of Christ.

Seeking shared wisdom on such issues is I believe so important and it's important that we are all given an opportunity to express our thoughts. I understand there will be a time of consultation in the coming months in the churches across the circuit. However, it is only effective if we are able to embrace one another in love, to hold each other even though we may hold differing views.

Whatever the outcome of such discussions we must remember that we are called to love God and to love one another. God's graciousness has no boundaries so we too must be gracious in our discussions.

## TWO PEOPLE ARRESTED ON SUSPICION OF MODERN SLAVERY AND HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN GUILDFORD

Two people have been arrested on suspicion of modern slavery and human trafficking after a member of Royal Surrey County Hospital staff raised concerns for a pregnant patient in the maternity ward last Thursday (16 May).

The nurse became suspicious due to the behaviour of one of the suspects, who was accompanying the pregnant woman from Albania. After securing an interpreter, the woman was given an opportunity to share her own account away from the suspect and further indicators of trafficking were recognised by hospital staff. The nurse then became aware of a second suspect, who she believed was on his way to the hospital and notified police.

Officers arrived shortly after and arrested a 28 year old woman from Godalming and a 26 year old man from Reading on suspicion of human trafficking offences. The two have been released from police custody but remain under investigation at this time. The victim has been discharged from hospital and is receiving appropriate care.

We commend the staff at Royal Surrey County Hospital for their vigilance and encourage members of the public to be aware of the signs of modern slavery. Modern slavery is a crime that exploits the most vulnerable people in our society. It's a crime that people think exists elsewhere but this incident is just one example of many similar offences in Surrey.

Slavery also takes the form of labour exploitation and it's a crime that is hidden in plain sight. Next time you are at a car wash, think about who's cleaning your car – nail bars, building sites, domestic work – all these are places where modern slavery can flourish.

It can be difficult to spot the signs but if you have any suspicions please report it. If you have any concerns, please call the 24/7 confidential Modern Slavery Helpline on 0800 0121 700, or 999 in an emergency.

#### **Spot the signs of Modern Slavery**

#### 1. PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Victims may show signs of physical or psychological abuse, look malnourished or unkempt, or appear withdrawn

#### 2. ISOLATION

Victims may rarely be allowed t travel on their own, seem under the control, influence of others, rarely interact or appear unfamiliar with their neighbourhood or where they work.

#### 3. POOR LIVING CONDITIONS

Victims may be living in dirty, cramped or overcrowded accommodation, and/or living and working at the same address.

#### 4. FEW OR NO PERSONAL EFFECTS

Victims may have no identification documents, have few personal possessions and always wear the same clothes day in day out. What clothes they do wear may not be suitable for their work.

#### 5. RESTRICTED FREEDOM OF MOVEMENT

Victims have little opportunity to move freely and may have had their travel documents retained, e.g. passports

#### 6. UNUSUAL TRAVEL TIMES

They may be dropped off/collected for work on a regular basis either very early or late at night.

#### 7. RELUCTANT TO SEEK HELP

Victims may avoid eye contact, appear frightened or hesitant to talk to strangers and fear law enforcers for many reasons, such as not knowing who to trust or where to get help, fear of deportation, fear of violence to them or their family






#### Heritage Weekend ~ Effingham Chapel



Most counties in England have an annual 'Ride & Stride' on the second Saturday in September, to raise money for church restoration and repair. Cyclists (and walkers) are given a list of participating churches in their area, but map out their own route by bike or on foot, and then get friends to sponsor them for a fixed amount per church visited. The money collected is divided into two, with half going to the church of the cyclist's choice; the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need who apply for a grant. In the dozen or so years that the Bike Ride has been running, Surrey has raised over £250,000.

Sometime ago I wrote letting you know that I was reading this book each day, I have found it so helpful and inspiring so here are a few more words from Max Lucado, the complier. I have chosen words appropriate to where we are in the church's year.

Max says: We don't know where the disciples went when they fled the garden but we do know what they took: a memory. They took a heart stopping memory of a man who called himself no less than God in the flesh. And they could not get him out of their minds. Try as they might to lose him in the crowd, they could not forget him. If they saw a leper they thought of his compassion. If they heard a storm they would remember the day he silenced one. If they saw a child they would think of the day he held and blessed one.

The church of Jesus Christ began with a group of frightened men in a second floor room in Jerusalem. Although they had marched with Jesus for three years they now sat...afraid. They were timid soldiers, reluctant warriors, speechless messengers. So, daring to dream that the master had left them some word, some plan, some direction they came back to that upper room.

But little did they know that their wildest dream wasn't wild enough! Just as someone mumbles "It's no use", they hear a noise. They hear a voice say "Peace be with you"

The one betrayed sought his betrayers. What did he say to them? Not 'What a bunch of flops' Not 'I told you so.' No 'Where were you when I needed you?' speeches. But simply the phrase 'Peace be with you.' The very thing he offered was the one thing they didn't have, peace, and what a difference it made!

He says to us 'Peace be with you' too.






Mike Essex is still suffering with leg problems and continuing with treatment.


