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The Ministers Write...

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

Time away at Spring Minister School this week was an interesting experience. Considered to be a time of refreshment as well as learning, we focused on 'Renewing Preaching'. Each morning we were blessed with worship and within it three very different styles of preaching: Rev Dr Janet Wootton, Director of Studies for the Congregational Federation; Rev Dr David Firth, lecturer in Old Testament St John's College, Nottingham; Rev Dr Lance Stone, former Director of Pastoral Studies at Westminster College and now minister of Emmanuel URC Cambridge. We are told that a good sermon presents old truths in new ways; it may even welcome personal testimony but it will always involve the invitation to enter into the biblical narrative. Each of our preachers did so with great passion and enthusiasm.

"Settle in your mind, that no sermon is worth much in which the Lord is not the principal speaker. There may be poetry, refinement, historic truth, moral truth, pathos, and all the charms of rhetoric; but all will be lost, for the purposes of preaching, if the word of the Lord is not the staple of the discourse." - John Hall

Workshops on 'Preaching as Performance' as well as 'The place of Preaching in the Reformed Tradition' gave us insights into the impact of preaching from our roots right the way through to our offering today. We even asked the question, "in this visually expectant world, is there still a place for preaching in the 21st century?" Many believe that there still is, although the use of technology may well play a larger part in its delivery. Clearly there are things we can do to improve the content of our sermons as well as the way we present them. We can even make sure we don't exhibit any distracting habits while preaching but I think it's very easy to forget what an enormous responsibility many hold in offering to preach week after week. Hours of contemplation and study will go into its preparation. The preacher is vulnerable, sharing their deepest thoughts, hoping to offer us insights into the spiritual realm.

They may make us feel uncomfortable, challenge us, but hopefully they will also encourage us, take us on a journey to a place we never knew existed.

Even though it may be easy to be critical of the preacher or leader of worship, we need to be hospitable and gracious in embracing their offering because God is not absent in our worship together.

"Preaching is effective as long as the preacher expects something to happen - not because of the sermon, not even because of the preacher, but because of God."

As we seek to welcome the Holy Spirit at Pentecost may we always be open to welcoming God's presence in worship in whatever way He chooses to meet with us.

"Methodism Is For Me"

For several weeks the Methodist Recorder has urged us to have our photos taken holding a poster displaying these words! This has got me thinking about why I have been a Methodist for 70 years. I was brought up a Presbyterian and in my teens at some point I felt I would like to preach a sermon, so I approached the minister. "We don't have lay preachers in our church", he said.

Many years later, having trained for full time youth work and been appointed to a job as girls club leader at a seven night a week club for about 200 boys and girls at Greenwich Central Hall, I decided to become a Methodist. The minister, Rev. Leslie Wollen, suggested that I might consider going in for local preaching. So I began my training sessions, going each week on the back of a young man's motor bike to a minister in Welling. This young man sadly fell victim to polio, was in an iron lung, emerged paralysed from the waist down but still continued to preach from his wheel chair.

I continued my training in the Isle of Man and was received into full connection just before leaving the Island, now seven months pregnant. Since then I have been involved with Methodist Churches large and small, in villages, towns, suburbs and cities, and feel that for me its strengths are:

- 1. The local preacher system so ordinary Christians can develop and share their faith.
- 2. The circuit system so that ministers have colleagues to share their problems with.
- 3. The House Group system which enables every member to explore and develop their faith, now adopted by most other denominations.

Yes, after all this time, Methodism is definitely for me!

They had just made the journey from Jerusalem, and a hard slog it had been because of the heavy hearts they carried, but now they were prepared to go back to tell the others what they had experienced. But the journey would not be a struggle as their hearts were now no longer sad but full of joy. The journey back would be unlike any other they had ever made! Doubt was gone and they were ready to race home to tell their friends of their meeting with the Lord. Their lives would never be the same again.

OK, so let's be reasonable, things like this don't happen to us do they? But stories in the Bible show us that amazing things did happen amongst his early followers and I believe, continue to happen today. Last month we celebrated Aldersgate Sunday when John Wesley had his 'warmed heart' experience and we know what happened after that. Lives are changed by a meeting with Jesus so let folk know about your journey and encounters and see what happens!



Christ Church Elders/LMC Leadership Team Meeting 23rd April 2014 Our Future Together

We began by sharing what both our congregations had thought at their recent meetings about the various ideas for our churches coming together. Everyone agreed the need for a clear Mission Plan before we can go forward with any development plans. We need to determine what God wants for our churches in Leatherhead. Once our mission is clear, our plans could take a few years to achieve. We must look at how we are going to serve the people best in the decades ahead and provide a lasting heritage for Leatherhead.

We felt it was disappointing that the CPL report had not shown up any neutral sites in Leatherhead for development. Our only option is to redevelop one of our two current church sites together. Both our sites have their own pros and cons. LMC is nearer the centre of town but Christ Church has a lot more space to offer.

Many showed enthusiasm about wanting to do something exciting for Leatherhead. Some thought the plans were too large scale and thought smaller scale/refurbishments plans, would be better. We agreed that we want a church centre that is a hub of the community, with a modern worship space.

Three joint groups will meet: -

- Mission Plan,
- Merging Congregations,
- Review of Finance and CPL Report.

These groups will produce their own brief and an interim report for 23rd July at the next joint Leaders/Elders Meeting and will bring their recommendations to a further joint meeting in October as far as possible.

We agreed that we would continue with joint services once a month and try to make these services inclusive to all.

SUPERINTENDENT'S LETTER

Dorking and Horsham Circuit

Dear Friends,

I'm writing this in the week leading up to my sabbatical. For three months (May, June, July) I will not be taking part in the normal activities of a circuit minister. I will be involved in a range of other useful, relaxing, inspiring and worthwhile pursuits, but these will be outside the regular business of ministering to a local church or circuit.

First I need to ensure that other people are around to cover all the important responsibilities which I will be temporarily relinquishing. In doing so I have discovered that other people are also taking time off – for long holidays, or for visiting family, or to recover from a patch of ill health. In putting together the circuit plan there is a slight shortage of available preachers, so one Sunday in the summer each church will have to cope with 'local arrangements' in order to ensure that an act of worship takes place.

All this leads me to reflect on the extent of our responsibility to the church. On the one hand we need people to hold office. We need circuit stewards and church stewards and treasurers and property officers and preachers and communion stewards and pastoral visitors and cleaners and people willing to bake cakes and serve drinks. Without people to do these things the church could not function as it does.

On the other hand, no-one is indispensable. The future of the church does not rest on any one person's shoulders. This can be demonstrated by the fact that when a person does leave a role, whether through choice or as a result of unavoidable circumstances, the church does not immediately roll over and die. God's work goes on. Others step into the breach. (Though admittedly sometimes only after considerable anguish and arm-twisting.) Or the work changes and we realise some roles are no longer needed.

I think all our churches struggle to find the right people (or indeed any people at all) to fill the various roles which we see as important. Maybe we should take our cue from Jesus. Matthew 9:37-38 reads: Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

Interestingly Jesus did not tell his disciples to roll up their sleeves and get stuck in. He told them to pray for God to send more workers. I like this approach for two reasons.

One. It saves us from thinking that everything depends on our own personal efforts. Over the centuries God has called many people to do the work of the Kingdom. One of the most effective things we can do to address any shortage of workers is to pray for God to stir up and equip people to take on the important tasks. After all, it's God's harvest not ours.

Two. If we are consistently praying for God to send people to help, and if we are honest and sincere about that prayer, we can't help but reflect on whether the task is something we could be tackling ourselves. MWiB Conference 'Why Bother...?'

Between the four of us, we were encouraged to be 'bothered' about world mission, our personal faith and dementia.

Jane, Tracy and Sue have thoughts about the weekend, each very different:

What will I remember from the weekend? Over two hundred laughing, smiling faces. Yes, many of them were surrounded by grey hairs... but anyway mine is not as brown as it was. And it was quite nice to be referred to repeatedly as "you young ones"!

There is a lot of life in this movement. Everywhere I looked, I could see enthusiastic faith and a love of sharing it together. So many stories were told about how God is alive and active, in our own communities and in situations of deepest need.

I was something of an imposter, having never shown much interest in the work of Network or Methodist Women in Britain up till now (sorry Jean!) But the MWiB stalwarts in my group were very forgiving and absolutely drew me to their hearts. The closing communion, where we shared bread and wine round our little table and blessed each other on our journeys, was an intimate and special moment that I will not forget. We had a spare seat in our group, and I'm sure it was occupied by a smiling Jesus, happy to share a table with his sisters.

We should help sufferers to live for the moment and have enjoyment in each day. Swanwick 2014 has inspired me and given me a desire to try and make a difference to the elderly in Leatherhead, particularly those suffering from dementia.

YouTube Videos

In the last ten or twenty years life has changed beyond recognition because of the rise of the internet and social media. No longer do radio announcers say "Drop us a line" but "Drop us a tweet". YouTube has about one billion users.

So how should we in the church respond to this? Do we need to become cyber-savvy saints? Jesus said, "I tell you, lift up your eyes, and see how the fields are already white for harvest." (John 4:35).

Social media represent a tremendous opportunity to proclaim the Christian message. Thousands of people could be reached in one go. The same is true of Christian radio as well, but whereas the cost of running a Christian radio station is enormously expensive, anyone with a laptop, internet connection and digital camera can upload a video to YouTube for nothing more than the cost of the camera batteries. Whether it be to lead people to the Lord for the first time or to help and encourage those who are already Christians, there is a great potential for ministry!

The great thing about it is also that one never needs to be afraid that you'll be forcing your ideas down someone's throat. No one will see your video unless they first type the relevant key-words into the YouTube search engine, and if anyone doesn't like your video, they can soon hit the back button or leave a comment saying why they disagree with it. It's NOT like grabbing someone by the scruff of the neck and saying "Brother are you saved?"!

It's also very good for people like me who are not very good at spontaneous conversation, but much better at speaking forth a prepared message. I'm not very good at deciding who to speak to, what to say and when to say it.

With all this in mind, I have recently uploaded four videos to YouTube. In case anyone is interested in watching them, the titles are as follows:-

- "Is it possible to prove Christianity is true?",
- "Arguments against evolution from a Christian point of view",
- "The obesity crisis and how to lose weight",
- "Road safety and bad driving practices".

Since I'm new to making videos, I hope there won't be too much of a cringe factor! If anyone has any criticisms, suggestions or ideas for improvement, I would be quite happy to hear from you.




