

The Ministers Write...

From Rev Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

Let me introduce you to our first grandson Dylan born on the 12th April. Dylan is of course the most scrumptious grandson in the world and my days off where possible are spent making the journey to Birmingham.

I am of course thrilled to be a grandmother and it's interesting watching your own child dealing with the challenges of motherhood. The constant need for feeding, winding and nappy changing make the day full, demanding and tiring, and yet tending to his needs offers an overwhelming sense of joy. It is the very reason perhaps that we forget the pain



of childbirth so quickly. I am reminded that babies are entirely reliant on their parents or the person who is caring for them to provide for all their needs. Their survival is dependent upon the provision of food, warmth and security. Without good care they will not thrive or grow.

As Dylan grows he will become more and more independent. It's interesting that although we deem this as a crucial part of our growth as human beings we are called as disciples of Christ to become more dependent upon God. Abraham, Jacob and Moses all knew that their very substance and success was all about their dependence upon God. They could not fulfil the will of God in their own strength but by being dependent upon his providence. The Israelites also knew that their survival was dependent upon God's provision in the wilderness and in the promised land.

In Proverbs we find in 3:5-8:

- "Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding;

 in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.

 Do not be wise in your own eyes; fear the LORD and shun evil.
- ⁸ This will bring health to your body and nourishment to your bones.

Its seems that although we grow to become independent people we are also reminded that a dependency upon God is crucial for our spiritual growth. To be dependent upon God is not to relinquish all responsibility, but to recognise that although we are called to play our part, God is our sustainer. We place our trust and reliance in the one whose deep love for humanity desires a relationship. Under God's guidance we can achieve the impossible, for he will use the heart that entrusts itself to his ways and his will. As we trust God more and more in the everyday we become more dependent upon him, his purposes becomes our ways and that relationship deepens.

In doing so we also learn that we are also called to be mutually dependent and supportive of one another, in other words interdependent. As a grandmother I find there is a greater need to be interdependent, we need each other particularly at significant times in our lives.

However, let's not forget where our strength comes from "You are my strength, I sing praise to you; you, God, are my fortress, my God on whom I can rely."

Immediately everything was tidier, because everybody could see it all.

Anyway after my 'confession', a friend offered to come round and 'sort it all out'. This offer didn't fill me with enthusiasm, because at the same time she admitted that her family barricaded rooms against her when she was in tidying mode! However, I did feel inspired to clear it up myself!

So the next day I decided to sort out and clear up my study. I began by sorting out a pile of papers and magazines – perhaps a mistake! Of course I was tempted to read some of them, useful as they were, with resources in them I could use – surely why I had kept them in the first place. Perhaps you've experienced the same thing! As you can see I am one of life's 'keepers' rather than 'disposers'.

As always, it was harder than I expected to actually throw things away, but I made a huge effort and slowly the 'chuck away' pile grew higher than the 'keep' pile. To let go of these things can be transformational for us, giving us a new sense of purpose and identity. To let God into them can make just the difference we have been looking and hoping for.




The Editor Writes...

There's a spirit in the air......

In the March edition of the Link we talked of changes concerning worship in Cobham Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church. As a way of clarifying June for those who are slightly unsure:

Second Sundays will always be together at Cobham United Reformed Church (12th June)
Third Sundays will always be together at Cobham Methodist Church (19th June)

In the spirit of becoming one church where possible we had our first joint leadership meeting. It was immensely encouraging, with a real air of hospitality and a shared vision to work earnestly together. I offer you a brief outline of our conversation:

- Elders, stewards and those on coffee duty who are already on a rota, to continue to offer their services if required in whichever church we worship in.
- Where possible to have two people from each church to offer communion to make up the four.
- Usually we have 2 readings so there will be one reader from each church.
- Envelopes given during the offering will be given to their respective churches. Consideration will also be given to the church-specific charities throughout the year i.e. Commitment for Life; All We Can.
- Prayer meeting/house fellowship/Men's fellowship/bible study/Early Bird will be joint activities in the future.
- Work on offering effective ministry to children specifically at the Methodist church.
- Websites to have links to each other's webpages.
- Where possible we would try to blend the pages of the Link. magazine to incorporate what we do together.

Realistic objectives will be set at each meeting (every 2 months) to keep us moving.

We will meet with an already-united church to explore the benefits and the challenges of becoming one church.

We will encourage participation by the mission officer as we look at our mission statement.

There is much work yet to be done but the meeting was a very positive step forwards and I must thank the leadership teams for their wisdom and guidance. I feel really encouraged.


Early Bird Service at Cobham URC

Dear Friends,

During our spring synod a good proportion of the time was spent in groups discussing marriage and relationships. I'd like to share some of my thoughts about this discussion, including aspects of the topic which hadn't before occurred to me.

Two principles, which are often at odds with each other, are relevant here. One is the need for the church to move with the times and to find ways to adapt and apply the Christian faith to the prevailing culture. The other is the need for the church to safeguard and stand by what is good and right and true, even if it puts us at odds with the prevailing culture.

Both principles are important. For example, marriage as a partnership between two equal parties is a very modern concept. Within living memory the different roles of husband (breadwinner) and wife (housewife and mother) were ingrained in our culture. And the Biblical writers assumed that such a difference of roles was normal and uncontroversial. ("Wives, obey your husbands" wrote Paul.) I'm sure that supporting the modern idea of equality between men and women is the right thing to do.

A different example would be the way that casual sex is portrayed on television as part of a normal healthy lifestyle. I am not sufficiently involved in youth culture these days to know if the TV reflects reality. I hope not. It's certainly not something that the church should be going along with. Sex is a beautiful gift of God, but intended to be an intimate expression of a loving and committed relationship. There is nothing casual about it.

A major factor which contributes to our views on this subject is our understanding of Biblical authority. How much of it should we treat as the inspired word of God, meant to teach and equip us? (My answer would be: all of it.) How much of it was written in a specific context, meant for people living in a specific culture, and incorporating all kinds of assumptions based on the perspective of the author? (My answer would again be: all of it.) (Continued on the back page)

Café Church, Messy Church, Tuesday Teas and "Connect", our dementia support group. are going from strength to strength thanks to a noble band of volunteers. These meetings provide an opportunity for the local churches reach out to our village and local community, involving young and old in a wide range of activities. We also meet for a prayer walk or a prayer lunch every few months to share problems, local and international issues. Our C of E friends have been without a minister for nearly a year, so we were all delighted when Revd Mandy McVean was appointed just in time for Easter. She is keen to strengthen our ecumenical links, and has already involved all the churches in planning a service and tea party for the Queen's 90th birthday celebrations on June 12th.

Mandy's also keen on history so we hope to be able to persuade more of Effingham to get involved in **Heritage Open Days Weekend.** The Chapel will be open as usual on 9th, 10th and 11th September, with an exhibition about local history, our Methodist roots, and local Effingham heroes Lord Howard of Armada fame, and Sir Barnes Wallis, inventor, aircraft designer, but perhaps most famous for the bouncing bomb. We're also giving talks on *Baryonyx*, the Surrey Dinosaur, and there's a fossil dig and a chance to handle meteorites.

The Chapel is due a quinquennial inspection later this year, so a survey of the settlement cracks in the hall wall has just been completed. We'll also be pollarding trees and removing a large bush which is encroaching on the road, and asking for quotes from local builders for a new flint wall and fence for the Chapel Hill boundary.

As Circuit Archivist I'd like to archive any records before our Superintendent leaves the Circuit in July/August. Please check your records and notify me, so that the appropriate paperwork can be authorised and records or artefacts taken to Surrey History Centre in Woking.

The task of the church today is to read what was written long ago in a particular context and understand what it says to us about life in today's context. Sometimes this is very easy. When Jesus told his disciples during the Last Supper, "Love one another as I have loved you," we can take those words spoken to 12 particular people on a specific evening and hear Jesus commanding members of today's church to care for one another with the same devotion and self-sacrifice Jesus showed. Other times it is not so easy to understand. When the council at Jerusalem instructed the new Gentile converts to "abstain from food sacrificed to idols," what are we to make of that? We have to draw out the principle behind it. Are we simply being encouraged to take care over what we eat – buying only "Fairtrade" goods for example?

Bear in mind also that even in the original context, not all laws were intended to be universal. Some (such as "sell all your possessions and give to the poor") were intended for one person alone. Some (such as "do this whenever you drink, to remember me" or "the bishop must be above reproach, the husband of but one wife") for the community of Christians. Some (such as "be fruitful and increase in number") for the whole human race.

I have deliberately avoided tackling the controversial issue of gay marriage here for two reasons. One is that our thoughts on gay marriage need to be based on a proper understanding of the relationship between Biblical authority and modern culture (which I hope I have stimulated thoughts about). The other is that I believe that the scope of the Methodist church review of marriage and relationships should encompass a wide range of topics, including the place of sex in relationships, the meaning and relevance of marriage in today's society, what it means to be male or female or transgender, our attitudes to divorce and remarriage and the culture of 'serial monogamy'. Our approach as a church to gay marriage can only make sense as part of this wide-ranging review.

To finish on a different note – as this will be my last contribution to the circuit newsletter, I'd like to say how much I have enjoyed my seven years in the Dorking and Horsham circuit. I have appreciated my hard-working and supportive colleagues, both lay and ordained. And I am grateful for all the fascinating people I have met across the circuit.

As the circuit embarks on a new journey, which at the time of writing is not even clear, my prayers will go with you. God bless you all.

Did you know that you can get an email from the Bible Society with a roundup of topical stories in the newspapers each week? Food for thought?

Here's this week's selection

Pope willing to set up study into possibility of women deacons.

Pope Francis says he is prepared to commission a study into whether women can enter the Catholic clergy at the rank of deacon — one below a priest. He was making the remarks in a closed-door meeting in Rome with senior members of women's religious orders.

Vicars urged to rein in the jokes and rambling anecdotes in sermons. A week before the Christian Resources Exhibition International in London, research has found that churchgoers would far rather clergy stick to serious topics and leave the jokes to the comedians! A survey by Christian Research found that they ranked weighty explanations of the Bible as 27 times as important in a sermon as humour; and 'practical application' 42 times more highly than personal anecdote. The survey comes in advance of the first Sermon of the Year competition at CRE. (Hmmmmmm !!!!)

A former Deputy Police and Crime Commissioner is going to appeal a ruling which found her quilty of serious misconduct after she asked to pray with the family of a murder victim.

Charities say advertising industry biased against Christians, as buses carry 'praise Allah' adverts ~ Christian charities are claiming the advertising industry is biased against them, as buses across England are set to carry adverts praising Allah this Ramadan. 


We are delighted that Margaret Hughes' second operation on her eye was successful and that she can now see. We wish her well for the future.


