The Minister Writes...

From Rev Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

We are all familiar with the recent headlines focusing on 'environmental issues'. The industrialised world is challenged by them and the political arena fraught with the reality that change is inevitable if we are to avert some kind of irreversible damage, both to the environment and to ourselves.

With champions like Sir David Attenborough and the many who chose to protest recently, with weeklong disruptions in the capital, we are aware of the hugely contentious issue affecting not just us here in this country but worldwide. We are challenged when we hear from the UN that 1 million species could be extinct within decades, and by a recent exploration in the Mariana Trench by the deepest ever submarine dive, when they found a plastic bag on the seabed. So what does the bible teach us about the intended relationship between humankind and God's created world?

Psalm 8:

"what is humankind that you are mindful of them, human beings that you care for them?

⁵ You have made them a little lower than the angels and crowned them with glory and honour.

⁶ You made them rulers over the works of your hands; you put everything under their feet:

⁷ all flocks and herds,

and the animals of the wild,

* the birds in the sky, and the fish in the sea,

all that swim the paths of the seas.

⁹ LORD, our Lord,

how majestic is your name in all the earth!"

The Psalm teaches us that we are made a little lower than the angels, made rulers over the works of God's hands, crowned with glory and honour. God has bestowed upon us something incredibly precious, the gift of his created world. It also says that everything is 'under our feet'. In light of the environmental challenges the world faces, I wonder if we may have done a little too much trampling and little less consideration given about where we lay our feet.

If as it suggests in Psalm 139, "all things are fearfully and wonderfully made," then all God's created world is demanding of respect and honour, in doing so we respect the creator.

It is true that we live in an industrialized world and that is a reality we must contend with, a creative tension between the joy of praising God for his provision without relinquishing responsibility for the gift. Our attitude to such a gift must be questioned, the minute that we decide to 'possess' the gift, we decide to take ownership of it, we succumb to the view that it is a commodity to be shaped by human hands and human ways. We forget so easily that we have only been entrusted with the gift, it is not for us to own. It is however for us to delight in, to respect and honour, to give glory to God. Perhaps some of what I am expressing here is that our attitude to God's creation and the giver of the gift needs embodying in what we do on a daily basis. We sit on the cusp of Pentecost, an acknowledgment that like the disciples we journey onwards, with Gods presence within us, around us and before us. It is however a different world in so many ways. Yet God does not abandon his creation even though we may feel we have made some disastrous choices, he comes to empower his people to embrace the world, to engage with the concerns it presents, to embody his people with the mind of God and the ways of God. The Holy Spirit is calling us to draw near to the creator and his creation.

To love God is to love one another, to love every living breathing creature and to respect the land we call home. It is going to require an acute sense of listening and sacrificial living if we are to make any kind of headway on issues concerning the environment by individuals and the industrialized nations. But I believe it begins with an appreciation for what we have been given, thankfulness and praise manifests itself in good stewardship.

We must each ask ourselves in this time when we welcome the Holy Spirit, what is God calling us to do? If we are God's representatives on this earth, how might our voices and our actions on environmental issues give glory to God, for we are crowned with glory and honour?

From Rev Jan Hofmeyr

Dear Friends,

As we think about Pentecost this month, I am reminded of Jesus' words to His disciples, 'The Holy Spirit will come upon you and you will be my witnesses'. One of the major things for which the Spirit empowers us is to be witnesses.

Only some people are called to be evangelists; but we are all called to be witnesses. All of us have things we can tell about our walk with Jesus. In telling other people about that we are being witnesses. Witnessing happens not only when we speak to non-Christians; witnessing happens when we are speaking to Christians too.

After His resurrection Jesus said to the disciples, 'As the Father has sent me, so I am sending you.' Jesus came as a witness to the Good News. What is there in the example of Jesus that we can follow as witnesses to the Good News?

For one thing, Jesus witnessed through His actions. He witnessed by caring for people, by feeding people, by healing people, by listening to people. People experienced the love of God through His actions. And equally, people will experience God's love through our actions. The most prominent Christ-follower of recent decades, Mother Theresa, was known for her deeds, more than her words. Francis of Assisi said something to this effect, 'Go and be a witness for Jesus, and, if necessary, also use words'. As someone has put it, 'People won't care how much we know until they know how much we care.'

But our words remain important. I remember hearing of someone who decided He would witness to Jesus purely through his actions, without saying anything. After a while a work colleague said to him, 'You know, I have seen a big change in your life recently; what has happened? Have you become a vegetarian?'

Although we are called to be witnesses it's important to realise that we are not the ones who can change people's hearts and minds. That is the work of the Spirit. All we can do is present Jesus to people through our words and deeds and leave the rest to the Lord. I think it was Mother Theresa who first said, 'God has not called us to be successful but to be faithful'. Our part is to be faithful – the results we leave to God. God is the only one who can make our efforts 'successful'. We simply make ourselves available and trust God to do whatever He wants to do. So whatever form our witnessing may take, our part is to be faithful. We sow the seeds through our witness; God is the only one who can make those seeds germinate and grow.

It's good to remember that when we witness to someone and seek to lead them closer to Jesus, we are not asking them to do something that is strange and foreign; we are in fact asking them to do something which is most natural – to return to the God who loves them and made them. When we invite someone to come to Jesus, we are not inviting them to some strange and foreign place; we are inviting them home.

'You will receive the Holy Spirit and you will be my witnesses'. Those words of Jesus to His disciples are for us too.

May the Lord bless us and make us a blessing as His witnesses to Christ's work in our lives.

Premises Redevelopment – Where are we now?

It's the Anniversary of our Union on 20^{th} May 2018. You may recall our Vision included that we would become a Visual, Vibrant Church with the congregation increased from 50 to 150 in five years. It is not impossible. We will do it.

One element of achieving this Vision is to improve our premises. Our 38 Stoke Road premises are very practical but we need to improve our visibility from the road and in the community, we need to capture the intimacy that was at Cedar Road and we need to provide a welcoming environment to those using our premises and to the public at large.

We are delighted to announce that one of our members, Terry Lazenby who has much project management experience, has agreed to be CUC Premises Redevelopment Project Manager. At the time of writing Terry has already organised a beauty parade of four Architects and we selected EMJ who have much experience of redeveloping churches.

With the help of EMJ we have looked at various options and are currently narrowing them down in formal and informal discussions with the CUC Congregation. Methodist Circuit and URC Southern Synod have also been updated on the status of our project. Whatever project we finally agree, it is likely to take two years. However, there will be a phasing so we can build it in manageable bites.

It is very exciting. We have set up a Fund Raising committee as we will probably need to raise circa £1 million. We are blessed as we may be able to get a grant from The Methodist Church being part of the proceeds of the sale of Cedar Road. We will also be looking to other organisations from whom we may be able to obtain grants, but they will not help us unless they see we are making a big effort to help ourselves. With the help of our Social and Outreach Committees we are going to have fun in raising this money. We are also convinced that by involving anyone and everyone whose skills are necessary to redevelop our premises, it will help us reach a congregation of 150 with families and a thriving Junior Church.





Thy Kingdom Come... how often don't we pray those words? Maybe too often or perhaps not often enough! Whatever the case in your circumstances I trust you have all, in some measure, been made aware of the initiative undertaken by the Anglican Archbishops of Canterbury and York in 2016 to bring a fresh impetus to this prayer in the life of the Church.

Initially they sounded their call within the Church of England, but it is a call that has resonated across the denominations and now, three years on, the net has spread far and wide, clean across the globe in fact! What an amazing opportunity for us as a Church to engage with the prayer that is at the heart of the prayer that Jesus gave us.

Thy Kingdom Come calls the Church to catch afresh the vision of the first followers of Jesus and to discover afresh the call to prayer. It focuses on the period between the Ascension of Jesus and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Luke very intentionally records for us in Acts 1 & 2 that the first followers of Jesus were gathered together in prayer in that period between the Ascension and Pentecost. As a result, they were ready when God intervened to respond and become the radical agents for change in their world the Kingdom called them to be.

The call to prayer through the TKC initiative is twofold. In the first instance we are challenged to pray daily for five people we know who haven't yet entered into a living and vital relationship with God in Christ. I know, we should be praying for them every day, but you've got to start somewhere, so why not here! Secondly, there is the opportunity to join in various prayer activities over the course of those 9-11 days (depends how you count them!). There are materials available here: https://www.thykingdomcome.global/ and if you look at the website you will see numerous events listed that you might perhaps participate in or even set up yourselves. Here at London Road we are having a Prayer Day on Saturday 8th June from 10am – 4pm in conjunction with St Andrew's, Southwater and Partridge Green. If you're not otherwise engaged, come and join in the activities on offer through the course of the day. There will be a service at 12:30pm as a focal point for the event. What better way for us to prepare to receive again the incredible gift of grace that is the total infusion of the life and love of God in the Holy Spirit? Thy Kingdom come! Who's bold enough to pray that prayer with me?!



DORKING

We celebrated our Church Anniversary in March, with Revd Peter Hills as the preacher. He is the Methodist Ecumenical Officer for Surrey. We appreciate a legacy of £1000 from a friend at Effingham. Our Chaplain maintains her caring ministry in the Centre, and the Resources and Finance Committee meets monthly for oversight of the Centre's work. A recent exercise has been to revisit the mission of the Centre. Two new activities which the Centre is pleased to facilitate are: the Repair Café on the first Saturday of every month, when a team of volunteers mends clothes, small electrical items and the like for a small fee; and an afternoon tea for dementia sufferers. We are even wondering about the possibility of a defibrillator just outside the Centre. Our annual Plant and Cake Sale took place early in May, raising a record of over £870.

COBHAM UNITED

Holy week and Easter services were, as usual, inspiring. On Maundy Thursday we shared a simple meal before moving on to a Communion service, ending in the quiet darkness of the Tenebrae. On Good Friday we remembered the crucifixion together before going on to share in the Silent Witness round the Cross in the centre of Cobham. The Easter Communion Service was a time of rejoicing together, including dressing the cross on the outer wall of the church with flowers.

We now have approval from TMCP in Manchester for the sale of the Cedar Road property (still subject to the buyer's surveyor's report). It does at last feel as if that process is coming to a conclusion.

We are working on developments of the United Church in two ways. 

NewSPAL - the new Surrey Performing Arts Library




