

From Rev Gavin Hancocks

Dear Friends,

As we move past Pentecost we enter the period called Ordinary Time in the Christian calendar. A time for us to reflect on the Advent to Easter to Pentecost journey and what is the impact it is making in my life here and now. As we think about that I want to share something with you we were exploring in my Friday morning Bible Study at London Rd. We have been looking at Luke's Gospel with the help of Michael Wilcock's The Message of Luke. It is proving to be a challenging and stimulating journey as we explore familiar passages discovering new emphases and fresh insight into the old, old story that is ever new.

Recently we were exploring the second half of chp 13 and chp 14. As we finished reading the verses together, one of the group remarked on just how hard it was and who then was to be saved?! The piece we were reading was about the narrow door in chp 13:22ff and it hangs together all the way through to the end of chp 14. At first glance it does seem to be a series of disconnected sayings, each one raising the ante a little more than the previous ultimately leaving us with the exasperated conclusion: 'Well, just who then can be saved?'

Actually, we discovered, I hope, it's not that at all! Jesus isn't telling us how hard it is to get into the Kingdom, he's inviting us to get the priority right. Matt Redman in his song 'When the music fades' writes:

> I'm coming back to the heart of worship, And it's all about You, All about You, Jesus. I'm sorry, Lord, for the thing I've made it, When it's all about You, All about You, Jesus.

As we explored the various situations from questions about who's going to be saved, to Herod's interference, healing on the Sabbath,

dinner invitations and heavenly banquets and final plans and not losing our zest for making a difference we came back to this one thing again and again – unless Jesus is the priority in our lives, the one to whom we simply come and lay our all before, we may well be found to be missing the narrow door, not to some better life in a distant future, but to the celebration that is the Kingdom life now, here! Or to put it in the words of Matt Redman:

> When the music fades, all is stripped away, And I simply come; Longing just to bring something that's of worth That will bless Your heart. I'll bring You more than a song, For a song in itself Is not what You have required. You search much deeper within Through the way things appear; You're looking into my heart.

All he needs to see is that the room there is for him and him alone and then anything, everything, is possible.

Dear Friends,

By the time you receive this magazine we will be celebrating a United Church on the Stoke Road site. It has been an extraordinary journey with hospitality at the very centre of the conversation. We have of course drafted numerous documents, the first of which will have been signed on the 20th May in the presence of the Moderator Nicola Furley Smith, and the District Chair John Hellyar. The journey of course does not stop there, the closing of the premises at Cedar Road heralds the end of one chapter for Cobham Methodist Church, but the beginning of another at Stoke Road.

We have committed to record an ecumenical vision statement for the united Church and I offer this to you now:

Ecumenical Vision Statement

In the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, Cobham Methodist Church and Cobham United Reformed Church commit themselves to: - work together committed to offering loving service to one another. - encouraging shared worship and ministry.

- sowing seeds for growth as disciples of Christ.

- offering and holding one another in loving prayer.

- serving God's mission in our neighbourhood and beyond. - revealing the Kingdom of God through all we do: changing lives, sharing the gospel and healing the broken, through generous and gracious hospitality.

- being an active partner in God's global mission, as far as the disciplines of our Churches allow.

The reality is that these words are simply words upon a page until they are brought to life. The old adage 'actions speak louder than words' is relevant here, for actions reveal one's true character, because it is easy to say things or make promises, but it takes every effort to do things, and of course to follow them through. To think upon this further, at the bottom of the stairs in the manse, we have a large board which was found discarded at the tip, leaning against the wall, and it reads "To accomplish great things, we must not only act, but also dream, not only plan, but also believe."


Like the disciples and the early church we begin this journey a little fragile, finding our way through a new way of being, but propelled by the knowledge that it is by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit that we will achieve all that God intends. '*I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams.*' Acts 2 (quoting Joel 2).

It will not be in our own strength that the church will be driven forward, but by embracing a spirit that will not be confined by our understanding but propelled by God's purposes. We have much to learn, but we have a Spirit that desires to teach us if we are open to receive it and to listen to its nurturing whispers. Our words will express our desires, but it will be by the power of the Spirit working through us that God's glory will be seen.

Let's welcome the Holy Spirit and the many gifts held within, for we are not a wandering people with nowhere to call home, but we dwell in the house of the Lord, isn't that where we want to be?

sary in 2018, Methodist Homes Sunday will have a special emphasis on the achievements of age and the completeness of life. This is an opportunity to celebrate the work of MHA and the need to value older people. Help them to provide things that help older people not just survive, but to thrive. Chaplains are a source of counsel, advice and guidance; Music Therapists can give someone with dementia the opportunity to express their feelings; and Live at Home community based schemes work to make sure people don't become isolated or lonely in their own home.

The Green Shoots of Peace ?


The green shots of peace have sprouted in the Korean peninsula, but the World is sceptical! Promises have been made and broken before, but surely freeing three US citizens, two of whom are Christian, is a positive step forward ?

Open Doors, a charity working secretly in N. Korea, is cautious.

A spokesperson says "Recent positive developments are far from the end of freedom work in North Korea. Instead, they should mark the beginning as we are driven to pray for and advocate for the estimated 50,000 North Korean Christians held in this prison system where abuses and conditions have been described as "as bad or even worse" than Auschwitz, the infamous World War II Nazi concentration camp. For the last 17 straight years, North Korea has been top of **Open Doors World Watch List** as the world's most dangerous country for Christians". Keep praying for real peace, human rights, tolerance and religious freedom.

Father, we praise you for the release of three US citizens, prior to talks between Kim Jung-Un and President Trump. We celebrate their homecoming with their families. But Lord, we know that so much work needs to be done to free Your people from this prison system and to free the 300,000 Christians who must practice their faith in secret. God we ask that you continually bring our North Korean family to mind in our prayers and we ask that You would move in dramatic ways in the hearts and minds of the Kim regime to release the 50,000 Christians imprisoned for their faith-and allow religious freedom to our brothers and sisters in Christ. Amen.





Sir Barnes Wallis moved to Effingham in 1930, and early 'bouncing bomb' experiments were carried out in his garden using the family washtub and his children's marbles. He was Chairman of the Parish Council and a Churchwarden. After his death in 1979 a memorial service was held at St. Lawrence Church and an Avro Vulcan bomber from 617 Squadron (the Dambusters) flew overhead as a mark of respect. So there's another flypast on 2nd June to mark 75th Anniversary of the Dambusters Raid.

Dorking and Horsham Circuit NEWSLETTER

Dear Friends,

Last time I reflected on Eugene Petersen's rendition of Jn 12:24-25 and asked the questions: 'Whose life is it?' and 'What are we doing with it?' basically. Following on from that, as we move beyond Ascension and Pentecost, I want to build on that by considering what it means to be called.

I wonder if it is not true that, for most of us, we see our Christian walk as a matter of our choice. We sing along with Martin Smith of Delirious – I've found Jesus! Think about our language? What is it saying to us? What does Jesus say to us?

Jn 15:16 says: "You didn't choose me, remember; I chose you..." (Msg) in fact, in Methodism we have a strong sense of that in our affirmation of the doctrine of Prevenient Grace – the belief that it is God who prepares the way for us to come to God, most notably expressed in the practice of infant baptism. In other words, what I am suggesting, it is not so much to do with us as it is to do with God and our response. You see, it's about Call. God calls us, and we answer God, but it doesn't end there.

Jn 15:16 goes on to say: "...and put you in the world to bear fruit, fruit that won't spoil." God doesn't simply call us to just be with God, as though it is all about me and my salvation. No! God continues to call us into living, dynamic service in God's name and that's really what Pentecost is all about – power from on high to fulfill our specific calling within the wider calling of grace.

So, what's God calling you to in this Kingdom of love?

We'll be picking their brains for ideas for "Extraordinary Women" which is this year's theme for Heritage Open Days. Local suffragettes perhaps, but we'll certainly include Susannah Wesley, and famous Methodist women. The Chapel will be open from 14th to 16th September, with refreshments, and local history, including *Baryonyx* the Surrey dinosaur of course, and Dave's meteorites. It's now our 10th year as part of England's largest festival of history and culture, with places and events across the country celebrating their heritage, community and history – and it's all FREE. DORKING

The Christian Centre continues to be busy. The Chaplain's main role is pastoral, and she circulates in the Café looking out for people who may be on their own or if they appear to be new Café guests. The people come from not only Dorking but surrounding towns, like Guildford, Kingston or Reigate.

The Chaplain works closely with the St Martin's Pastoral Assistants and attends their monthly meeting. She visits people at home or in hospital when they are ill, especially if they are not church goers. She is a member of the Dorking Ministers' Fellowship where all the clergy/ pastors meet for a six weekly 'sharing' lunch and a time of prayer and it is a privilege being a member of this group. Also she is a member of Churches Together in Dorking.

Lent Bible Sessions were held before Easter and they focused on Krish Kandiah's study notes on 'Living Faith' (*invitations from the cross*). It was encouraging in that the people who attended all came from different churches. We finished with a time of prayer at the end of the series, and people were keen for these prayer sessions to continue, perhaps on a monthly basis.

A limited Listening Service is provided once or twice a week by trained listeners, but more trained listeners are urgently needed in order to be available every weekday for people who require the service. The Centre continues to be a place where people can meet for coffee or lunch, feel safe, talk with a trained person who has a listening ear or to join in with some of the secular activities e.g. chair exercises and sequence dancing.

Recently an ambulance came into the Church Car Park. The Centre had not called an ambulance! The paramedics proceeded to help an elderly gentleman out of the ambulance, saying they brought him to the Centre because he was very lonely and they thought he could have lunch and meet some people. A lovely gesture from the paramedics' point of view.

HOLMAN BIBLE ATLAS by Thomas V. Brisco (Editor)

Bible readers wishing to identify places mentioned in the Bible very possibly rely on the maps usually found at the end of the book. These are often very helpful but are limited in detail and space. More helpful are small and slim Bible atlases which have larger maps but contain only the maps relating to each period in Bible history with little, if any, historical detail.

The Holman Bible Atlas is a much more useful aid to Bible reading and study. It is just short of 300 pages long, measures 28 x 22 centimetres, contains 132 coloured maps co-ordinated with Biblical texts and 140 full colour photographs. It is not just an atlas but has much useful narrative relating to events in Bible history from Genesis to the 4th century AD. This atlas needs to be read as much as referred to. It is described as a Complete Guide to the Expansive Geography of Biblical History. In his Preface to the book Thomas Brisco points out that God conveyed the Bible's message in specific geographical and historical settings and that to understand the Bible today we must hear its words in light of the ancient setting.

The Atlas is in three parts. Part 1 describes the Biblical setting, the extent of the ancient Near East, the natural regions of Palestine and life in ancient Palestine. Part 2 covers the Old Testament including the Hellenistic Period in the inter-testamentary years. Part 3 begins with the emergence of Rome before covering the New Testament and the Christian Church from 70 - 300 AD.

There is a chapter describing the Roman intervention in Palestine (63 – 40 BC) and the emergence of the client king Herod the Great and his reign. The succeeding chapter covers Herod's successors, the Procuratorship (including Pontius Pilate) and the religious groups at this time, namely the Pharisees and the Sadducees.

From the time of King David (circa 1000 BC) onwards there are pictures, diagrams and maps which keep us in touch with the development and history of Jerusalem and the Temple. This ends in 70 AD when the Romans laid siege to the city and destroyed the Temple.

A useful feature of the Atlas is the inclusion across the top of each page of the dates – BC or AD – appropriate to the characters and events on that page. Thus, for example, beginning on page 164 the dates across the top of the page run from 538 BC to 334 BC and include the names Malachi and Nehemiah and also Alexander (the Great).

The maps are colourful, clear and easy to use and understand. The photographs are useful and often they are of actual places mentioned in the Bible. Others are of probable locations of places mentioned in the Bible or where tradition places events.

The Holman Bible Atlas is a very useful tool for the Bible reader and I recommend it. The cost is around £18 online. My own copy is the edition of 1998 but the latest edition is dated 2014.




