# The Ministers Write...

## From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

After a whole month of preparation in worship, our combined church meeting between Cobham Methodist Church and Cobham United Reformed Church on 31st January yielded far more than I had anticipated. We began the local mission and ministry review back in 2013 and had our internal review last year. We recognised that one particular objective would need further attention. A lengthy discussion took place concerning the objective which asked us to consider the resources that exist in the URC and the Methodist Church. We were invited to consider whether we were using the resources that God has given us in the most effective manner. Might God be calling us to look at our relationships, and how we can further the Kingdom of God? In particular, we need to make the best use of our resources human, material and spiritual - in carrying forward God's work in Cobham.

We shared in a fruitful conversation and came to a position where proposals were brought by the meeting. They were concerning sharing more worship together and making movements towards becoming one congregation. There was a clear majority in favour of the proposal to work towards a future together rather than independently and the meeting voted unanimously in favour of sharing more worship.

It was an exciting moment for the churches but of course there is inevitably an element of apprehension about the journey ahead but I don't believe we can speak of growth without speaking about sacrifice too. We may discover that pruning is not always a comfortable task but it is a significant process if growth is desired. It will require many conversations, much prayer and discernment. There will be a need to listen earnestly for the voice of God and at times it will also require compromise. We

In March we are moving towards the cross which speaks so much of sacrifice, but I would also wish us to be reminded that we experience the resurrection at the end of such difficult times. There is new life which blossoms and grows beyond the tomb but we must at times travel through Good Friday before we can experience the beauty of the garden on Easter morning and the significance of a risen saviour. New life is costly but it seems to me that the best things don't come cheap. My father always said to me "Kim if you want anything decent in life it will come at a cost."

We serve a risen saviour, he has already paid the price for us, surely our response is to seek the Kingdom of God with all our hearts, minds and souls and create communities that offer a taste of the Kingdom too.

#### From Rev. Lynda Russell

I wonder how many of you are attending Lent Groups during this period of Lent? Or are you perhaps following your own particular Lent Bible reading plan?

Here in Leatherhead in our joint Lent groups (attended by 'Churches Together in Leatherhead') we are following a book called "The Long Road to Heaven". It is based on the film "The Way", which stars Martin Sheen as Tom, a bereaved father whose son Daniel died as he began to walk a pilgrimage called the 'Camino de Santiago de Compostela'. The Camino is an ancient pilgrimage, starting from a number of different points, but the 'French Way' and perhaps most popular today, begins on the French side of the Pyrenees at St-Jean-Pied-de-Port. The distance of the pilgrimage from there to the Cathedral in Santiago de Compostela is 762km – no small distance! Perhaps you will know someone who has walked it? My tutor at Cambridge had walked it – I have the book she wrote! It is said that

However, as he is told, he cannot do a pilgrimage for someone else, only for himself. During his walk, he becomes aware of what it means for his own restoration, and also that he can't make his journey without others, although initially he tries hard to shut them out.

Lent is a time when we are encouraged to think about our own journey. Can we compare our own faith journey, or even our lives to a pilgrimage? We cannot make either of these journeys for someone else – only for ourselves, however much we might want to at times. Pilgrimage is also a journey into ourselves with God. Sometimes the road is pleasing to walk and the path straightforward; sometimes the road is difficult and we are pausing continually, looking for landmarks or guides to help us find our way. At other times we can be so consumed by our own feelings that we are blind even to the signposts that are there.

Yet the Christian life is an ongoing journey in which Christ is always calling us to turn towards that which gives us life. The Emmaus story, for example, shows us the way of Christ. He seeks us out, even as we walk in the wrong direction, accompanying us, listening to us and helping us understand that to follow him is the path to life.

Christ our companion, you walk with us on the journey of our life; you accompany us even as we are walking away; you stand with us in our confusion and refuse to let us go.

Open our eyes to your presence and our hearts to your good news.

Guide our feet in the ways that lead to life.

Amen.

Dear Friends.

I recently heard someone describing the difference between American and British humour. I'm not familiar enough with American culture to know if this is an accurate analysis but here goes.

Americans are optimistic people. They are brought up with the idea that anyone can become president. Just work hard and there is nothing you cannot achieve. So American comedians are wisecracking heroes. They rise above the problems of life and conquer them with a positive attitude and good humoured banter.

The British expect to fail. We are the fading remnants of a once great empire. When things go wrong we shrug our shoulders and stiffen our upper lips and muddle through somehow. So our British heroes of comedy are downtrodden failures. We sympathise with the underdog. We find humour in seeing people spiral slowly downward into tragedy. Think of Tony Hancock, Basil Fawlty. Del Boy, Frank Spencer, David Brent to name but a few.

Whether or not this is a true distinction or just a sweeping generalisation I think that the attitude of expecting failure has become part of the church culture in Britain. We have only to look at the history of the traditional churches (including Methodism) over the last couple of centuries. Numbers are in decline. Buildings are closing. Young people are staying away in droves.

It doesn't mean we are in state of despair. We struggle on regardless, and we find fulfilment in the struggle. We may even get excited about occasional signs of growth. But we don't expect major changes. We don't expect that over the next generation the church will take the British nation by storm and transform it into a deeply spiritual Christian country. We don't expect to impact our world in the way the early church did – or indeed in the way that Christians in some other countries are doing right now.

This has been very gratefully received. Juliet has also arranged "The Prayer Course" in the Centre on most of the Tuesdays during Lent. We continue to benefit from money given by Mole Valley District Council to pay for our cook and also for setting up activities such as social table tennis, social bridge, arm chair exercises and sequence dancing which remain very popular.

LMC took full part in bringing the Christmas message to Leatherhead. Music and choral events were organised for three weekends in December in conjunction with our Churches Together partners in the town centre. A daily "Kart for Kindness" was manned where passers by could buy gift vouchers to assist local charities.

## LONDON ROAD

On Covenant Sunday we began a new theme in our worship: 'Becoming Confident Disciples'. In addition to the monthly sermon and follow-up discussion in the week, Paul is issuing us with practical challenges relating to the theme. In February, for instance, we are being encouraged to talk about Jesus outside the Church, to conduct our own research into a question of faith and to bring a friend to Church.

After Easter, we will be running a pilot programme of the Compass Course. This is a course of 8 sessions offered by the Methodist Church which seeks to explore what we think about God, the difference Jesus makes and what it means to be a Methodist. The format of the course will be a communal meal followed by discussion and the sessions will be led by Paul and by Beth Little and Rob Pitt, two of our local preachers.

One of the aims in our strategy document is to provide more ways for people to learn about Jesus and the Christian faith. We hope this Course will be helpful to those taking part and that in the autumn we will be able to offer it to those

There's a **World Missions** coffee morning in our church hall on 9<sup>th</sup> April with plants, cakes and a bring and buy stall. Then on Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> April we'll decorate the Chapel in red, white and blue, for our annual **St. George's Day lunch.** 

Meanwhile Effingham's website is looking a bit tired, and old-fashioned! So a small working party met with an expert to give it an overhaul. We were reminded that the website is the front door of our church for many, many people. It's about being welcoming and hospitable. Paul wrote in his letter to the Corinthians that it is through our weakness that God demonstrates his strength and through our folly that God shows his wisdom.

On Good Friday we celebrate the low point of Christ's life. As far as the world was concerned this was the end. He had been betrayed by friends, rejected by the authorities, spurned by the crowds and put to an agonising and dishonourable death. Yet this lowest point was paradoxically the high point of his ministry. "It is finished!" he cried. He had achieved what he set out to do. He had died for the sins of the world

My other thought is that our faith is not ultimately about the success or failure of the church over the last few centuries. Our faith is founded on Christ – who died and rose again! That was a real triumph. Greater than any mere church revival.

On the day I am writing this the British press are sympathising with Andy Murray who failed to win the Australian Open. But nobody really expected him to win. And our love for the underdog means we are OK with that. But wouldn't it be great if Djokovic was the British player? Wouldn't it be wonderful to see our hero enter a tennis final with the expectation of glorious victory? That's the kind of hero we have in Jesus. He is not the head of a struggling church. He is the saviour who conquered death itself. So chin



This year's service has been prepared by Christian women in Cuba. Women in Cuba are generally educated, qualified as technicians and in other professional fields. They play an important role in society, family and church, although it is primarily men who hold key positions of authority.

Although mainly about women and children, the message of the service is that we are called to accept every person as unique and equally worthy in the sight of God. Children tend not to discriminate or judge, and that should be our response to God's love and colour our attitude to all people. WWDP follows their motto "informed prayer, prayerful action".

# Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations

# **Chapter 3: The Practice of Intentional Faith Development**

The chapter begins with three very different stories, from three ages in time, illustrating how faith development can change lives.

The chapter continues by saying that faith in Christ spans a lifetime, especially learning in smaller groups giving support, encouragement and direction by simply talking and praying with each other.

<u>Intentional</u> faith development is a deliberate effort on each person's part to mature in knowledge. In churches there are House Groups, Bible Study, choir, Sunday School, Men's/Women's Fellowships and social opportunities. Some could just be taking part rather than a specific learning group, and some could be beyond church premises. Whatever happens, don't give up, find something to suit. (How long would your LMC list of opportunities be? 12? Or more?)

# Chapter 4: The Practice of Risk-taking Mission and Service.

This practice is about the effort and work needed to make a positive difference in the lives of others, whether or not they are part of a faith community. This could involve going to places of disaster to help clean up and reconstruct. Closer to home help can be given in school projects, food banks, ministering to those at risk. The list is endless. (List those locally). Being part of such schemes increases the vitality of a church fellowship. Inward caring congregations lose their spiritual momentum, although recognising churches still need to keep their concerns in order regarding finance and upkeep. Mission helps to turn church service outward reminding all of Christ's mission of grace, mercy and love to the whole world. Risk-taking mission and

people has been successful, regardless of the size of the congregation. Risk-taking is involved in all we do. To be effective it cannot be a separate issue. Question from the end of the chapter: What is the most unexpected place your faith has taken you in order to

## **Gift Aid**

This short reminder is for the benefit of all the churches within our pastorate (and maybe useful further afield).

Church goers are generous people who, through regular giving or occasional one-off donations, give vital assistance for our work and mission to continue. That giving can be boosted by 25p for every  $\pounds 1$  individuals donate through the Gift Aid scheme. Most members have completed a Gift Aid Declaration which gives your Gift Aid Secretary the permission to claim significant sums of money from "The Tax Man" each year.

New Declaration forms have been prepared for either new donors or those donors whose circumstances have changed. Examples are:-

- want to cancel the declaration
- change of name or address
- no longer paying sufficient tax on income and/or capital gains.

## **Mystery Worshipper**

Over recent months I have noted that there is pressure and comment that we need to improve our welcome as a Church. So being away at New Year in a neighbouring Circuit, I went to a Covenant Service which was a really interesting as it was a medium to small Methodist Church not dissimilar to our own.

The Victorian building has a revamped entrance hall including a ramped entrance for those with mobility problems. It still has its pews, and a screen that somehow seemed smaller than ours. Six light bulbs on the chandeliers were out (the church newsletter records that the church handyman moved away in the late summer), and it had a traditional organ, very similar to our previous one.

So in I went. The two door stewards gave me the order of service for the covenant service, but seemed more interested in chatting to each other. No interest if I was new or a visitor? So I wandered in and found a seat towards the middle.

The service started with the steward's welcome which was a little difficult to hear as he was obviously not plugged into the sound system.

The lady Minister then started. Quite formidable, in black suit with green top, though with somehow a tinge of Geraldine – Vicar of Dibley. The service proceeded at a pace, following the Order of Service, until it got to the commissioning of Pastoral and Class Leaders. This was done well as a procession of mostly elderly ladies came to the front, except that nobody thought to say how this fitted in to the order of service. Impressively hymns on the screen started with a front sheet that had the number in the hymn book on it. It also finished with a footnote. It said "End"!

The four small children left early on for their group in the "Old Vestry". Slightly worrying, as when they returned at Communion only three came back.

The service included a sensible sermon, and a noticeably well-chosen

The service finished and then the welcome started properly... a class leader made an energetic and friendly approach. She had been in the Church since she was a small child, utterly genuine and very welcoming. Something about her smile that was just marvellous. This was closely, followed by a slightly more cautious approach by a lady Steward, who had obviously spotted an outsider. A welcoming coffee team were located in the entrance hall, including in their offering a variety of cakes. There I met the Minister, who turned out to be in charge at Horsley, and covering Walton as part of Guildford's Circuit's support for Walton & Woking Circuit, which is short of several Ministers and was very interesting on Circuits and Stationing and the future.

So could we learn things? Actually we do quite well on many grounds as a direct comparison. So what should we do? Perhaps as a Circuit we should consider a "Welcome Audit" with each Church






# Christ Church Family News
