



The Ministers Write...

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

As we come towards Lent I would like to offer you some reflections from a wonderful book I read only last week called 'Mere Spirituality' by Wil Fernandez .

I first caught a glimpse of this book on the back pages of the Methodist Recorder a few months ago. I had somehow managed to skip over the initial title and read the words 'The spiritual life according to Henri Nouwen.' He is of course someone I have come to admire in recent years, over 7 million of his books have been sold worldwide and one of his most popular books 'The return of the prodigal son' is well known by many. One of my favourite books by Nouwen 'The wounded healer' (which I have mentioned before in one of my minister's letters) helped me immensely when I was trying to minister through my own grief after losing mum.

Nouwen was a complex character, an experienced psychologist, theologian and priest, who passed away in 1996 from a massive heart attack. The 40 books he penned during his life time continue to inspire and challenge because he wrestled with life, 'torn between the saint inside of him who had given his life to God and the man inside him who had earthly yearnings and wanted to take his life back'. 'Mere spirituality' offers a holistic approach to Nouwen's written work, drawing from them what Wil Fernadez believes are the essential elements for Spiritual growth and a heart filled life.

Quite simply it can be encompassed in three ways: Communion-a life apart; Community-a life shared; Commission- a life given. Communion speaks of solitude, identity and presence. Community about togetherness, mutuality and solidarity. Commission to embrace the meaning of service, compassion and hospitality.

Nouwen urges us to contemplate these three things. Firstly, a life set apart with God "Somehow we know that without a lonely place our lives are in danger. Somewhere we know that without silence words lose their meaning, that without listening speaking no longer heals, that without distance closeness cannot cure. Somewhere we know that without a lonely place our actions become empty gestures." Intimacy is only achieved when one gives their undivided attention to another and Nouwen's starting point for a deeper spiritual life is in giving God our undivided attention.

Just as Christ took time to be with the father, so we need to find those intimate moments, for it is only in them that we reveal who we truly are, for there are no hidden places in God's company, it is only here that we can be truly present away from distraction, and it is in these moments God's voice becomes more evident to us.

Secondly Nouwen recognises the deep need within us all to belong, to feel connected, to be part of a human family. "Community is a fellowship who do not hide their joys and sorrows but make them visible to each other in a gesture of hope. In community, we say life is full of gains and losses, joys and sorrows, ups and downs-but we do not live it alone. We want to drink our cup together and thus celebrate the truth that the woundedness of our individual lives, which seems intolerable when lived alone, becomes a source of healing when we live as part of a fellowship of mutual care." Community allows an abiding sense of mutuality, a common heart. It is in this place of solidarity that we find our humanness; a place of discovery, where our potential may be unearthed and God's grace lavished upon us.

Finally there is Commission, "As the beloved ones, our greatest fulfilment lies in becoming bread for the world. That is the intimate expression of our deepest desire to give ourselves to each other." Nouwen's idea of hospitality is almost immeasurable in its depth. Even in our woundedness and brokenness he suggests we can offer hope and service to others, for healing and reconciliation may well come from them. This brings to mind those who can forgive in the most extraordinary places of personal pain. This kind of hospitality is selfless and ambitious; it requires the giving of oneself fully to another; to be attentive to another's needs.

The book also offers opportunities for personal ponderings and is well worth exploring especially as we move towards Easter. I found the book very insightful and it has encouraged me to look more closely, to examine myself and consider the areas that need further development. I hope you too might find this helpful.

Mirror, Mirror on the Wall – how do you see yourself this Lent?

Somebody asked a Christian friend why he was eating doughnuts, when he had given them up for Lent! He answered, 'As I drove past the baker's I told God, that if He wanted me to buy doughnuts, He should provide a parking space in front of the shop. On the eighth time round the block, there it was!' Rather than seeing Lent simply as a time to give things up, let's use it intentionally for self-examination, reading Scripture, penitence, fasting and prayer.

At Jesus' baptism, God's voice says, 'You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased.' (Luke 3:22). The Holy Spirit then leads Jesus into the wilderness, where we find Him coming to terms with who He is. Satan's temptations challenge Jesus in three key areas of His identity: social action, political power, and religious identity (Luke 4: 1-13). It is as though Jesus looked into the mirror at Himself to discern what kind of Saviour He would be.

We can also think of Lent as an opportunity to hold a mirror up to ourselves and ask the question, 'Who am I?' It is a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and the world in which we live. How will you keep the Lent period of 40 days running up to Easter? What will you see when you hold up the mirror to yourself? Alongside taking time to read Scripture, you could study a Christian book and pray with fasting, or why not give up texting for Lent and simply talk on the phone; or commit yourself to just working 40 hours a week or spend five minutes each day in silence!

Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers.

Dear Friends,

Lent is upon us and with it another moment of preparation. Just as during Advent we prepare ourselves for the coming of the Christ Child so in Lent we make preparations again but of a different sort.

Usually the focus of our preparations is giving something up – the almost inevitable chocolate! Without wanting to be totally dismissive, really? Is that the sum of our appreciation of the events of Holy Week and Easter Day that the best we can come up with is to give up chocolate? Again, forgive me, I know I'm being a little harsh but go to Luke 12:13ff and see what Jesus says. In response to an obvious question of a frivolous nature Jesus retorts: 'Man, who made me...' Wow, that sounds rather short to me. J Jeremias regards this parable of being of 'Eschatological significance' (To do with the ultimate moments of life). In other words, Jeremias is suggesting that Jesus' frustration is born out of a lack of appreciation of the moment on the part of the man in the crowd. Here he is, Jesus, the one in whom the ultimate questions of life, death, salvation and love find their answer and all this bloke can do is ask him to settle a family squabble! I must admit I find myself somewhat humbled in the face of that for I know I too am often far more interested in the 'little things' of my life than the eternal things of God's life for me in Jesus.

Lent, for me, is an opportunity to get that perspective back again. To be challenged to be more intentional in my relationship with God. Given the great lengths and awesome sacrifice God has embraced to demonstrate the extent of God's love for me, what opportunity is God opening up for me in this moment to offer myself to? I guess that will be different for each of us but I trust that Lent will be a fruitful time of deep searching and sacrificial commitment for all us as we respond to the amazing love shown to us the passion, death and resurrection of our Lord and Saviour even Jesus. On a different note, we have a rather awesome event lined up for Saturday 11th March at London Road. The Circuit has been able to persuade the Discipleship & Learning Network to repeat certain elements of the Relmagine Conference held last summer. This conference was very well received and provides an opportunity to think again about being church in the 21st Century and beyond. Please do make every effort to participate. SOUTHWATER

Should you be in Dorking at midday on the first Saturday of a month, there is a concert in the Church, with a variety of styles and performers.

PARTRIDGE GREEN





Women's World Day of Prayer 2017 "Am I Being Unfair to You?"



WWDP began as separate days of prayer organised by individual denominations in America in the mid 1800's. It has now become a truly ecumenical and international day of prayer. The day begins in Samoa as the sun rises there and continues round the world until the sun sets over American Samoa.

During that time, it is estimated that 3 million men, women and young people in 170 countries will have taken part in the same service. 6000 services will have been held in the British Isles.

This year the focus is on the people of the Philippines. As their committee was preparing the service, typhoon Haiyan struck the islands causing a great deal of destruction. In spite of natural disasters and very different living conditions, the people of the Philippines carry on. They go on in faith and, in faith, we support them at our service.





Another Saint You've Probably Never Heard Of: Saint Rupert the Salty

Rupert is the saint for you if you like The Sound of Music – or salt with your food!

Rupert (died c 710) was bishop of Worms and Salzburg, and he founded the great monastery of St Peter in Salzburg in the eighth century, thus firmly establishing Christianity in that city. True, it would be another 11 centuries before a certain young wanna-benun wandered about singing of her Favourite Things, but you have start somewhere.

In the meantime, Rupert also helped the people of Salzburg by developing the salt-mines nearby, which helped make the city prosperous. Though if salt became a too 'favourite thing', it would also have raised the locals' blood pressure.

Rupert's iconographical emblem is a barrel of salt, which makes sense, but is not as romantic as raindrops on roses, or whiskers on kittens.

2017 Faith Easter Egg launched

The new look Real Easter Egg 2017 range has been launched, and churches are being asked to encourage people to support this unique way of sharing the story of Easter.

This year a 24 page Easter story-activity book, illustrated by Alida Massari, is included in the Original, Egg Hunt and Dark eggs. The Special Edition has an Easter traditions booklet inside. The Sharing box, with 30 eggs, comes with 30 colour-in posters.

Out of the 80 million Easter eggs sold in this part of the world every year, The Real Easter Egg is the only one which has a copy of the Easter story in the box, is made of Fairtrade chocolate and makes a donation to charity from sales.

The Real Easter Egg was launched in 2010 but the supermarkets turned down the idea. It was left to churches and church schools to place orders to fund The Meaningful Chocolate Company so they could make The Real Easter Egg.

David Marshall, creator of The Real Easter Egg, said; "With the support of churches more than one million eggs have been sold with 750,000 of these sent through the post directly to churches and schools. The rest have been sold through independent retailers and supermarkets.

"The success of The Real Easter Egg has meant that the production of Fairtrade chocolate has moved to the UK. Over £250,000 has been raised from sales for charitable causes. Due to production restrictions, this year we have slightly few eggs available so we recommend people order as early as possible."


