
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

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The Ministers Write...



From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

Grabbing a few moments contemplating what I might write for this month's magazine, I sit down with the boys and catch a glimpse of Britain's Got Talent on ITV. Watching these acts performing on stage with the total belief that they have something to offer, is so disheartening when the crowds boo them off or their nerves become so overwhelming that they can't perform. It's interesting, that without fail it's those people who the judges seem to have a low expectation of, that suddenly excite them. Those that came onto the stage looking the complete opposite from what one might expect from the finely coutured celebrities the kids are used to being fed in the media. I find that such a refreshing change when the world demands perfection and the suggestion that success is only possible when we fit a particular image or when we perform in a particular way.

The pressures our young people face are immense and having begun a youth group in Cobham, it is obvious that there is a deep need to begin to offer an alternative view of the world. Allowing them to realise that there is potential in each of them, that satisfaction does not come in the adulation that status brings, but in the dignity that comes from being a child of God, where potential exists and our worth is not set down by the world but by the love God has for each of us.

Interestingly, Jamie Oliver's dream school on Channel 4 follows a group of teenagers, brought together because they have previously been excluded or gained little in the way of qualifications. They come face to face with some impressive names from the academic, political and theatrical world. At the end of a very stressful and exhausting term for the teachers and the students, each student comes away not experiencing rejection once again, but the enormity of possible potential and that within each of them is a gift that only they can bring. The gift the teachers possessed was the ability to encourage them and to allow them to believe in themselves, that they have so much more to offer.

It's interesting that it not just the children who need to know this truth but so many in our congregations. The truth, that they are precious in God's sight and that God gives us each a gift, a God who works in all of us to transform us from a rough stome to something finely honed.

It takes a lifetime of learning and a lifetime of being challenged but our potential doesn't just lie in the gift God gives us but how much we embrace the gifts placed within us. How much we allow them to rise to the surface. Take a risk and see what happens!!!

From Rev. Ian Howarth

Dear friends,

As you probably know 2011 marks the 400th anniversary of the King James Bible, what most of us still call 'The Authorised Version'. Even though we don't use it in our churches any more, the influence of its language and thought pervades the English speaking world. I have to confess that when I am searching for a text in my on-line concordance, I often find myself doing it in the King James version because that was how I originally learnt it in Sunday School.

The churches in Britain in wanting to celebrate this anniversary, however, do not want to be looking at the Bible as a sixteenth century artefact, but as a living text that still can speak to us today, and we are being encouraged to look at the Bible in new ways, under the banner of an organisation called Biblefresh, and it is worth looking at their website if you can, (www.biblefresh.com). The Methodist Church in Great Britain is producing a handwritten version of the Bible contributed to by church members around the country, and it was good to be part of that at Leatherhead, writing out Hosea Chapter 8, and a report on that appears later in the Link. After Easter, in the Leatherhead churches we will be having a specific focus on the Bible in the coming months and further details also appear later in the Link.

The Bible is one of the few things that all Christians of whatever denomination, whatever nation, whatever tradition, hold in common. However, it is also a cause of division between Christians because it is read in different ways and given different levels of authority. Those difficulties, and the fact that other Christians see it differently sometimes means that we don't take the Bible seriously enough as the core source document of our faith. However we view it, Christians need to be familiar with the Bible and immerse themselves in it.

It is also good for Christians with differing approaches to the interpretation of the Bible to engage with each other and argue through how the Bible should be applied to issues in our contemporary world.

I hope this special year of the Bible will encourage us all to get to know the Bible better, and to see how we can best use it to allow God to speak to us through our tradition in fresh ways for the twenty-first century.

Media-bashing?

As I write this it's nearly Easter, so time for the papers and TV producers to roll out some Christian related stuff. Perhaps even stuff and nonsense! Oops! Sorry my prejudice is showing again!

Last night the BBC had a documentary: "Does Christianity have a future?" presented by Ann Widdecombe, a Strictly Come Dancing star, former MP, former Anglican, and now a Roman Catholic.

Apparently, largely thanks to immigrants from Eastern Europe, the pews are not emptying quite so fast! Attendance at Cathedrals is increasing rapidly and many young people are joining the Pentecostal movement. It was interesting but not quite a ringing endorsement of our Faith.

Eladio stands on the site on where his community hopes to build a school

For the people of Jinotega, Nicaragua, coffee isn't just a caffeine kick – it's a means of transforming the lives of entire communities. By getting involved in Christian Aid Week, you can help to make this transformation possible.

Five years ago, Eladio Simeón Pineda's community was a group of poor fam labourers. Then Christian Aid partner Soppexcea (pronounced so-pecks-ka) offered them credit to establish themselves as coffee famers and supported them to work together as a cooperative. Eladio and the other members of the La Paz del Tuma cooperative now hope that together they will transform their own community.

Even though the coffee farmers of La Paz del Tuma have only been working with Soppexica for a short time, their lives are already changing for the better. The credit which Soppexica gave to Eladio and the other farmers has been vital in getting them started. The cooperative has a community fund that will be used to achieve the dreams which eladio and his fellow farmers once thought were out of their reach.

- £14 could buy enough coffee seeds to plant a 0.7 hectare plot of coffee and start one farmer on the path out of poverty.
- £2,170 could pay for a processing plant, allowing farmers to process the coffee they have grown and then sell it for a better price.

"I hope one day we will have a school on this land, clean water and latrines," says Eladio. Eladio knows that transformation is possible. He is driven by the example of a nearby community, where Gustavo Adolfo Talavera and the members of the Los Alpes cooperative have been supported by Soppexcca for 12 years. In that time, they have successfully worked to establish a school and a health centrulinity.

The hopes of the people of La Paz del Tuma are hopes held for the whole community. Badio works every day towards his dream of a purpose-built schod, clean water and lattnies for all the famining families of La Paz del Tuma.

Soppexcca's support for coffee cooperatives like La Paz del Tuna and Los Alpes allows communities to see a bigger picture, full of possibilities for the future.

You can be part of the story of transformation which is unfolding right now in Nicaragua.

By getting involved in Christian Aid Week in your own community, you can help to turn the hopes of communities all around the world into realities. You can be part of a movement which is transforming lives.

To mark the Year of the Bible at LMC and Christ Church we are going to make the Bible the focus of our study for the coming months. The house groups have available to them a DVD course from the London School of Theology called 'Christian Life and the Bible' and to supplement on the first Sunday of the month at LMC and the second Sunday of the month at Christ Church, I will preach a related sermon, and then at the end of the month on a Tuesday evening I will run a course, using the same titles, but approaching them more from a teaching point of view. 'Biblefresh - 'Scribe-In'

It was all good fun and there was such a lovely relaxed atmosphere of a congregation come together for a particular purpose.

Methodist Women in Britain (MWiB)

I have just returned from the first MWiB Conference entitled 'Passion Road: Prayer and the Way to Peace.' It was very little different from previous Women's Network (WN) Conferences - it was just a different mix of women in the Leadership Team.

As usual it was very well prepared, perhaps in such fine detail that the freedom to veer away from that set, meant 'extras' from the floor, as the days progressed, could not be included. Yes there was plenty of opportunity to talk together in our small groups, but little time given to feedback. This meant you just heard what came up there. A great pity, as the Conference was unusually large - probably 200 voices strong!

There were four main sessions with a strong Holy Week emphasis on prayer and peace-making, looking into the relationship between prayer and what needs to be done to create peaceful relationships. Three of the sessions were led by Rev. Julie Hulme, the WN Connexional President. Her time was based on her Presidential visit to Ireland and what she saw and heard there. There are still many difficulties. In places taking photographs of the many paintings of the walls of buildings is viewed with suspicion. Julie's talks were excellent! The second part of Saturday morning was led by Rev. Alison Tomlin, President of Conference. She disappointed me! It was not the content, based on the theme of 'Journeying into the heart of God', but her presentation. She missed a great chance to talk to us for longer, probably a one-off for many, rather than spending a good half-hour talking together in our groups. Deacon Denise Creed, a writer, had produced meditations for each keynote session, helping us see the Passion journey through the eyes of some of the characters in There were three more during the final Communion the story. Service. She was undoubtedly very good, but seven items in the same style from the same voice was a bit top-heavy.

The rather formal general tone of the Conference did not distract from the overall enjoyment and teaching. To compensate from that rigidity there was the great pleasure of meeting so many old friends of many years' acquaintance - and that number increases each year - but the added joy of making new friends.
