



From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

It seems that whether we are reading the newspapers or watching the news, we can't help but feel a little overwhelmed by the rising tensions around the world. At the moment it is hard to watch the news without feeling a sense of helplessness.

Efforts to bring about peace are not by any means an easy pathway, it is filled with disappointments and challenges that at times feel insurmountable.

We are not all political activists nor are we seated in positions of power and authority where we are able to impact directly upon the decisions made at national or international levels.

It would be easy to become cynical and sceptical amongst the disarray of this world but as Christians we are called to offer hope. "Be soft. Do not let the world make you hard. Do not let the pain make you hate. Do not let the bitterness steal your sweetness. Take pride that even though the rest of the world may disagree, you still believe it to be a beautiful place."

As we walk alongside the risen Christ in these coming weeks we believe in a world that can be changed, transformed, for in these encounters we find even the cynics and the sceptics challenged to remain as they once were. James' encounter with the risen Christ leads him to become the leader of the Jerusalem church. Saul, who persecuted Christians or dragged them off to prison had a dramatic encounter with the risen Christ, it was so dramatic that this once enemy of Christianity became one of its greatest advocates, Paul, a missionary who shared the love of Christ with all he met.

It is not for us to question when that time might be, that moment when Christ is encountered in all his glory but to acknowledge that it is still happening. God's work is not over when humanity has done its worst. Thank goodness.

It is now over 18 months since Colin Plumpton and I, and an enthusiastic group of volunteers started Lunchbox at Leatherhead Methodist Church (LMC) after the closure of Pitstop. We would like to thank the Pastorate Churches, Effingham Churches Together and many other supporters for the help they have given us over this period to enable us to show Gods love to many folk in and around Leatherhead.

We would also like to thank those who have provided meals. Local schools, organisations and churches who have provided tinned goods and groceries; local supermarkets and shops and all who have enabled us to provide support for over thirty local families, as well as hot meals each Wednesday for around 25 persons. We have so much valued your contributions, prayers and financial support; it costs around £300 per month to run, and so far <u>all</u> we have needed has been given to us, as we make our needs known.

We have been so lucky to have had the use of LMC's small hall and kitchen which is ideally suited to our ministry, and of course the church itself, which is regularly used for lending a listening ear and for prayers. When we started this endeavour I did not realise how often faith matters would figure in our work. I have been amazed at the way individuals can be changed by sharing friendship, food and faith.

Please pray for those who come along, those who feel socially excluded, and require a helping hand in some way or other. Over the last few years since the closure of Pitstop, churches around the area have opened their doors to provide meals, so that there is always somewhere each day, locally, for people to go to if they need to. Praise God for this response!

Julian of Norwich

In 1373 a young woman who had been walled up in a cell built on to St Julian's Church in Norwich thought she was dying. She recovered, but she had had some visions. Over the next fifteen to twenty years she meditated on these visions, which began when she saw drops of blood falling from a painted crucifix. She wrote down an account, and this was published as "Revelations of Divine Love". This was the first book in English written by a woman. Among other things she wrote of Christ as Mother; because mothers at their most maternal share Christ-like characteristics. Her best-known words are those quoted by T S Eliot: "All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well". She wrote that from the time of the visions she vearned to know her Lord's meaning. Fifteen years and more later she was answered in spiritual understanding: Love was his meaning. Who showed this? Love. What did he show? Love. Why did he show it? For love, Before God made us he loved us, and this love has never abated nor ever shall.

Julian is especially remembered on the date of her first visions: May 8th.

Living Easter in Effingham

New for this Easter in Effingham was our Churches Together Living Easter Pageant on Easter Saturday afternoon. This was scripted by Chris Butler, who acted as narrator, aided by musicians Morag Butler, Dave Greenwood and our minister Kim.

The Easter story unfolded from the Last Supper in Scene 1, with all dressed in costumes and seated outside the Douglas Haig pub. The pageant then moved on to the Methodist Church with slides of ancient Jerusalem and Scene 2 for the arrest of Jesus. From there to St Lawrence Church for Scene 3, where the crucifixion was reported on and the drama acted out, with Jesus stumbling as he carried his cross, and the curtain torn in two.

A visit to Lullabelle's, the café on the King George V Field for Scene 4, "Sightings Galore", and singing "Jerusalem". From there we went to Scene 5: "The Empty Tomb" in St Lawrence Hall, for all to discover and for the disciples to 'go and tell'. We sang 'The Lord of the Dance' and many joined in with a country dance. Finally it was back to the Methodist Church for Scene 6, to explain how the Christian message spread.

There were Easter Eggs for the children and hot cross buns and we sang 'Shine Jesus, Shine'. Then finally it was back to the pub for refreshments for all, which the pub had kindly laid out on their picnic tables for everyone.

Many thanks to everyone for helping in many ways and to the pub for providing welcome refreshments. To be repeated next year perhaps? It was well supported by local families and we were blessed with good weather.



Luther's Legacy



This year marks 500 years since Martin Luther published his 95 theses or complaints against the Church, and launched the Reformation, a momentous religious revolution whose consequences we still live with today. His desire, for people to feel closer to God, led him to translate the Bible into the language of the people, radically changing the relationship between church leaders and their followers.

Methodists, of course, have good reason to be grateful, as it was Luther's preface to Paul's *Epistle to the Romans* which made a life-changing impact on **John Wesley** on 24th May 1738, when, after going to evensong at St Paul's, where the anthem was "Out of the depths" (Ps 130), his "heart was strangely warmed" during a meeting of Moravian friends in Aldersgate Street. Although he'd been ordained since 1725, his morale was very low after he returned from Georgia, and he was seriously considering giving up his ministry. Now, at last, John realised the saving Grace of God. From this conversion experience came his famous Four Alls:

All people need to be saved:
All people can be saved:
All people can know they are saved:
All people can be saved to the uttermost.



We commemorate this event on **Aldersgate Sunday**, **21**st **May** and *Singing the Faith plus* resources include Luther's hymn "Out of the depths I cry to thee" (StF 433) which is based on Psalm 130, and emphasises that our lives may be transformed by the generous Grace of God, not by trying to buy God's pleasure.

The Vicar of Baghdad

Many will remember hearing Andrew White, "the Vicar of Baghdad" speaking locally about his work as chaplain in Iraq for many years. Andrew White has recently been writing about his experiences again. He wonders whether Christianity can survive in the Middle East, with Christians being persecuted. Many have fled their homes in the face of Isil/Daesh atrocities and are living as refugees. Andrew White believes the West can help, but it must take the situation seriously. He has moved from Iraq to Jordan where he has a school of several hundred Iraqi refuqee children alongside a clinic and a relief programme. Nearly all he works with have had loved ones killed, persecuted and tortured, yet they are not without hope. The Easter phrase "Alleluia!" is not just reserved for Easter for the refugees. It is regular and dynamic and the response in Arabic is loud and dramatic "Kam, Kam, Kam" -Arisen, Arisen, Arisen. The cry that Jesus is not dead, but alive. Though the world may think they are finished, they have true hope. Please pray for the Christians of the Middle East. Follow Andrew White on Twitter @VicarofBaghdad





From Liz Hindman

Thank you to everybody who came to Mum's funeral in April. The fellowship of members of Christ Church meant a lot to her and your presence meant a lot to us.

Mum was a committed Christian from birth and as a child attended a very high Anglican Church three times every Sunday. However, when the family moved to Ashtead in 1960 we never really settled at any church there. But there are some very strange coincidences that happened. One person who visited my father quite often in association was a lovely gentleman called John Worsfold. Dad, who did dressmaking, found a shop in nearby Leatherhead which supplied all of his needs regarding patterns, cottons, zips - everything. That was run by a lady named Gweneth Lidgey. We all loved going to her shop and chatting to her for ages. In 1963 Mum went in to hospital to have her veins operated on. In those days you went for convalescence after an operation and there she met a lady called Jean McDowell. Then when Mum ran a nursery school a couple brought their young daughter there. She was small, blonde haired and a lovely girl. Her parents were kind, thoughtful and charming. The girl's name was Jane and her parents were Geoff and Averil Parkinson. Then, in 1967, a new girl came to the school I attended. Despite not liking each other at first we became firm friends. Her name was Diana and her parents were Stan and Eileen Dodson.

I am sure that those names mean a lot to all of you but it was through Diana that Mum became a member of Christ Church. Diana would come on holiday with us - to Bognor Regis - where we had such fun. However, like all children we would fight and one day Di sat on my head so I hit her - as you do. At that point she asked me if I would like to join a church choir. I think that she thought it might improve me. I did but it didn't! In June 1969 I arrived to plaque the good people of Christ Church for the next 40 years. Mum always supported everything that I did and she came to hear the choir sing. She discovered music which she had never heard before and found the people welcoming. I became a member in 1971 and Mum followed a couple of years later. She drove people from the School for the Blind to the evening services and would stay for the wonderful organ recitals performed by Anthony Cairns and Arthur Head. The choir presented some wonderful works - The Messiah, Mozart's Requiem and The St. John Passion being just a few. Mum and Dad were going to have a blessing for their 25th Wedding Anniversary but, just a few months before the church lost Jim Todd and it never happened. However, Jim was replaced by Brian Treharne. Mum loved his preaching and his friendly visits.

She moved with us to France in 2007 and her visits to Christ Church ended but she retained an interest in the church and all of the people involved with it until the day she died. She loved seeing pictures which I showed her on the internet and hearing about what was happening via The Newsletter and then The Link.

Thank you all for your love and care of both Mum and Dad. God bless you all.



God in the Arts

When God answers out of the whirlwind

'The patience of Job,' 'Job's comforters,' even 'Job's post' –these phrases and images show the great influence Job has had through the ages. When we meet him in the Old Testament, he is an upright, blameless man, who is afflicted by suffering. He loses his property, his children and even his health, but never his faith. 'The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away,' he says. 'Blessed be the name of the Lord.' When friends call, they tell Job all that has happened is a punishment for sin or a call to repent or a way of teaching virtues. But Job rejects their counsel: he demands answers from God to explain why all this has occurred in his life.

Out of the whirlwind, God answers Job. It is the theme of this month's art – a strange, visionary work of the poet and painter, William Blake, who died in 1827. We know him through the hymn 'Jerusalem.' Blake looked at the sun in the sky and the trees in the wood and saw there hints and glimpses of eternity, and those insights inspired all he wrote and painted. He was fascinated by the book of Job and began his illustrations in the 1780s, although this work was completed forty years later. We see how the revelation of God's presence humbles Job. The power and majesty of God swirl and spin around the scene, and even bend low the tree underneath. But the trunk is not broken, just as Job in his adversity never loses faith.

Job is vindicated: there is a God who cares and who responds to human suffering. Job may not understand how the stars above were made, or how the horse runs in the meadow. Nevertheless, through meeting God, Job's life is given meaning and value. His fortunes are restored and he dies, 'old and full of days.'


