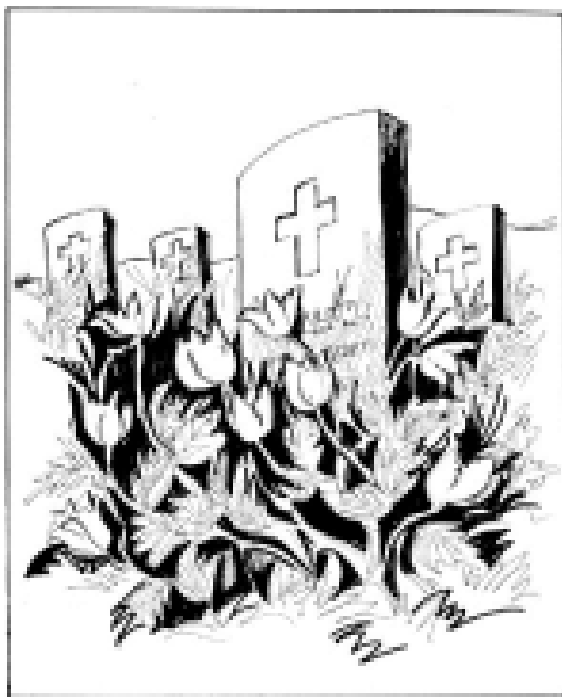

The Ministers Write...

From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

This year's Remembrance Sunday will bring into sharp focus 100 years since WWI. On 11th November the Queen will plant the last of the ceramic poppies at the Tower of London. A total of 888,246 ceramic poppies will become part of an installation by artist Paul Cummins called the 'Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red'. Each poppy represents a single British or colonial soul lost in battle in WWI. It's an astonishing sight and a startling reminder that if we added all those who have died since WWI, as a result of war, we might find the enormity just too overwhelming. I remember walking amongst the so many headstones in the cemeteries in Belgium, the fallen in WWI, the uniformity of the white headstones created a powerful image and one I have never forgotten without feeling a deep sense of sadness. There has been no period in recorded history where there was not armed conflict going on in some part of the world and sadly even today our children are all too familiar with it.

It is an uncomfortable reminder that humanity has the capacity to both protect and to destroy, to hurt and to heal, to love and to hate. Christians are of course divided as to whether war can ever be justified. Some of you may well be familiar with the Just War Theory:

Just War Theory is a doctrine studied by theologians, ethicists, policy makers and military leaders. The purpose of the doctrine is to ensure war is morally justifiable through a series of criteria, all of which must be met for a war to be considered just. The criteria are split into two groups: "the right to go to war" and "right conduct in war". The first concerns the morality of going to war and the second with moral conduct within war. Recently there have been calls for the inclusion of a third category of Just War Theory dealing with the morality of post-war settlement and reconstruction. Just War Theory postulates that war, while very terrible, is not always the worst option. There may be responsibilities so important, atrocities which can be prevented or outcomes so undesirable they justify war.

Our world and our society has always been in a state of 'awakening'. What was once justified years ago we struggle to even understand today. I studied social justice for a while at college and not so long ago even the church could be considered tyrannical and yet, on the other side of that, those with faith were also instigators of social reform. If only we could all experience a Saul moment: "Immediately, something like scales fell from Saul's eyes, and he could see again." Acts 9:18. Being 'awakened' to the way of peace which is so desired by us all may be a pursuit that seems untenable but it is a hope that makes sense of all the lives lost in its pursuit.

In some ways we are all pursuing the same goal of peace, the pacifist, the conscientious objector, and the soldier that fights for peace, it is only our response to war that is different.

My prayers this Remembrance Sunday are that we all might have the scales removed from our eyes, that the world will see the futility of war and that peace one day might be a reality. It's a tall order I know, but the sacrifice others gave for us is so great that we mustn't forget them or the goal they strived to achieve.

From Rev. Lynda Russell

Dear friends,

Remember, remember the 5th November! November is the month for remembering – including both the 5th, with Guy Fawkes and the fun of fireworks, and the sombre reflection of Remembrance Day. Remembering of course can bring many emotions; positive, poignant and painful.

I remember when I was little, we would go out into the garden and my father would have a tin of fireworks which he would let off at the bottom of the garden while we watched from a safe distance. It was exciting, and we would have a great time together as a family, but often the fireworks would fail to go off, and it was then too dangerous to go and check, in case they did go off at the wrong moment. Each year sadly still many people are injured in just these circumstances. So our expectations were often not realised as we waited for those fireworks to ignite, and in many cases we were disappointed. In particular it always seemed that the larger and more expensive the firework, the bigger the anti-climax when it didn't work.

When I reflected on this phenomenon, I started to think about life and its disappointments. Most of us have things in our lives and in our past that haven't gone as we hoped they would. Jobs, relationships, friends, families, colleagues. Actions we aren't proud of remembering, words spoken in haste or not spoken at all: in almost any area of our lives we could probably name something where either we have made a mistake or where we have regrets or feel we have failed in some way or failed those we love.

It is a rare person who has no regrets, but what matters is how we respond. If we dwell on the past, and hang on to regrets and failures then we spoil the pleasure of the present and the promise of the future. The good news is that God doesn't keep account of our past mistakes. Even though we may struggle to forget them, God does not. As we ask for forgiveness in the name of Jesus it is freely given and those mistakes forgotten. Does it sound too easy? Well yes, maybe it does, because sometimes we find it hard to forgive ourselves. But Jesus says he came to give us a rich and satisfying life (John 10:10 Message Version). Perhaps you might like to reflect on what that might mean for you in your situation...

"God of past, present and future, teach me to let go of my yesterdays, to trust in your tomorrow, and so to rejoice today, celebrating the fullness of life that you have given through Jesus Christ. Amen."

Ebola

The current outbreak in West Africa is the worst Ebola outbreak since the virus was discovered in 1976, with more cases and deaths than in all the previous outbreaks combined.

The Methodist Church in Sierra Leone (MCSL) has been at the forefront of the fight against Ebola. To date, the Methodist Church in Britain has sent two grants totalling £22,500 to Sierra Leone to aid with the epidemic.

The Ebola virus was also the focus of thoughts of the General Secretary, the Revd Dr Martyn Atkins when he led the Morning Service on BBC Radio 4 on 10th October.

There is also a prayer for people to use as they pray for all the people whose lives are being affected by the virus.

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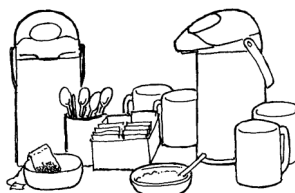

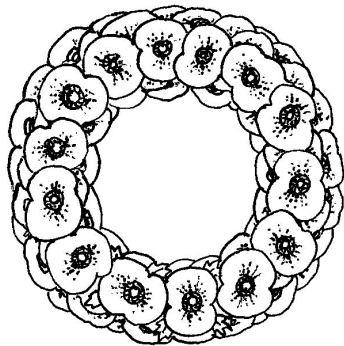

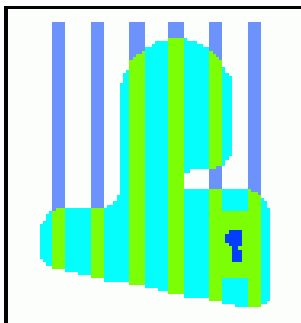
PRISONS WEEK

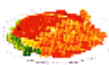

Does God Condone Violence?

In his bestselling book *The God Delusion*, atheist Richard Dawkins refers to the God of the Old Testament as a "vindictive, bloodthirsty ethnic cleanser" (quoted by GotQuestions.org when answering the question "Why did God condone such terrible violence in the Old Testament?").

So is there a contradiction between the Old and New Testaments when it comes to the subject of violence? Jesus said, "Put your sword back into its place; for all who take the sword will perish by the sword..." (Matthew 26:52). Paul says in Ephesians 6:12 that our war is not a military one but a spiritual one: "For we are not contending against flesh and blood, but against the principalities, against the powers, against the world rulers of this present darkness, against the spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places".

However even in the Old Testament we can find many texts which are against violence. In Genesis 6:13 God says to Noah, "I have determined to make an end of all flesh; for the earth is filled with violence through them;...".

In 2 Samuel 2:26 in the context of the civil war between David and those who are loyal to Saul's son Ishbosheth, Abner, commander of Saul's army says, "Shall the sword devour for ever? Do you not know that the end will be bitter? How long will it be before you bid your people turn from the pursuit of their brethren?". In King David's song to the Lord in 2 Samuel 22:3 he says to the Lord, "...thou savest me from violence".

We also find statements against violence in the Psalms. For example, Psalm 5:6 says, "...the Lord abhors bloodthirsty and deceitful men". Similarly we read in Psalm 11:5: "The Lord...hates him that loves violence". When David says in Psalm 55:9 "...for I see violence and strife in the city", he implies disapproval or hatred of violence. The same applies when in Psalm 58:2 he says (addressing false gods), "...your hands deal out violence on earth". And again in Psalm 73:6 which is a Psalm of Asaph: "...violence covers them as a garment".

Psalm 72 is apparently a Psalm of Solomon and is I think a prophecy of the coming Messiah. Verses 12 to 14 say: "For he delivers the needy when he calls, the poor and him who has no helper. He has pity on the weak and the needy, and saves the lives of the needy. From oppression and violence he redeems their life; and precious is their blood in his sight".

In Proverbs 4:17 a father is instructing his sons not to enter the path of the wicked, partly because "...they eat the bread of wickedness

and drink the wine of violence". In Proverbs 10:6 one of the proverbs of Solomon says, "...the mouth of the wicked conceals violence".

The prophet Jeremiah complained (22:17): "But you have eyes and heart only for your dishonest gain, for shedding innocent blood, and for practicing oppression and violence".

The prophet Micah says (Micah 4:3) "...they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more;..."

Perhaps as we approach Armistice Day it is good to remember these things and that Jesus says in Matthew 5:9: "Blessed are the peacemakers,..." (quotations from RSV).

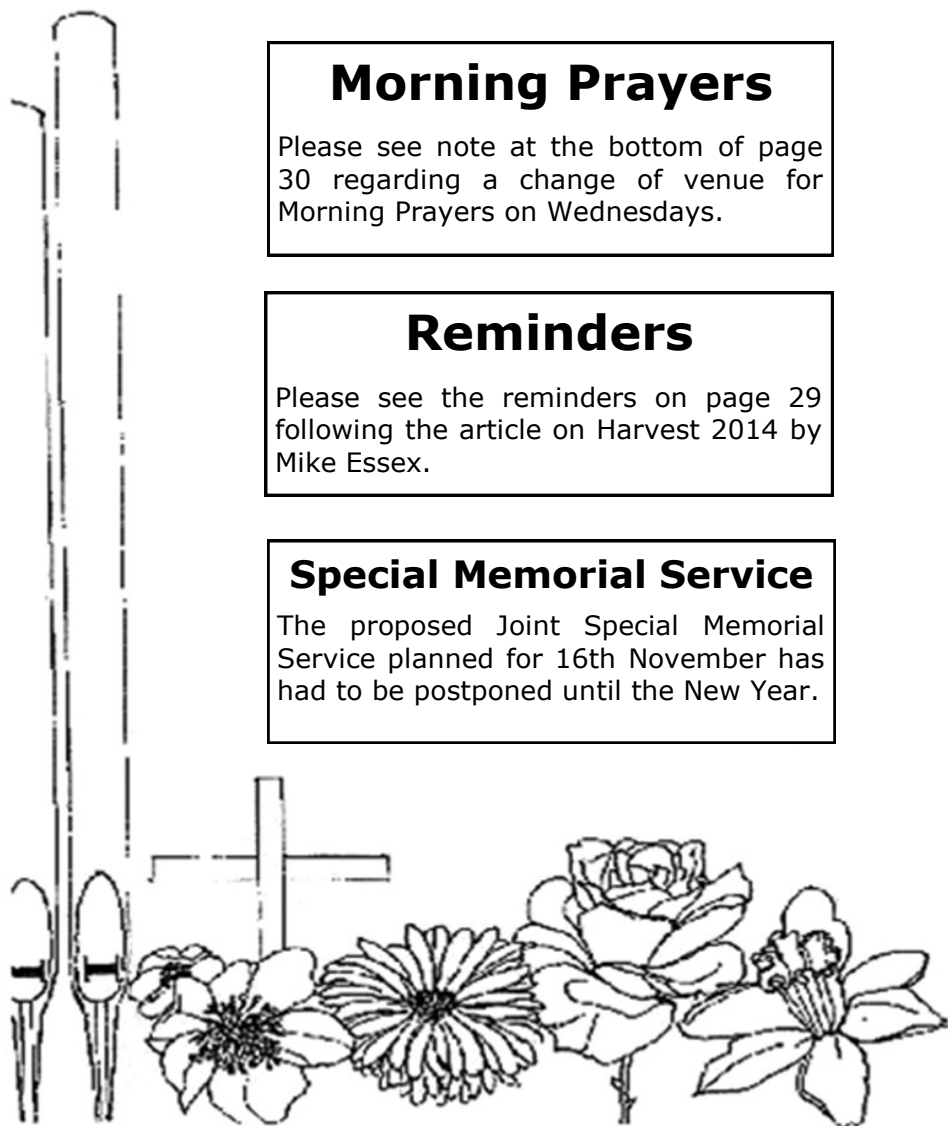
