## The Ministers Write...

#### From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

I opened an e-mail last week from a friend asking if I could help answer 10 questions for her grandson to consider at secondary school. The answers needed to be returned by that afternoon and knowing I was going to be out all day, I was left with very little time to do so. At first glance it didn't look too difficult, but how wrong I was. I was asked to be brief too. So as you read my answers bear in mind they were done so in quick succession:

**Is God a he/she or it?** God is neither male nor female but God acts as father and mother to us all. In the Bible God is generally referred to as male because it would not be acceptable to refer to him as any other in the patriarchal society of the day, but we find the Spirit as feminine (in some places), the Spirit being a dimension of God's character.

Is God separate from the World or is there a bit of God in everything? We believe that God created the world and therefore God can be seen in and through creation. God is not separate from it.

Where is God? On another planet? If we believe that God can be seen through Jesus and the Holy Spirit (sent to help us, so it works around us and within us) then God is always present with us too.

**Does God communicate with us ?** God can communicate through the smallest of things. It can be through a hug when we need it most, it can be from a conversation with another when you need guidance. Some can have dreams, some can be given words of prophesy, some can hear God in their prayers (an inner voice), some can feel God speaking to them through the created world (on a mountaintop, in a meadow).

Can we know God? If so how? We can know God especially through the person of Jesus. If we believe he is the 'son of God' then he reveals God to us, and his example in the Bible reveals to us an inclusive and loving God. A God who turns our understanding upside down at times. When Jesus died we were sent the Holy Spirit, our enabler and we hope that we see God within us too.

**Is God good? If so why does God allow bad things to happen?** Bad things do happen in the world and this is the hardest question to answer. We understand that we are all free to choose which direction to go in, we are not robots, we are given free will. This means that some of the choices we make are not good ones. We fight one another, we harm one another, there is great suffering, there is war.

There is famine yet we are led to believe there is enough food in the world to feed all, but the way it is distributed is unfair. Some things are done out of greed and not out of care. There is poverty, while others live in luxury, what does that say? Some die young, our bodies don't always function as you would expect. Natural disasters raise all sorts of different questions because they are not something we can control. Yes, we can build our cities away from volcanoes, we can build away from the coast or not on fault lines and as we understand the natural world more we may develop life in a different way, but it's devastating and brings us all to a deep sadness when tragedy strikes. breathes and is shaped by physics and science in a way I do not understand but I believe a scientist might say that it conforms to the law of physics by the way it manages these natural events. We might ask why God did not make a more perfect world? There is something about balance here which I am not technically minded enough to answer.

Why has God made me? Is God interested in me? I like to think about parenthood when answering this question. I married my husband and because we had so much love for one another we wanted to share that love. I believe God had so much love that he wanted to share that with others. We have five children and they are all different but we love them each as individuals, and each has different needs. I love them with an unconditional love and therefore everything that is important to them is important to me. I believe God loves us with an unconditional love and is interested in everything about us.

**Does God have likes and dislikes?** Again if we look at the person of Jesus we can find endless things that God dislikes and likes. Predominantly God dislikes all things that hinder you becoming the best person you can be. God likes it when we show love to him and to one another.

What sort of personality does God have? My understanding is that the very core of God's character is love and all things stem from this and can be seen through this lens.

**Does God have a future for us after we die?** God has a future for us beyond this world and some may debate what that is. In Christianity we like to call it heaven.

After reading these questions, how would you answer them knowing they require an answer? Things are often so much easier to answer when we have time to consider things carefully. How would you describe the indescribable? How succinct can we be with a living breathing faith? Even when we have answered them we're often left with even more questions.

#### From Rev. Lynda Russell

Dear Friends,

Do you have a mobile phone? Apparently there are a total of 89.9 million mobile phone subscriptions in the UK, for a population of 60 million, including all women, men and children! This means there are 1.5 mobile phones per person in the UK, and 93% of the adult population has a mobile phone – I'm not quite sure how to make all those figures fit together, other than to assume that out of that 93%, many of them must have more than one phone, as well as numbers of children having phones as well. It seems to be important to be in constant communication.

Some while ago my previous phone was getting old and started acting strangely. While sitting at my desk one day I heard a voice. I nearly fell off my chair - who was speaking to me? Was it God? Sadly it was only my voicemail, which my phone, on the desk, had dialled all by itself. It proceeded later in the day to dial my home number, and then my parents! I'm not sure how it selected these random numbers to dial! Of course it was time to change the phone!!

Anyway this made me think about how we actually DO hear from God. I don't think it's by phone! It's unlikely that we will hear an actual voice speaking out loud, and I didn't really think it was God speaking! However, God can and does speak to us in many different ways, if we are open and alert to hear, and if we are expecting Him to communicate with us. There are so many examples in the Bible where women and men heard God's voice as they listened for it, or even as they went about their daily business. I recently spoke about Elijah, a prophet in the Old Testament, who, in his distress and fear, heard exactly what he needed from God: words of reassurance and a way forward.

Sometimes God speaks to us through other people, through their words or actions, their kindness or concern. I have had many instances of this, when God has spoken through others, even though perhaps they were unaware of it. Sometimes God speaks to us through beauty – nature, art and so on, which tell us of His greatness and majesty and provision day by day. God speaks to us as we read the Bible – as we read about Jesus and His love for us from before the beginning of time; and then sometimes God communicates with us straight to our hearts, so that we just know

He loves us, even though we might not be able to explain it very well.

In a Church I used to go to, we spent at least five minutes in silence at the Sunday worship service, each of us listening for the still small voice of the Holy Spirit, and for what God had to say to us that day. Then we shared what we had heard.

So this month, I would love us to listen out for the 'voice' of God. Ask God to speak to you, and trust that He will do so. It takes practice, but learn to listen. Then take time to share what the Holy Spirit is saying to you with someone else.

## A letter <u>from</u> the Ephesians

At least, a letter from Ephesus and neighbouring places. The tour was called "Highlights of Turkey" and began in Istanbul, with a visit to Aya Sofya, which was once one of the largest Churches in Christendom, built in the 6th century, converted to a mosque in the 16th century, and to a museum in the 20th century. We also visited the Topkapi Palace, Blue Mosque, Grand Bazaar, Roman cistern and a fish restaurant beside the Bosphorus – a lot to fit in to a day and a half.

The next day we had a long drive to the Gallipoli Peninsula to look at ANZAC Bay and a variety of cemeteries and memorials. Most of the graves were of Australians and New Zealanders, with some British and Canadians, and, I was surprised to see, some Indians. We tend to forget that they fought in, and died in, the First World War.

By ferry across the Dardanelles, and, next morning, on to Troy. Strictly, that is Troy I – IX, since 9 cities have been excavated, one on top of another. The Trojan War is believed to have involved Troy VI. So there was a lot to see there (including a replica wooden horse) before we moved on to Pergamum (see Rev 2:12). Whether John's description as the "place where Satan is enthroned" has anything to do with the fact that it was a major medical centre, and medicine and magic tended to be interlinked, I don't know. The major sites are high on a hilltop, so it was good that a cable-car has recently been installed.

From Pergamum we went on further south, bypassing Izmir (in biblical times Smyrna – Rev 2:8), to spend the night in Selcuk, before spending half a day at neighbouring Ephesus. This is the most spectacular of all the ancient sites with its streets and houses, temples, theatre and library – and, just across the road from the library, a brothel! It was also crowded with tourists (if this is the off season, what must the high season be like?), but that's how Ephesus was in ancient times too. It's awesome to think that St Paul walked down this very road.

On to Pamukkale, with the white travertines or terraces, where the water flowing down the hillside leaves calcium deposits, and Hierapolis where a cleft in the ground letting out noxious volcanic fumes was believed to be the entrance to hell.

All in all, it was a great celebration of human creativity, but behind it lay the dark clouds of human destruction, from the Trojan War to Gallipoli to (on the day we left) the bombs detonated in the middle of a peace parade in Ankara. Pray for Turkey.

## White or Red? Which poppy will you wear?

It's difficult isn't it? Does the ceremony at the Cenotaph on Remembrance Sunday and war memorials throughout the UK seem to glorify war?

It's not just soldiers who die, so are all the casualties of war remembered?

Recently a WWII veteran was sacked from his role at a Remembrance Day parade after reading his own poem promoting pacifism at last year's event, even though he has read the

traditional poem for the fallen at the memorial service for a staggering 25 years. But last year he read his own, and then said 'Isn't war stupid?' The 92 year old is still confused about why he was sacked. "I'm rather disappointed! I'm a pacifist, and pacifism isn't supposed to upset people". (Hmm! Not the experience of conscientious objectors in either World War!)

A spokesperson for the local **British Legion** said 'many, many people were offended' by this poem, and the parade is the 'wrong time and place' for such words.

Does questioning War trivialize those who died? Somehow debase their memory?

Last year's Centenary of WWI highlighted the supposed futility of war. Yet I resented the implication that it was a European Civil War, because my grandfather and two great-uncles died in the mud of the Somme, and left letters showing their firm belief that it was a "just war" for freedom.

In May we celebrated the 70th Anniversary of VE Day, perhaps slightly uncomfortably so as not to offend our EU partners! Yet what would have happened if the Nazis had not been defeated? My RAF sergeant dad always wore his red poppy with pride.

Now war has created a tide of refugees in the Middle East. More air-strikes, more civilians killed, yet ISIS is so evil it must be defeated. Let's pray for a stronger UN to talk PEACE. Meanwhile I'll be wearing a red poppy on Remembrance Sunday.





And Joy, as always entertained at the piano. There is a little bit of 'bygone days' about the Fellowship at Time for Tea.

### **World Mental Health Day**

Saturday 10th October was World Mental Health Day, and in recognition of this, Fred Meynen suggested that we might like to share a story which appeared in the Dorking Quaker's Newsletter copied from the Quaker's National magazine "The Friend".

Hilary Botwright suffered from anorexia and wrote the following poem at the Woodbrooke Quaker Study Centre in Birmingham during a conference on mental health issues. Hilary died peacefully in her sleep not long after the conference.

#### What Makes me Human?

I lie in bed and caress my ribs, the smooth ebony as hard as piano keys. Questions overwhelm. Why?

I am two people. I am a thousand people. I am a pathetic broken soul, battered by the pain of the world;

Fighting a furious civil war with myself where there is no victor.

Yet I am also the girl who finds beauty in a fragile sapling.

I am the girl who experiences a delicious thrill as the sun silently glides into the sky.

 ${\rm I}$  am the girl awed by two geese who penetrate the morning air as if they own it and we are yet to find out.

I am the girl fascinated by the 6.42 train to King's Cross - dreams, hopes and fears shuttling along in the half light of dawn.

I am the girl who sees every plate of food looming as poison.

How? How do I marry together all that astonishes and scares me? How can I know some of the depth of human suffering and yet still be entranced by the gentle moon as she tenderly moves through her cycle? How can I be delighted by the intricacies of a spider's web, the morning dew clinging resolutely to every fibre - yet also know of torture, loss, grief and despair.

How can I strive to nourish every soul but my own? This me.

Perhaps this is all of us.

Aren't we all simply walking dichotomies of beauty and pain, suffering and joy, dreams and disappointments,

Holding on and knowing when it is time to let go?

Our place in this world is as transient and fleeting as the clocks on a dandelion and as we stumble, soar and crawl through this wild, mundane and intoxicating world, perhaps it is this then, that makes me human.

## Dementia: Pathways to Hope - Spiritual insights and practical hope for carers

By Louise Morse, Lion Hudson, £7.99

Louise Morse offers practical help and sound spiritual and psychological insights to carers of those living with dementia. From hundreds of interviews and hands-on experience, Louise Morse offers counsel on what dementia is, and is not; how to make your home a safe place; how to understand and handle challenging behaviour; slowing the onset of dementia; how Churches can help; when specialist care is needed; and illuminating stories of what has helped others.

Secular models of support don't adequately reflect Christian values of compassion, love and service. Our current medical services are letting people down, there is no cure on the horizon, and the pharmaceutical companies are reducing their investment. Too little advice is available, yet at least two-thirds of dementia sufferers are cared for in their own homes.

This compassionate and timely resource will be critical to those coping with dementia in a family member or friend and those who fear they may develop it.




