The Minister Writes...

From Rev Jan Hofmeyr

Dear Friends,

The closing months of this year bring two significant milestones in my life – the 30th anniversary of my ordination, which I celebrated on 16th October, and our 40th wedding anniversary which happens on 16th December. This got me thinking about similarities between the church and marriage.

One of those is communication. We have all heard about the importance of communication in marriage, and the same applies to relationships within the church. In my years in the ministry I have come across any number of cases where conflict between people came down to a lack of communication and the resultant misunderstandings. It is so important, where we have understood someone to say something to us or we have heard about something allegedly said about us, that we go to the person concerned and make quite sure what the person actually said and actually meant. It could prevent a lot of heartache in the church just as it can in one's marriage and other close relationships.

A second similarity between marriages and churches is the fact that differences need not mean division. No couple ever feel the same about everything nor do they have all the same likes and dislikes. Yet most marriages are able to survive these differences and not allow them to become serious conflicts. Indeed, as we know, it is often our very differences that attract us to each other in the first place. The same should be true of the church and often is – people are able to get along together despite differences of view on issues and practices in the church. But sadly this is not always the case, and we can allow differences of view and taste to become the cause of conflict. It could be about the sacraments; it could be about the leaders in the church and who is good and who isn't; it could be about the gifts of the Holy Spirit. However important an issue may be, it should not be allowed to bring division. As a Christian leader of long ago said, 'In essentials unity, in non-essentials liberty, in all things charity'. That leads us to the other similarity between marriage and the church – the importance of love.

The possible causes of division in the church I just mentioned were actually happening in the Church in Corinth. And to that church Paul wrote the great passage on love – a passage which interestingly is often read at wedding services. Paul says to them that without love their religion counts for nothing. Sometimes as Christians we believe its more important to be right than to be loving. It can happen in marriage too – arguing about who is right, but being unloving in the process. 'Love', says Paul, 'is patient and kind, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs, it always protects, always trusts, always perseveres'. May that be true in growing measure in our relationships and in our churches. 'By this', said Jesus, 'will people know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another'.

From Rev Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

GK Chesterton once said "*The true soldier fights not because he hates what is in front of him, but because he loves what is behind him.*"

My mind wanders at times and often the simplest sentences can draw me in, in ways I might not have imagined. After reading the quote from G K Chesterton it made me think about the wonderful passage in Luke 9:61-62 "*I will follow You, Lord; but first let me bid farewell to my family. No one who puts a hand to the plough and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God.*"

They each express something quite different, resting in different contexts and yet together they have something to say.

G K Chesterton was known as the prince of paradox and that is perhaps why I enjoy pondering on what he has to say. This expression of "loving that which is behind", there is for me an intimacy with the past, an acknowledgement that what has been is indeed precious, is indeed worthy of protection when looking at a potential future without those things you hold so dear.

Jesus talks about looking forward and not looking back, there's a sense of urgency about following Christ that suggests you can only move forwards if you focus on Christ, not about what has gone before but what is to come. A reference to a future that can look so different from that which has been.

I came across a poem recently written in 1915 by F.W Bourdillon:
*O nature we arraign thee now
because a smile is on thy face
and woodlands wear their wonted grace
and birds since joy on every bough*

*And nothing heeds the grief of man
the war the wound the agony
the broken heart the helplessness
the end of hope ere hope began*

*Thy heart is greater than our grief
thy bosom wider than our woe
thy sympathy thou dost not show
is larger than the hours relief*

*I rest me in thine arms secure
come what death may to me or mine
thou art undying and divine
all that I live for shall endure*

The poem speaks of endurance beyond what is seen. The landscapes that once told the stories of devastation and destruction look differently now some 100 years since the end of the first world war. It was ironically described as the war to end all wars, they were not to know the reality of future conflicts.

It seems that we cannot think of the future unless we look at the past and learn from it. We must look back, we must hold in the palm of our hands and deep within our hearts the pain of the past, the cruelty, the devastation and the loss. Yet in doing so we must look to a future which seeks to protect that which is precious to us because of it, to value and respect life, the precious gift of every human being, where we yearn for a lasting peace.

Yet in the mix of it all we are called to follow Christ, to have our eyes fixed on him and the pathway he sets before us. Because his ways are not our ways, Christ is the one who enables us to rise above our disagreements. Christ is the one who places a costly Love at the centre of our being and invites us to emulate such love. The peace Christ talks about is achieved if we allow the divine to be expressed from within us. Not easy I know, but that is why we seek him every moment of every day.

So we look back and we look to the future, a future that endures. May God bless all who will find this season of remembering so painful, may you rest in the arms of God and in the knowledge that we stand with you.

Next meetings are November 8th and 22nd, when Grace Notes will be playing for us.




Remembrance Sunday on 11th November 2018

11 November 2018 marks 100 years since the end of World War I. A number of churches and Christian organisations have partnered in providing resources in the run-up to the event and for the Sunday itself. They are available on the Remembrance 100 website.

Some Churches and Christian organisations are also involved with ***Battle's Over: A Nation's Tribute*** on 11 November 2018. It is organised in association with (among others) the Church of Scotland, Action of Churches Together in Scotland (ACTS) and the Association of English Cathedrals. Cathedrals and churches are being encouraged to participate by ringing their bells at 7.05pm on 11 November 2018. The guide for taking part in the events includes messages from leaders of the Scottish Episcopal Church, Church of Scotland, Church in Wales and the President of the Irish Council of Churches.


International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP)



Book Review



MARY JONES AND HER BIBLE **by Mary Ropes**

To some who read this review the story of Mary Jones will need no introduction. Mary Ropes' book was first published in 1882 and is still in print. I read it for the first time in the 1950s and decades on it still holds its charm.

Mary Jones was born in 1784, the only child of poor weavers who lived in Llanfihangel-y-Pennant at the foot of Cader Idris in Merioneth, North Wales. She attended the local Methodist church with her parents and loved to listen to the Bible stories. She could not read them for herself until, when she was 10 years of age, a school opened two miles from her home. She then learnt to read and write very quickly but there was no Bible at home for her to read because the Welsh Bible was scarce and unaffordable. However she was invited by Mr and Mrs Evans, good-hearted local farmers, to come to the farmhouse every Saturday where she could study their Bible. Such was the beginning of Mary's story and her quest to acquire a Bible of her own.

The next six years of her young life saw Mary putting together the money needed to purchase a Bible. She had to rely on doing odd jobs, selling eggs – Mrs Evans gave her two hens and a cockerel – and no doubt much prayer. Finally she saved enough money and, at the age of 15, walked barefoot on her own to Bala, 25 miles from her home village. In Bala she met the Rev. Thomas Charles who was known to have Bibles for sale. There were some anxious minutes when Mr Charles told her he had no Bibles to sell except those already ordered by others. But then he relented and decided to sell one of those to Mary instead.

The book also tells us that Thomas Charles was deeply concerned about the lack of Bibles in the Welsh language. There is no doubt that the meeting with Mary Jones was very much in his mind when he began his campaign to improve the situation. He was successful and in 1804 the British and Foreign Bible Society was established and money was contributed immediately for the production of the Bible in Welsh.

The story of Mary and her devotion and diligence is truly an uplifting one and has an enduring quality even in this more secular age. Mary Ropes tells the story in a very accessible way. She fills the gaps in her knowledge imaginatively with probabilities in place of scarce facts but this should not detract from our enjoyment of this true story. Mary's Bible was preserved and is in the possession of the Bible Society and there is a memorial to her in her home village in North Wales. Further useful information can be learned by going online.

I recommend this little book to everybody who may not already have acquired it. Though aimed at a younger readership it can be enjoyed by all age groups.



The Weardale Museum and High House Chapel



Holidays provide the opportunity to visit other churches elsewhere and for me this is usually a Methodist or an Anglican church. On our recent holiday staying in Westgate we were very near the High House Chapel and Museum. High House is the oldest purpose built Methodist chapel in continuous weekly use. Methodist Recorder readers may have read about the chapel a few weeks ago. It has funding issues and may have to close.

Built in 1760, High House Chapel still holds services every Sunday. John Wesley visited 13 times, and in 1772 witnessed an incredible revival of the work of God when the 'Fires of Methodism' took hold among the lead-mining population.

The 266 members then at High House accounted for over a quarter of the membership of the whole Dales Circuit.

Weardale Museum, is a small, volunteer run, independent folk museum operating to award-winning standards from the adjoining manse building. It has displays on local history, including a beautiful tapestry in five embroidered panels.

The Wesley Room contains a large collection of Methodist memorabilia, displays about Wesley's visits and the work of the early evangelists, additional information about the Primitive Methodist revival in Weardale in the 1820s and the story of the 1788 Methodist Subscription Library, set up in nearby Westgate.

Visiting the chapel for the harvest morning service also gave insight into the challenges facing the chapel and museum and local fundraising is a priority as central Methodist funding is apparently not available.

Attending the service on Sunday enabled me to meet the local folk, some of whom had travelled to support the chapel. Over coffee I heard how the congregation is divided about seeking to keep it all going somehow or probably having to let it close. They need £12,000 at least for some basic maintenance I believe.

How difficult decision making must be, as ever, where congregations have dwindled and where a very historic building is under threat of closure. Is it back to our roots and shoots maybe? What would Wesley say I wonder? The village has a local institute building that might provide a more modern base should the chapel close. I shall watch developments with interest and pray that God will bless whatever decisions are made for this little congregation and their future mission in such a beautiful part of the country.


