



# From Rev. Kim Plumpton

Dear friends,

One night, pouring my heart out in prayer, standing before the foot of the cross in church, I recounted my week in conversation with God and concluded after some reflection that instead of doing a few jobs well I had in fact done a lot of jobs poorly. My closing remarks ran along the lines of 'You must despair of me Lord, when will I ever get it right, maybe one day I'll be the perfect minister you want me to be.' Yet as I stood there I suddenly became aware that perfection is not what God was seeking from me, if it was he could be waiting a long time.

Perfection is often something we strive for, but I wonder if it's quite what God intends for us. To be perfect is to reach 'the highest degree of proficiency, skill, or excellence.' It's not that I think God is not interested in us getting things right but I do think he's interested in what we do when we get it wrong and how we perceive our achievements or lack of them.

C.S. Lewis once said 'God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pain.'

Our need for God is not in seeking perfection that somehow our troubles will be whisked away or that we will no longer make mistakes, but that in our weakness God will still work, "*My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness."* 2 Corinthians 12:9.

There's a verse from a song called In My Weakness by Christy Galvin which also adds another useful dimension:

When failures in my human strength have weakened all my pride, And ruined hopes in fallen dreams have crumbled me inside; It's then by grace I finally see the strength of Jesus Christ, His victory is real in me when weakness fills my life.

It is often our own pride, our own ideas of perfection that makes us feel we have somehow fallen short, we measure our success by our own standards or by the standards that the world sets. Yet Jesus Christ has already paid the price, it is a costly grace we have been offered. God merely desires that we keep seeking him, we keep calling out to him, for a graceless journey made in isolation is doomed, governed by anything other than God.

God knows we are not perfect, God knows the frailty of humankind, all he desires is that we come a little closer and that we allow him to work through us, mistakes and all - that each day we might grow in the grace of God.

# From Rev. Lynda Russell

Some of you may know that the President and Vice-President of the Methodist Church have chosen Justice and Holiness as their themes for the year. These are such important subjects for us as Christians at this time, particularly when justice is denied to many.

I'm sure most of us have noticed that children have a great sense of fairness. How often do you hear a child say, "It's not fair!" They seem to be able sense the injustice or at least the perceived injustice in many situations. To a child it's not fair that they have to go to bed when they would rather be watching TV, or that they have to do their homework before they can play, or that their friend can have the latest gadget for Christmas when they can't. But they can also see that it isn't fair when someone is overlooked when choosing teams or when sweets are divided unequally, or somebody cheats in a game.


As we grow, that sense of fairness gets tempered against the reality of life. To the child's cry of "it's not fair" comes the reply, "life isn't fair, get used to it". And so we accept it as the way of the world. We accept that not everyone gets a fair share of the world's resources and that seemingly good people suffer while those we see as bad prosper. This is nothing new; the Bible has a number of passages where the writer speaks out against injustice and unfairness. We see this especially in the Psalms, in Ecclesiastes, and of course the book of Job is all about the unfair things that happen to Job.

Yet those writers all reach the same conclusion, that although life may not be fair, God is. They seem to say that while we may see injustice in all sorts of ways around us it is neither God's will or wish for us. The Bible teaches us that the Kingdom of God is a place of justice and mercy, a place of fairness and of love.

As I write this, I have just come back from the District Synod. We heard from a spokesperson from Christian Aid – despite all the complaints about refugees and migrants lately – they only comprise around 0.25% of the population in the UK.

What can we as a church do to step into this situation to help bring about justice? We heard a few ideas of what others had done. Perhaps it's time that we stop accepting injustice when we can speak out against it. It is the task of the Church to make the Kingdom of God a reality, to work for justice and fairness for all, knowing that, while it may be hard to achieve, it is God's will.

# Saints' days in October.

It's good to remember the great men and women of the church from past years, some of whom are given the title of "Saint", with a special day om which to remember them, but many of whom are not. # Elaine's Big Sing

Life for Elaine Moran, confined to a wheelchair, is often difficult, but recently she joined a five thousandstrong congregation at the **Royal Albert Hall** for the recording of two episodes the BBC's **Songs of Praise Big Sing,** including a special Christmas edition. She enjoyed herself enormously, singing hymns old and new and some traditional Christmas Carols.

The programme's presenters **Aled Jones and David Grant** were there to introduce the star guests, two of Elaine's favourite singers, **Michael Ball and Alfie Boe**, and **The Priests**, a classical music trio of Roman Catholic priests from Northern Ireland. The inspirational **Gareth Malone Choir** were also there along with modern hymn-writers, **Keith & Kristyn Getty**, and **Laura Mvula**, and a soul-singer songwriter from Birmingham. There were also five choirs from around London, including the **Guildford Choral Society**, all backed by the **Big Sing Orchestra**.

Elaine said it was wonderful to be singing in the Royal Albert Hall as part of such a huge "congregation". She had never been to a TV-recording session before and said it was fun, although some parts had to be "re-done" as the presenters were not quite on cue !

She very much enjoyed hearing the soloists and several modern-hymns, and said that the atmosphere was fantastic.

So a very uplifting and joyful day !

Of course you can share some of this atmosphere when the programmes are broadcast on BBC One on Sunday 9th October and on Sunday 25 December (Christmas Day).

# **Our Heritage**



Despite the amazing support from church members **Heritage Weekend** is quite a challenge for us. We love history and a bit of industrial heritage but we don't want to bore the pants off people, by producing display boards that are of no interest or relevance to them.

This year, as well as dealing with village history, we decided to try and give an idea of what it was like to live around the 1800's, when non

conformists decided to meet locally and build a chapel.

In 1842 we know that Methodists met on Ranmore Common in the open, or possibly inside a farm building at Cracknut Lodge. Although it was only for a few years it would have meant tramping some of the local paths we may know, which can be extremely wet and muddy, when the weather is bad. The preachers would have come from Dorking, Bookham or possibly Guildford. They would probably have walked or come by horse (more of this later). The railway had not come to the Effingham area yet!

Our meeting place in 1844 was Mary Cook's home, and, as we can see from copies of the Plan, preachers came significant distances to lead services. From as far away as Horsham, along the old London road through Capel and Dorking. We can only guess at how they made the journey but it is most likely that it was by horse. The journey to Horsham was on a rough road, wide enough for mail coaches and part of a route between London, Horsham and Brighton. Most of the other roads across "the Weald" were farm tracks many of them impassable in the winter because of wet sticky clay. No wonder Preachers often had a meal after the service before making the journey home!

These preachers are an inspiration to us all, for despite distance or bad weather they made the journey to Effingham to lead worship, and yes they sometimes came by horse and tied it to that ring and chain still hanging from left hand corner of the church building.

Thank God for preachers.....and horses !!

# Visit of Rev Jeyapaul and Charles to LMC

Rev Jeyapaul was brought up in South India in the Dalit caste, known as "the untouchables". He was one of the first in his village to be educated, and eventually graduated and became a minister within the Church of South India.



Quite separately from his pastoral work, he and his family have set up an amazing hostel and community development project in Devakottai, a town in Tamil Nadu, South India. They have been able to educate Dalit children to whom an education would be denied, and provide a Christian fellowship that has helped hundreds of young disadvantaged people, especially girls who are denied so many privileges in India.

# **Celebrating Harvest**

In his book "Cider with Rosie", describing growing up in the Cotswolds in the 1920s, Laurie Lee writes that he lived at the end of an era as far as rural life went. It seemed that life had gone on in the same way for centuries, but after that it all changed. I grew up in a Lincolnshire village some 20 years later, and it seemed the same to me, and I guess that those who lived through the coming of the railways, or the land enclosures thought the same. Perhaps we all recognise change and feel nostalgia for what went before. Returning recently to the village where I grew up, and meeting and talking with some of those I grew up with brought on a dose of nostalgia for me, particularly since it is the time of the end of harvest and the time of Harvest Festivals.

Harvest began with men with scythes "opening up" a field. This in-

volved cutting an 8 - 10 foot strip round the edge of the field, and hand-binding the wheat, barley or oats into sheaves with a band of straw. This allowed the tractor-towed binder to do the first circuit of the field without trampling down the crop. The binder was a fascinating, and ingenious machine, which could cut the wheat, bundle it neatly, put a length of string round it, tie a knot and cut the string before dropping it on the field.

Then came the job that needed all hands, including young ones. The sheaves had to be picked up in pairs, one under each arm, and put into tent-shaped stooks, which stood in the field for a week or two to dry. Then the wagons came, and they were loaded up and taken to the farmyard to be stacked.

Always after the harvest came the Harvest






Festival, timed so that there was a reasonable hope that we could truthfully sing "All is safely gathered in". The front of the chapel was piled high with produce, and filled with scent of fruit, vegetables ad flowers, and we thanked God for another year's harvest, as we still do.

# October 31 All Hallows Eve – or Holy Evening

Modern Halloween celebrations have their roots with the Celtic peoples of pre-Christian times.

In those long-ago days, on the last night of October, the Celts celebrated the Festival of Samhain, or 'Summer's End'. The priests, or Druids, performed ceremonies to thank and honour the sun. For there was a very dark side to all this: Samhain also signalled the onset of winter, a time when it was feared that unfriendly ghosts, nature-spirits, and witches roamed the earth, creating mischief. So the Druid priests lit great bonfires and performed magic rites to ward off or appease these dark supernatural powers.

Then the Romans arrived, and brought their Harvest Festival which honoured the Goddess Pomona with gifts of apples and nuts. The two festivals slowly merged.

When Christianity arrived still later, it began to replace the Roman and Druid religions. 1 November - All Saints' Day - was dedicated to all Christian Martyrs and Saints who had died. It was called 'All Hallows' Day'. The evening before became an evening of prayer and preparation and was called 'All Hallows' Eve', The Holy Evening, later shortened to 'Halloween'.

For many centuries, however, fear of the supernatural remained strong. During the Middle Ages, animal costumes and frightening masks were worn to ward off the evil spirits of darkness on Halloween. Magic words and charms were used to keep away bad luck, and everybody believed that witches ride about on broomsticks. Fortune telling was popular, and predicting the future by the use of nuts and apples was so popular that Halloween is still sometimes known as Nutcrack Night or Snap-Apple Night.

Today, Christians have learned to turn to prayer instead of charms to overcome the powers of darkness. And the deeper, true meaning of All Hallows' Eve, should not be forgotten. As Christians, we all draw closer to Christ when we remember and give thanks for our loved ones and for others who have gone before us through the gates of death.


