

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## The Minister Writes...

#### From Rev Kim Plumpton

#### Dear Friends,

I start to write this letter during my time at a gathering of ministers in Hertford. We've come together to explore 'God's Grand Design.' As per usual those who know me well will know how unprepared I usually am especially when setting off for such things. I had caught a glimpse of the title, knew where it was, and set off.

Whilst driving of course I pondered upon what we might be discussing, but couldn't help wandering in the direction of that wonderful television programme, Grand Designs. It is of course presented by Kevin McCloud who follows ordinary people who want to design and build their own home.

Regardless of whether you like the finished product or not you cannot help but admire the extraordinary lengths people will go to, to achieve the 'perfect' home. It is of course hugely time consuming, costly, not just financially but emotionally too, often involving mistakes along the way that sometimes they must live with. But etched in every piece of the building is the knowledge that they have worked hard to achieve the house of their dreams.

Of course what we were exploring as ministers was not our dreams for the Church but God's grand design for the church,  $21^{\rm st}$  century lessons from the church at Ephesus. We explored Pauls encounter with the church and his response to being church in a volatile community. So I offer you a very small account of the conversation we shared over three days.

In Ephesians Paul talks about being set apart and holy, to serve and glorify God in everything they did together. Like most new foundlings in the faith, tensions arose in the church as to what a faith in Christ might look like, so Paul encourages the church.

Paul explores what it means to be valued in Christ, developing a community of grace, not about what we do but about what Christ wishes to achieve through us. Paul challenged the community to consider how big their view of God was, knowing that once they

had this knowledge they would also be aware of who they were in Christ. It is all grounded in the reality of God's love, the fullness of God's love dwelling in one another, "to know this love that surpasses knowledge--that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God" and in the knowledge that God is able to do immeasurably more by his power in us, we need not limit God, developing God's wisdom, seeking God's vision for the church.

Paul's vision for the church is one of organic unity with Christ as head of the church. It is a place where we are given the authority to go in his name, 'as the Father sent me so I send you.' Paul invites prayer and unity, he explores developing our relationship with Christ with the desire that the believers would grow. We were asked an interesting question, how have you grown in 2018? Paul urges the believers, even begs the believers, to mature, "Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching," Paul encourages the believers to be proactive and intentional about growth.

It is also clear that Paul encourages an appreciation of one another, so that they may build up one another in love and he doesn't shy away from the fact that division will occur as it does in any community. Paul encourages them to face such times with grace and love. "Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamour and slander be put away from you, along with all malice. Be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you."

A church, Paul suggests, excels when its members are devoted to Christ, dedicated to one another, demonstrating the Kingdom and declaring the gospel.

It's interesting that if we lose sight of our first love, being devoted to Christ, no matter what our wonderful deeds might be, then we discover as the Ephesians did that the church will fail in its mission to the world. As John suggests in Revelation 2:4 'You have forsaken the love you had at first.' In the midst of everything they lost their fire for Jesus and yet Jesus is the very cement that holds everything together in God's grand design for his church.

So there you have it, a little glimpse through a window into my few days away. I hope that in some way you may find it helpful.

#### From Rev Jan Hofmeyr

Dear Friends,

My letter last month was addressed to 'Dear Friends-to-be', having been written before our arrival. I (together with Angela), can now confidently use the word 'friends' of the many people who have already welcomed us so positively and warmly. We have been overwhelmed by the love and friendliness.

Thank you to all who attended our welcome service, especially those who came from the other churches in the Pastorate. We were also impressed by the number of people visiting from other denominations and agencies in the area. It was so special to have our family members from Wimbledon and Kingston with us. Being close to children and grandchildren is such a blessing for us.

We are loving the manse and have settled in very comfortably. Having some furniture and personal items from South Africa has added to the feeling that this is really 'home'. We are enjoying the garden (as are the grandchildren) and I have been able to do some gardening on my Monday 'day off'. We are also starting to explore the beautiful surroundings in the area.

Angela is enjoying herself greatly. She has already got involved with some church activities. This, together with the time with family and friends (old and new) have made for a full and enriching time. She also revels in the beauty of the countryside – maybe because of her English blood (!), inherited from her parents who originated from Wallasey in Cheshire.

The impression of some people overseas is that the Church in the UK is in a bad way. Although there are certainly some causes for concern, the life in many churches here has been very gratifying for us to see. God is at work in the UK and, because it is God's Church, it will never be defeated. We can trust God to take care of His Church.

But having said that, God also calls us to join with Him as partners in the work of the Kingdom. I have already heard here the lament (which is also true of our experience in South Africa) that 'The same people do all the work around here'. Paul says in his letters that we as the Church are a body. And if parts of the body are not fulfilling their function the health of the entire body suffers.

Yesterday (18 September), David Stoves received the wonderful news that his kidneys had recovered to the degree that he no longer needs the dialysis he was having every few days. In the Church we have no 'dialysis' or other machines to compensate for a part of the Body that is not functioning properly. It simply means that the Church limps along, far less healthy and effective than it could be.


I want to encourage you to consider, in a time of quiet before the Lord, to what extent you are using the gifts, resources and skills which God has entrusted to you. The use of these needn't be limited to the church, since the Kingdom and our work in it is broader than the Church. But use them we must, for we are accountable in the end to the Lord for our employment of those gifts or the lack thereof.

Studdert Kennedy, a priest and poet in the early part of the last century, wrote these words, as they might be expressed by a London Cockney about the Final Judgment:

"There ain't no thrones and there ain't no books, It's 'Im you gotta see, it's 'Im just 'Im Such is the judge of blokes like you and me. And I say my friend, I'd rather stand In the flames of a burnin' 'ell Than stand and look into His face And 'ear 'Is voice say 'Well?'"


#### **Micky Mouse makes Christmas!**

Anyway, shouldn't Christmas be more than just a sales gimmick?



#### Jesus is who, what and why we celebrate....isn't he?

But the shocking fact is that more than 50% of people say that the birth of Jesus is 'irrelevant' to their Christmas. Recent research reveals that **40% of people** do not even realise that Jesus was a real person who actually lived. People need to be helped to put the whole story together by connecting the cute and cuddly baby Jesus, born at Christmas, to the scourged and bloodied Christ crucified and resurrected at Easter. The two festivals need to be reconnected in the public consciousness, with Jesus Christ central to

both. For without Christmas there can be no Easter; and without Easter there is no point in Christmas. Which is why this poster, 'The Passion of Christmas', features a stark, even shocking, image of the scourged Christ carrying not a cross but a Christmas tree, with the simple message: 'Remember why'.



## THE FACTS ON HALLOWEEN by John Ankerberg and John Weldon

The celebration of Halloween is relatively new in this country and found its way here from America. It has now become very popular and is a commercial success in much the same way as Christmas. Just as the commercialisation of Christmas has overshadowed its real meaning, the full implications and character of Halloween are lost amid the fun and games. Nevertheless Christmas remains a Christian celebration; so what of Halloween which has pagan origins? In the Preface to this short but informative book the authors ask: do the pagan and occult associations of Halloween disqualify it spiritually or ethically as an activity that Christians can participate in?

The book is in three helpful sections. These are 1. Halloween: Ancient, Medieval and Modern; 2. A Christian and Biblical Analysis of Halloween and 3. Halloween, Haunted Houses, Poltergeists and Witchcraft.

Section 1 contains an historical account of the origins of Halloween. It also tells how it relates to pagan beliefs, to the Catholic Church, the dead and purgatory and modern occult practices.

Historically Halloween was the day before All Saints Day, once called All Hallows Day, on the 1<sup>st</sup> of November and the 31<sup>st</sup> of October was known as All Hallows Eve (hence Halloween). There is general agreement that Halloween took the place of a special day celebrated by the ancient Druids. The Druids were the priests of the Celtic peoples who worshipped the Sun God and engaged in human sacrifice and occult arts. They occupied northern France and the British Isles. Their beliefs and practices declined after the Roman conquest but some Celtic customs lived on.

Another Celtic god, Samhain, (Lord of the Dead) was worshipped on the day of the Winter Festival, which is now the 31st of October, when ghosts and evil spirits were supposed to roam about.

On this night frustrated ghosts were believed to play tricks on humans and the people donned grotesque masks and danced around bonfires. Druidic practices were much concerned with communicating with the dead. The Catholic Church still teaches that believers may pray for the souls being tormented in purgatory and ease their suffering but it is pointed out that the concept of purgatory is neither biblical nor Christian. The book explains in detail how the present-day Halloween customs and practices developed as time went by.

Section 2 of the book asks the question: can Halloween be an entirely innocent practice? The authors then present a case for abstinence from participation in Halloween. They point out that, though we may take part in it innocently, the various practices and the underlying associations for which they were intended are still retained. There is a detailed discussion about these matters based on a Christian and biblical analysis of Halloween. There are many Bible references and quotations to help the reader and much relevant advice.

Haunted houses, poltergeists and witchcraft and how they relate to Halloween are the subject of Section 3 of the book. The theories relating to good and bad witches are explored and it is emphasised that the view that witchcraft is not anti-Christian but something good and positive is contradicted by the facts. Reference is made to Deuteronomy 18:10-12 which states that anyone who engages in witchcraft is detestable to the Lord. Phenomena such as ghosts and poltergeists are fully discussed and the authors acknowledge that there are actual occurrences, especially of poltergeists. However, they make it clear that, far from being manifestations of the dead, they are in fact evil spirits which the Bible identifies as demons.

The authors conclude that Halloween, poltergeists, witchcraft and spiritualism are all closely connected and that however innocent Halloween may be at one level, at another its innocence is lost altogether. Because of the modern revival of witchcraft and other forms of neo-paganism profound changes are taking place in the religious climate of the West.

This is why the Christian community should be more committed to prayer, sanctification and evangelism.

I recommend this book. I do so as a Christian and one who understands that evil exists in the world as much as it ever did. Why encourage it?

## Christmas Angels and Stars





#### What is Christian Revival?

Revival refers to a spiritual reawakening from a state of dormancy or stagnation in the life of a believer. It encompasses the resurfacing of a love for God, an appreciation of God's holiness, a passion for His Word and His church, a convicting awareness of personal and corporate sin, a spirit of humility, and a desire for repentance and growth in righteousness. Revival invigorates and sometimes deepens a believer's faith, opening his or her eyes to the truth in a fresh, new way. It generally involves the connotation of a fresh start with a clean slate, marking a new beginning of a life lived in obedience to God. Revival breaks the charm and power of the world, which blinds the eyes of men, and generates both the will and power to live in the world but not of the world.

In the USA, the first revival produced an upsurge of devotion among Protestants in the 1730s and 1740s. It resulted from authoritative preaching that deeply moved the church members with a convicting awareness of personal guilt and the awesome nature of salvation through Christ. Breaking away from dry ritual and rote ceremony, it made Christianity intensely personal to the average person, as it should be, by creating a deep emotional need for relationship with Christ.

Revival, in many respects, replicates the believer's experience when he or she is saved. It is initiated by a prompting of the Holy Spirit, creating an awareness of something missing or wrong in the believer's life that can only be righted by God. In turn, the Christian must respond from the heart, acknowledging need. Then, in a powerful way, the Holy Spirit draws back the veil over the truth, allowing the believers to fully see themselves in comparison to God's majesty and holiness. Obviously, this brings great humility, but also great awe of God and His truly amazing grace (Isaiah 6:5). Unlike the original conversion experience that brings about a new relationship to God, however, revival represents a restoration of fellowship with God.

God, through His Holy Spirit, calls us to revival in a number of situations. The letters to the seven churches reveal some circumstances that may need revival. In the letter to Ephesus, the church is praised, but they had forsaken their first love (Rev. 2:4-5). 
