

# From Rev Kim Plumpton

Dear Friends,

I was asked to go and share the harvest theme with a nursery school on the 20<sup>th</sup> September, rather fitting I thought as it was also World Climate Strike Day. The protest invited the world to sit up and take notice, It gave rise to numerous marches and strikes worldwide by hundreds of thousands of children and young people, a call to countries to up their efforts to combat climate change.

Greta Thunberg is a remarkable human being and if ever you wondered whether one person can make a difference in this world, she is certainly a good example. When asked the question why she encouraged young people to strike on a school day, she simply answered "If you don't give a damn about the future then why should I." It's a fiercely cutting response and one that takes your breath away. However, it makes the point that many younger people genuinely wonder what the future may look like for them. On receiving the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, one scientist answered criticism that talk of climate change by scientists is striking fear around the world. In response he simply said that if they had talked more frankly earlier perhaps we might have listened more intently then and actually done something about it. So here I was wandering around the nursery from classroom to classroom, encouraging the children to think about the world and why we should be thankful. I brought a treasure box and inside it held items representing the world's oceans, the land, the food we harvest, the air we breath, and the people we encounter. For the 1-year olds I sang a song 'who put the colours in the rainbow,' for the 2 year olds we sang and looked at the treasure box. For the oldest ones I used all the resources I had, the conversation flowed about our grateful thanks for such a diverse and treasured world. Yet in the back of my mind during that visit and for most of the day I wondered whether the world would sit up and take notice of the real issues that climate change raises. These small children sat before me will inherit a world so different from the one I grew

up in, my mind wanders to my grandchildren and I wonder if the word sorry is a good enough answer when they ask why the world is the way it is.

It is very humbling to have our young people raising their voices in such a significant way, I for one feel ashamed that it's takes a multitude of young people to push such an important issue to the forefront, we ignore these voices at our peril.

This blessed world that God has so generously given us to care for may need a little more help than we had first appreciated. I suspect it is going to take the worldwide community working together in ways that it has never done before. It will need to nurture the brightest of minds to find solutions. It will need to encourage dialogue where perhaps there has been silence. It will need to educate a world that has been used to living in one particular way. It will require sacrifice to limit the impact we have upon the world's resources.

Our Christian response, without a doubt, is to be good stewards. Remember the story of the servant who buries his masters money, who does nothing with it only to return it to his master on his return. The servant is scolded for being lazy, for not having invested the money unlike the other servants. It is time to invest our time, attention and money to the issues raised by climate change, to listen to the voices that are raising concerns about the world and to be proactive. God has given us this world and its time for us to give something back.

# From Rev Jan Hofmeyr

Dear Friends,

The Annual Methodist Conference, which met in July, received a report from the 'Marriage and Relationship Task Group' entitled 'God in Love Unites us'. The report covers various issues including co-habitation, civil partnerships and same-sex marriage. The Conference accepted the report, with some minor changes, and has proposed that the document become part of Methodist belief and practice. It will be debated at the Synods of the Church which will report back to the Conference of 2020, where a final decision will be taken. Individual congregations and Circuits are also free to debate the report and feed back their decisions to Synods via their Synod representatives.

The most contentious part of the report is the recommendation that the Methodist Church of Great Britain allow for the marriage of same-sex couples. However, there is also the proposal that ministers not be obliged to conduct such marriages, but that they be able to choose whether or not to do so. Also, it is recommended that individual congregations may decide whether to allow their buildings to be used for such ceremonies.

I am not wanting, here, to discuss the merits or demerits of this issue, but rather some ways in which we can approach this debate in the most constructive way.

In coming to our own conclusions about these matters it is useful to bear in mind the 'Wesleyan Quadrilateral' – a longstanding tool in Methodism for arriving at a standpoint on some issue. This 'Quadrilateral' invites us to consider 4 perspectives on an issue – the Bible, Tradition, Reason and Experience. Each of these can inform our thinking. Obviously the Bible is our primary basis for decision-making, but since the cultural context of the Bible is very different to our own, we also need to give some weight to the traditions of the Church over the centuries, our own human reasoning, as well as that of others, and our experience regarding the issue in question. (If we haven't had firsthand experience of some ethical issue, we need to be careful about making categorical pronouncements on it.)

One of the dangers with any contentious theological issue is that we demonise those who take a different view to our own and accuse them of purposely flaunting God's precepts and `not believing the Bible'. But, in my experience, such people are not seeking to flaunt God's precepts, they have simply, and in all sincerity, come to a different conclusion about what God's precepts are on a certain matter. After all, Christians down the ages, all using the same Bible, have come to differing conclusions on many issues. We need to retain respect for others and their views, even though we may radically disagree with their standpoint.

Sometimes in the Church we put so much emphasis on orthodoxy (right belief), that we neglect the supreme value of love. We can become more concerned about being right than about being loving. As Dallas Willard has written in 'Renovation of the Heart', 'We may feel that being right licences us to be mean, and, indeed requires us to be mean. We feel we must be hard on people who are wrong, especially if they are in positions of Christian leadership'. But, as someone has said, 'You may be right and I may be wrong, or I may be right and you may be wrong, but if it causes division between us, we are both wrong.'

The task group who produced the report end it on this note: 'As a Task Group, we answer John Wesley's challenge to be "of one heart, though we are not of one opinion" with his own words: "Without all doubt, we may". We invite you, the Methodist people, to receive this report with that same spirit, using it as a map for our continuing Pilgrimage of Faith. In this, we seek to encourage all Methodists to love each other, despite holding differing opinions in matters of relationships and sexuality.'

May the Lord help us as a Church to approach this issue with humility, respect, prayer and love.







*Our foodbank is a project founded by local churches and community groups, working together towards stopping hunger in our local area.* **We run five centres, (Epsom, Ewell, Leatherhead, Banstead & Tadworth)** which means we have one open each day from Tuesdays through to Saturdays.

We don't think anyone in our community should have to face going hungry. That's why we provide three days' worth of nutritionally balanced emergency food and support to local people who are referred to us in crisis. We are part of a nationwide network of foodbanks, supported by The Trussell Trust, working to combat poverty and hunger across the UK.

We continue to be very busy and only recently fed 38 people at one centre. As you can imagine, this is having an impact on our food stocks with some items being in very short supply. Your continued support has always been appreciated but never as much as now.

This is our current wish list (most needed items):

Cereal - not porridge ; Tinned veg; Tinned spaghetti; Long life fruit juice; Long life sponge puddings; Fruit squash; Tinned fruit; Instant mash; Noodles; Baby shampoo; Dried/powdered milk; Custard; UHT milk - semi skimmed and full fat; Shaving foam; Washing up liquid; Clothes washing powder/liquid; Chocolate, sweets, crisps etc; Nappies - size 6 only Hair conditioner; Tinned fish.

We also need heavy duty carrier bags/ bags for life.

### Items can be taken to the community centre in Kingston Road, North Leatherhead between 9.30am and 11.00am on Saturdays, or see Ron/Norma Shaw, Sue Friend or Tim Hall.

# Leatherhead Lunchbox

A big Thank You to both Colin Plumpton (Cobham) and Dave Putland (Effingham) who between them run the weekly Lunchbox at LMC. There's a hot meal provided, together with help and advice, for local people in need including many who are homeless.

Dave has given us some background notes, and he writes:

"Over the last few years we have been supported by kind donations from church members in the Pastorate, other local churches, schools, shops and local charities. As we have progressed we have increased our support for needy families requiring food but we have not always increased our efforts to raise money to enable the work to go on as we are also busy with doing other things, so at the moment our funds are very low. We are exploring charities who might help us during the coming year at the moment.

Meanwhile any gifts of food, money and clothing are most welcome. It costs us about £1,500 to run the lunch side of things and a further £1,000 in providing food parcels etc. We reach out to around eighty homes and shift tons of stuff during the course of a year. Collecting food from our various supporters also costs us petrol money as well as time and without our little team of volunteers we could not continue.

It is both Colin's and my view that God will provide us with what we need but this does not stop us from advertising our needs and taking advantage of local charities if they offer. I have been a bit slow to do this in the past because of being busy with other things so I very much appreciate any efforts to help."

Lunchbox is in need of supplies, particularly tinned meat pies, tinned soup and tinned meat. Place any food items in the box at the back of the church. As mentioned by Dave, they also need some financial support. If you are able to make a contribution towards this worthwhile cause, please can you place it in an envelope marked "Lunchbox" with your name on the back and give it to Les or Maureen Prescott who will ensure that it is passed on.

South African David Cape who has carried the cross and bowl in over 30 countries over 30 years has answered a prophetic call to walk the 173 miles of the Pilgrim's Way across south eastern England to call the nation back to the Lord.



He says the cross walk - from 25th August to 29th September - was suggested to him by pastoral friends who drew his attention to the ancient pathway which was used by early Christian believers from 597AD and later extended after the murder of Christian martyr Thomas Becket in 1171.

He says the prophetic call to undertake the walk was confirmed one morning as the Lord gave him the Scriptures - Jeremiah 18 v15:

"For My people have forgotten Me, They burn incense to worthless gods And they have stumbled from their

ways,

From the ancient paths, To walk in bypaths, Not on a highway."

and Jeremiah 6 v16:

Thus says the LORD, "Stand by the ways and see and ask for the ancient paths, Where the good way is, and walk in it; And you will find rest for your souls."

"I felt God was saying that the highway is His way, and that the Pilgrim's Way is a prophetic symbol of that highway and Him calling me to carry His Cross along the entire route. He plans to end his long walk by joining in an event in Westminster called "the Turning" during the last weekend of September.

We were delighted that Dave accepted our invitation to come to LMC for the evening service on 8th September to talk about his experiences. He was surprised and pleased to learn that John Wesley's last sermon was preached in the town. "We will be standing on the shoulders of giants" he said.



### HAPPY HEALTH DAY - 2<sup>ND</sup> November 2019, in the Leatherhead Institute

I live in hope that as I grow older, I also grow wiser due to experience. I have certainly benefitted from all I have learnt about my health, but I find myself increasingly suffering from A.R.I, age related irascibility, I go slower, but my impatience goes more quickly. We live in time when we are subjected to scams, and to advertising of foods and medication, which line the pockets of the inventors and sometimes do more harm to our health than the benefits they advertise. Some of us here in Leatherhead, do not even have the ability to feed our families and the queue at the Food Bank gets longer. So I have been given the task of helping research the help I have had in the past as a single parent, homeless, disabled, on benefits (briefly) bringing up children, caring for elderly neighbours and to pass on my knowledge of nutrition, credit union, and statutory and voluntary services to others. *Continued next page*  Arthur-itis and other unwanted companions on the road are inevitable, and the state of the NHS leaves us wondering whether they are really trying to keep us alive successfully providing we escape the side effects of medication which may be giving us extra difficulties. This unwanted stress is not necessary, if we learn to understand how our bodies work and how they have a miracle of capability to self-heal if given time, rest, and the correct care and nutrition. Of course we need the vital, life-saving service of our GPs, A&E and Hospitals, but we should not be overloading them with minor complaints. Stress increases as we try to get appointments. Conditions worsen as we wait for hospital appointments, or an available bed.

Stressed backwards spells desserts. Do we get our just desserts if we over indulge, or eat sweets or cake to spoil ourselves when distressed and then become diabetic?

Please help me shape a happier future for the unaware, who need information and some basic education on how to enjoy good health, and where to get help when needed; depression leads in some sad unhelped cases to unhappy death. My event focuses on Happy Birth, Happy Life and then Happy Death, with reduced anxieties.

Jan reminded us how we SHAPE our service in the community. Spiritual gifts – caring: Heart – feeling for others: Ability - gifts, skills, storytelling teaching: Personality – introvert or extrovert, ideas or action: Experience – to teach or help others. All of us are involved in our daily lives, even the lonely can try to stay cheerful and smile, which helps others.

I know everyone is busy, but I would be very grateful for help on 2<sup>nd</sup> November, even if it is just to sit at a table and play a table game with children, listen to a question and direct someone to the possible answer, wash a plate or make a sandwich, or hand out an invitation. The Ashlea medical practice Patient Participation Group had a health event last year in Ashtead, but did not have enough money to repeat the event for Leatherhead. With funds from the Leatherhead planning group for a Credit Union and an Education grant, I am able to repeat a health event for Leatherhead, but I need helpers. Please come, all are welcome.
