

Originally our holiday had consisted of a week's stay in a cottage in Scotland but it was cancelled due to a water leak. Colin and I decided to pack our bags, throw them in the car, head off, hoping we might find somewhere to stay. Our final destination was unknown to us although we knew that we would still aim to head for Scotland.

The mountain ranges and the glistening lochs is where I find food for the soul, my soul rejoices amongst such glorious surroundings. So here we were in Fort William and we chanced upon a meeting with Elsie. Elsie is 86 years old and runs a bed and breakfast from her 3 bedded apartment. Elsie provided us with our first night's rest. Unhampered by the requests from her family to stop offering her bedrooms for B&B Elsie explained that she enjoyed the company, liked to care for others and found great comfort in having people in the apartment. At breakfast the following morning Elsie informed us she had an appointment at the hospital and would be grateful if when we decided to leave, we would lock up and place the key under the mat by the


front door. We willingly obliged. Elsie's warmth and generosity of spirit is where we found the presence of God.

Fort William was a place of revelation for Col and I as we sat for our evening meal. I had an overwhelming sense that God required us to let go of the holiday and entrust it completely to him. Instead of the frantic web searches we were making in the hope of finding accommodation and the endless touring around the streets as so often happens, we both felt that we were being asked to let go, to take our hands off, to entrust God with the arrangements.

It was one of the most liberating experiences. We felt called to read our daily devotions together every morning and to pray that God would guide us to where we should go and who we should stay with. Our first reading was entitled 'travelling light', then another 'walking in faith', and another 'digging deeper', it seemed that God had even colluded with Nick Fawcett to write devotions that were so pertinent to our context. Our time in Scotland proved to be a deeply moving experience where we continued to encounter God in the people we met, the stories we shared and the places we visited. We were being fed along the way visiting the Orkney islands and the isle of Skye.

God's Spirit dwells within us, in the inner chambers of the heart in which God waits to do his glorious work. But I realized on our journey around Scotland that I need reminders, that I don't always acknowledge nor humbly give in to God's will. As the business crowds in God can be squeezed out and what was once God's work, can soon become my own. On my journey around Scotland I realized that God desires to do so much through us if only we would allow him.

Joint Leadership Meeting, 21st July

A fruitful discussion was held at the Joint Leadership Meeting and I offer you these notes as a way of keeping you informed about our progress towards a united church.

- We assessed our progress so far and talked through some minor issues which needed addressing. We were happy that our objectives set at the previous meeting had been met, concerning a visit to another church and arranging a meeting with the spiritual advisor.
- A visit to Littlehampton United Church in July was very helpful. With a congregation a bit bigger than our own, we found their enthusiasm and insight very informative. We will continue to keep contact with this church as they help guide us through the process where necessary.
- A day for spiritual refreshment has been organised. We agreed that there were many practical issues to be dealt with throughout this process but spiritual formation was also crucial. Revd Bernard Fidder is joining us on the 24th September.
- I spent two days researching documents so that relevant information could be placed into an A4 booklet for each member of the leadership team. It included summaries of two large documents for becoming one church: buildings, policies, theology and practice for both denominations, insights into worship, outlines on vision and mission statements, as well as proposals for the coming 2 years.
- The proposals were discussed and it was agreed they provided us with objectives to aim for in the next two years. It was important they were realistic and achievable.
- The group would need to break down into smaller groups to begin discussions on issues such as Communion, worship, baptism and membership, ministry, decision making and safeguarding.
- Finance and bookings would be a constant area for discussion with Brian and David working together in the coming months to assess any issues that needed further consideration.

The leadership team will meet together again on the 20^{th} September. \emph{Kim}

Journey to the Promised Land

Some people seem to be interpreting the referendum vote as a view that all immigrants are unwelcome. This was not always so and is a decidedly unchristian point of view. I am stirred to write for the following reasons. Some 50 years ago I had a Jewish colleague, Vernon, who died about 12 months ago. In the Jewish (and Moslem) tradition burial must take place very soon after death (see the account of the crucifixion where the bodies had to be taken down for burial before sunset); there is then a memorial service up to a year later. Vernon's memorial gathering took place this July, where Jewish family and friends, former colleagues, mostly Christian, and local residents and friends from where he had lived (a very mixed group including Rastafarians, and some of no religious affiliation) gathered together. Prayers were said in Hebrew, then all joined in reciting the 23rd Psalm, a unifying experience. Now Vernon had himself been an immigrant, a refugee from the Nazi regime in 1938, and he wrote an account of his experience coming to England. The following is an abbreviated version.

I left Magdeburg on the evening after Kristallnacht (10 Nov 1938), a shy, timid boy, my mother accompanying me to the German border, after which I was on my own until I reached Harwich some 17 hours later.

There my 'big' brother was waiting for me and a very sensible immigration officer allowed him to join me when he realised that my few words of recently acquired English were quite inadequate to cope with his questions. There followed a train journey to Liverpool Street, and my first ever experience of an underground train, during which I became aware of something I had never seen in Germany – everyone was wearing a red poppy, and to this day they have a special significance for me.

Then another train journey to Worthing, and finally we arrived at the home of Mrs Caroline Collard. This remarkable woman, a widow with sons and grandchildren of her own, living on a small pension, had undertaken to look after a small boy whose family she did not know, whose language she did not speak, and who was of a different faith. Indeed, when later it was suggested to her that as a Christian she ought to get me converted, she replied firmly that

she was acting in loco parentis, and that was not what my parents would have wished.

Next morning I really became aware of the total change in my life. Up to then I had lived in an apartment on a busy street of a big town, and now I was in a typical English semi, with a garden back and front, 2 large dogs, and aviary full of budgerigars and faced with a beige/grey substance called porridge, which required all the diplomatic tact I was capable of to be polite about. In time actually I grew to like it, and still do.

Next day most of Mrs Callard's family came to lunch, my brother returned to London, and life in England began in earnest. The first requirement of course was to acquire a working knowledge of the language. When I went to the local school, I found myself translating problems into German, working out the answer, and translating that into English. After about three days, it dawned on me to try to think in English, after which progress was understandably faster.

Being a foreigner and a Jew, probably the only one in either category that most of my fellow pupils (and possibly some of the teachers) had met, I was something of a curiosity, but this mostly manifested itself through acts of kindness, which is not necessarily the way of schoolboys in general. Recently there has been a good deal of discussion about religious education in state schools. I can only say that attending Assembly, and even Scripture class did me no harm, and gave me perhaps a better understanding about what was then still an important part in the lives of my fellows, and has been useful on occasions since.

I have been in England now for 51 years; it is 40 years since I left Worthing and the beautiful gentle Sussex countryside that I explored on my bicycle. I hope that at least some of the Children of Israel found the Land of Milk and Honey as much to their liking, and were as grateful to the Almighty as I am for bringing me to this 'green and pleasant land'.

This first appeared in a synagogue newsletter at Pesach (Passover).

It also provides an opportunity for young leaders from church and the community to experience what it's like to lead, rather than attend, and to grow their confidence whilst putting something back into the community during their school holidays. Some of them have been mentored by Angie and have attended young leaders' courses. In addition, Angie organises trips to Thorpe Park, Air Hop, fishing at Southwater Country Park, film afternoons and pamper sessions. How she does it all I don't know, but I do know it's much appreciated by the community, and hopefully the kids return happy and exhausted to their their parents. Looking forward, SCMC are hoping to become more involved in the community by renting a facility in the centre of the village. Brolly Good!

Last week, the first one in July, I had a nuisance phone call which began "Now that winter is nearly upon us..."! To me it was summer, and what happened to autumn?

It did make me think about the rather damp - wet! - periods we have had this summer. In fact, it is raining heavily as I write. This thought set me wondering about the history of our recently well-used umbrellas, and so I did a little research.

The word comes from the Latin 'umbra' which means shade or shadow. I was not at all surprised to learn that umbrellas were used by the people of ancient China, Greece and Egypt to protect them from the sun, and were considered to be a symbol of wealth

and power. Their use gradually lessened and they did not become popular again until the Renaissance in the 14th/16th centuries. They were still an article of the wealthy. Now they are everyday objects and a cheap means of protection if caught out unprepared in the rain.

Made of whalebone and wood, with a covering of sturdy cotton fabric, the first umbrellas were hefty.

Later the cotton covering was waterproofed with oil or wax. By the 17th century the straight handles had become curved so that servants could hold the umbrella to shield their employer. To begin with, they were only used by women but men also began to use them about this time too, but still only by the upper classes. In the middle 1800's umbrellas became much lighter in weight when the frame began to be made from steel. During Victorian times parasols became popular again, as it considered very ill-bred to have anything resembling a sun-kissed face! They were very fancy, made of silk or finest cotton and elaborately trimmed with lace and tassels.

Today's umbrellas would be unrecognisable to the people of bygone days. Now they are very lightweight, colourful and folding into the smallest space. Until the advent of the folding variety, umbrellas were left in their thousands on trams, trains and buses. Many of them would have belonged to my father. When he worked in the City in the 1930's, an umbrella was an essential part of the 'uniform' of the well-dressed City gent. It meant my mother never had to think what to buy for his birthday!

A thought: could we identify Christ as an umbrella to shield us from the storms of life? Or do we fold Him up to keep Him close in a pocket? Perhaps He gets forgotten and gets left behind to end up as lost property!




